her and who fully understands Midnight's personality.

It is very important to never touch the eye with fingers since it can cause a fungal infection. Many of the horses like to put their whole face in the hay bales. It is then easy to cause a scratch on the eye ball. It is very important to have all eye issues checked by a veterinarian and treated correctly.

Midnight Sun needed to have her Coggins test done before she could leave the Sanctuary.

Pontiac needed his vaccinations of a 5-1. He is only eight years old and may never been vaccinated. He will need a booster.

Chippewa is also young and got his 5-1 vaccination.





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Unwanted Horses

The phone calls and emails have accelerated in the past several months. During the extremely cold time in January most of the calls were about horses in areas with no shelter. Some progressive counties now require shelter for equine, but the state laws do not. The type of shelter is extremely important. The horses have to be able to get out of the freezing cold wind so an open carport type shelter is not adequate even in hot weather. There were also reports of horses not being fed, starving and foals out in the extreme cold.



All I can tell concerned citizens is to call Animal Control it they do not have an equine rescue in their area that can work with the owner or has openings to take in horses.

There were two horribly starved horses in Stanley County that neither the Sheriff's Department nor the Animal Control would do anything about. We did not have the room to take them in which is heart breaking. I told the concerned people to go through the Internet, phone calls and news media to put some pressure on and see that the horses were seized and cared for. It worked in getting the horses out through an equine rescue in South Carolina who contacted the owner and had him release the two horses. It concerns me that none of the North Carolina rescues were able to step up and take the horses. We have to be able to place horses in new quality homes so we will not be in this position again.

HPS is now getting inquiries concerning our fully recovered rescued horses and we are hopeful to be able to place horses in the near future. Our other concern is always, do we have the funds to care for starved horses, which always cost so much more to care for? Baby's feed and needed supplements cost over \$100 a week and her veterinarian cost to save her life the first five months was over \$5,000.

When we take in a horse we never know what may be happening medically with that horse. Saving each horse is not determined by the cost, but simply, can the horse be saved.

Each person with a Facebook page can help place horses. Pick a 'Saddle Pal' on our website (Flame is shown in the photo), save the picture to your computer and then post it on your Facebook page and ask your followers to share the horse's picture and information. Please put in our website address. It is important to add that we only place horses in North Carolina.
