News From The Herd

Sunset has developed an abscess and needs to be soaked twice a day.

Tacoma's trial has been continued to late May from the earlier date. The judge was not amenable to the charges. The owner was not being charged with the death of one starved horse. Court was not postponed. (Quote from Marcia Bowen, the county investigator) "The way the magistrate worded the charges, we have to prove intentional withholding of sustenance, and the Judge is having a

hard time with this with 5 horses on 20 acres of pasture. According to the Dep. Prosecutor, he was telling her to take it back to civil and do something. A civil complaint has already been filed. One portion has already been dismissed." The case is now due to be heard the end of May.

I wonder if anyone bothered to mention that it would take 60 pounds of wet matter (fresh grass) to equal 20 pounds of hay, per day per horse. (More hay would be needed if no feed was being provided.) That equals 360 pounds of grass per day. The horses were taken in December of 2003. Did the judge happen to think that grass was not growing then nor had much if any nutritional value? There was also a draught in the fall and a heat wave. So fescue was not growing. It is my understanding that the horses were expected to survive on the pasture ONLY! Sometimes educating the judges is the hardest part of the abuse cases.

Aztec came into be feed a few days ago toe walking on a front leg. The vet was called and Aztec was checked for an abscess. No thing was found and Patrice Eanes came to check her. With in a day the leg and tendons were swelling. We now feel Aztec has injured her elbow and x-rays have been taken. This is not looking good for recovery. The x-rays will show us more.

Bo got kicked in the side of his neck and developed an edema and then an infection. Through careful doctoring and antibiotics it cleared up with good results.

Queenie continues to gain weight. Her spring coat continues to come in a very dark chestnut. There is still a hindquarter weakness that we pray will improve in the future. Queenie has had her spring bath and it took Dottie, Lisa and myself to accomplish the bathing. Queenie was not a happy camper! Dottie and I took turns holding her while the other two scrubbed and rinsed. The good news is no one got hurt! **Queenie, Montana, Wrangler, Seneca, and Summer** needed to have a chiropractor visit. It is wonderful to see the horses step out with perfect form after being adjusted.

Sun Dance has been in respiratory distress for most of the month. The pollen, hot weather, and stress have caused her to eat very little. This has made it difficult to get the supplements that she needs to recover. We had to resort to a steroid shot to help her feel better so we can get her medicine down her. **Horse baths** are needed this time of the year. We are in need of Mane & Tail shampoo and conditioner from Wal-Mart. Please come and bath a horse!

Yum Yum should be feeling much cooler now. It took several times and much cajoling to convince Yum Yum that I was going to trim off all the long hair. Threats were also issued as I tried to trim a moving target. I finally had to resort to cross tying him. This has got to be the worse trimming I have ever done on any equine!

I rish needed a visit from the vet to treat an eye problem. She had poked herself in the outside corner. Several days of wearing a fly mask with an eye patch and medication twice a day solved the problem. I rish was not at all pleased about having one eye covered and she let everyone know how unhappy she was. The good news is that once we caught her up and put her in her stall, she was an angel to be doctored. Navajo and Moon Glow also had to have eye treatments. Neither one were as polite about their treatments as I rish was.

Yard Sale Results

The Yard Sale was a great success! Many members came to help set up on Thursday, Friday and run the sale on Saturday. We were all concerned when the rainstorms moved in earlier than



predicted in the week. HPS members were undaunted by the morning showers and would run to cover everything as quickly as possible. As soon as the shower past, everything was uncovered once again. Colleen kept us well feed through the day. The workers did not dry out until afternoon. Finally in late morning the showers cleared and the buyers flocked in. By the end of the day there was not much left..... except clothes. When the money was counted we were all thankful, surprised, and very tired. The final count came to a little over \$4,700.00. Thank you for contributing to make the sale so successful. We were able to pay over \$2,000 on the over \$5,000 vet bill. We still have a good bit to pay down, and please join in the upcoming fundraisers to help get the bill paid off
