### **Charitable Bequest**

A charitable bequest in your will is another means through which you can make a positive impact. You create something extraordinary by which you can be remembered and you have the satisfaction of knowing that your legacy will extend beyond your lifetime as your resources are used to continue the work of rescuing and caring for starving and abused horses.

We dream of a day when we may have lush pastures for the horses and fields to raise hay. Thank you for caring!

Also, horse owners, make sure that your estate planning includes your horses. You and your estate attorney can make arrangements with HPS to ensure that your horses receive the care they deserve for the rest of their lives.

As an example, remember the two rescued horses, Jo Jo and Ebee? Their owner thought she had everything set to care for her beloved horses. Then she had a devastating stroke and everything she owned had to be sold to pay for her care. The neighbor was told to remove the horses from the property or they would be put down. (That is when HPS stepped in to rescue the horses.)







#### Flames Return

As many of you know, Flame was placed in a great, loving home with a mare named Kona a few months ago. For a while, they were great buddies, but then they started fighting. For those of you who have been to the rescue and met Flame, you know he is great with people but stands high in the herd hierarchy. Mason and Andy had been in contact with me continuously, trying to figure out ways to solve this problem. Unfortunately, no matter what they tried to resolve the issue, the hostility between the two horses only worsened. It was hard for them, but they decided to return Flame as the only option to keep both horses safe. Since Flames returned, he has regained his herd status and fallen in love with Heavenly. Even though it isn't the outcome we wanted for Flame, we always welcome the horses back to the rescue, no matter the circumstances.

#### Volunteers Needed

Calling all volunteers!! Do you have a few hours a week that you can commit to helping at the sanctuary? We can use your help!

We have a several volunteering opportunities, whether you're interested in hands on with the horses or want to contribute in a non-equine capacity. Below are some of our current volunteer needs:

**Feeding Time:** One or two additional folks are needed to help at the morning or afternoon feeding times. Feeding and cleanup usually takes 2 to 3 hours; morning feeding starts at 7:00 am, and afternoon feeding starts at 3:00 pm.

**Building Repair:** The doors and windows on our two-stall buildings need repair or rebuilding. We have the materials that are needed for the repairs. Just bring your tools, i.e., power saw and drill, drill bits and screwdriver attachments for the drill.

Gardening & Landscaping:

Much help is needed here! The gardens need to be prepared for spring planting; and the flower beds and landscaping need to be cleaned up and trimmed to keep the sanctuary attractive.

Cleaning & Pressure Washing: Several times a year, the inside of the barns could use a good cleaning. Cobwebs need to be cleaned off the windows, and the rubber mats and stall walls could benefit from pressure washing.

They have also been displaying behaviors that surprise us. The ducks have been roosting in the large oak trees! Who knew that Muscovy ducks would roost in trees?
