At the beginning of September, we received a call from Animal Control inquiring about some information. Joanie decided we should go to assess the situation. When we arrived, we found LaKota pacing outside a fence and you could tell he was stressed. He was stressed because he was a stallion and there were two mini horses, one being a mare, inside the fence. On a scale from 1 to 9 he was a 4. Joanie gave the owners some ways to help LaKota gain some weight and shared that he needed to be gelded if they were going to keep the mare.

On Wednesday, October 6th, Christina and I went back out to assess LaKota and found that he had lost an incredible amount of weight since the last visit. At that time, we made arrangements to have the owners surrender LaKota to HPS and to have him transported on Friday. We could not bring him back to the rescue because he was a stallion. We arranged to keep him off property until he was able to gain enough weight to be gelded.

We provided 5-year-old LaKota with water, hay, grain and a nice sized pasture. After two weeks LaKota gained enough weight to be gelded. He is doing well and will be transported back to HPS December 5th . He will spend a short time in the front condos and field, then get introduced to the herd .


