## Just In Time!

It still shocks me to see a horrifically starved horse that I know is going to die if we cannot get them out right away. This poor horse had signs of extreme diarrhea, and his tail and legs were covered with dried manure. The poor boy was so weak that he could not swish his tail. The muscles had been reabsorbed and he had a body score of a low one.

The owner said he would



not eat hay, but there was no sign of feed or salt and mineral blocks on the property. The horse lived in a small field area with some high grass that was going to seed and no shelter. Walking through the area the lower soft grass was all eaten, leaving only the tough seed stalks. The owner told us that Animal Control had come out a number of times about the horse. The owner told Animal Control that the horse was under veterinarian care, but nothing was being done about the pathetic horse that was slowly starving to death. The owner had the unmitigated gall to tell me that he had been worse in the past.

The owner had dumped the horse on a family member that knows little to nothing about caring for a horse. The family member was relying on the owner to provide the feed. That was not happening! Oh, by the way, there are two more horses on the property, a bred mare and her non-gelded 2 year-old brother. The colt is very small for his age. The mare is dripping milk, (Cont pg 2)

## **Unbelievable!**

About the time I think I have heard all of the stupid, ridiculous things that horse breeders will do to get rid of unwanted horses I am shocked into reality; there will always be a new unbelievable action done by a breeder. A breeder of paint horses had a colt born with no color, and when the poor little thing was just eight months old gave it to a HOMELESS family. I have no words to express what I think of someone who cares so little for a living creature. Unbelievable!!

We found this horse a year later living in an approximate eight by ten foot fenced in area with tarps flapping that freaked him out when the wind blows. The tiny area was just mud. The fence was attached to a condemned

trailer house where the people were living. (They may have been squatters on the property.) He is so little for being 19 months old. The lack of exercise along with improper diet has affected his development.

He was sent directly to Tamara Eichorn's stable to be gelded and for his after care. The gelding procedure took place with no problems and he is recovering fine. Tamara told me, "It was such a joy to see him run in an open field the first time." What a novel experience that must have been for him after his year of confinement in a tiny muddy area! Needless to say, he loves meal time! He has already started to grow; adding height to his stunted status. He will have a chance to pick a name when he comes to the sanctuary. (cont pg 3)



(*Just in Time Cont pg 1*) but not due to foal until August. Because their body conditions were not terrible, there is nothing that can be done to get them out of the very bad situation. I suggested to the property owner that they make the owner responsible for the horses; or they should have the horses removed from their property. The property owner is afraid of the two horses that were left behind.

Firelight will pull your heartstrings. He is either very old; or in the past has had his front teeth filed down to make him look younger. This is an old horse trader's trick; they will even fill in the cavity above the eyes with a syringe full of air to make the horse look younger than it is. Once the front teeth have been filed, the teeth will continue to erupt and make the horse look older than it really is. We might be able to tell his age better when he is strong enough to have dental work done and we can get a look at the back molars.

Firelight is too weak to have a full trim of his hooves. We had to have one back hoof done since it was so long that is was causing tendon issues. There were at least two soles and the bottom was full of abscess and thrush.

It took several days to get the diarrhea stopped and for Firelight to get strong enough to eat hay. He has started to gain a little weight and we are hopeful of a full recovery. He is so shaggy with old shedding hair, but there is no new growth of hair underneath the old stuff. His recovery is going to continue until his body is able to grow hair and protect him from the sun. The fungus is almost totally cleared up and it does not seem to have done any permanent damage. Everyone has grown attached to Firelight. He softly nickers as the feeders arrive, reminding them to hurry up with his meal.

Firelight loves attention and would be delighted with an Angel Sponsor who could visit him from time to time.

(*Unbelievable* cont pg 2) This is where this story takes another sickening turn. Poor starved Red Cloud came from the same breeder! There is nothing that can be done to put the breeder out of business except for people to be very consciences about only buying horses from reputable breeders who register all of their foals. Better yet, bypass the backyard breeders and get a horse from a rescue!

Update: The new gelding has become friends with Freedom and both will be coming to the sanctuary shortly. Freedom went to Tamara's for a little riding tune-up. He had a strange fear of other horses coming close to him when he was under saddle. He is working though this and doing much better around other saddled horses.
