Forget the **THREE MONTHS IN HAWAII.** It would be difficult to take the horses with you, and they would rather have 100 bales of hay.

Forget the **HOPE DIAMOND.** There would not be that many places to wear it anyway. A donation to buy hay won't last as long as the diamond, but it sure will be admired and enjoyed.

Forget the 7,000 SQUARE FOOT HOME. You would hate cleaning it. The dining room wouldn't be large

enough to serve all 32 horses their hay. It would be much better to help buy the needed 100 bales.

Forget taking home **FOUR HORSES** and paying all their expenses. Donating towards the purchase of hay will save you years of costs.

The last time we had to ship in round bales to feed the horses it cost us over \$78.00 a bale. Shipping costs, unloading, storage, and delivery to HPS are in addition to our average cost of \$55/bale. If those costs are identical this time, we need \$7,800 or maybe more if the shipping costs have gone up. HELP! PLEASE! And make it a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year for the horses!

The Tack and Treasure sale was fantastic! A huge thank you to all the folks who donated items to make this sale possible. We tried something different this year and only priced the more expensive items. The household items did well, but the horse items brought in 45% more funds. The photo only shows the things in the side yard and parking area, not the household things in the front yard. You will notice the grass on the side yard is crispy brown. The sad news is that the pastures look the same. Since we have no grass, the horses are eating a lot more

locally procured hay that is costing \$55.00 a round bale. The funds went to monthly expenses.

Medical Needs

Equine Protozoal Myelitis (EPM) has been a nemesis to the horses. For years we used Pathogens EPM cure. The parasites have built an immunity to the medication. Years ago, we used Super Immune Booster and chasteberry tea to help the horses with EPM. It didn't cure this devastating illness, but it helps the horse deal with it for years, and then the horse would crash.

We are on the search for a cure for the horses with EPM. This is a desperate situation since two of the horses are displaying outward symptoms, Shinook, only ten years old, is a gaited Rocky Mountain horse and a real cutie. Red Sky is eleven years old and is so sore she has to be on a pain killer until we got the latest medication for the two horses. It is so sad to see the two horses sick, but what makes you cry is the cost of the latest supposed EPM cure, Sefacon, which cost \$900.00 for the two horses. This is a ten-day treatment that is given morning and afternoon. If it cures Shinook and Red Sky, there are other horses that need to be treated.

Both horses are going to need a long list of supplements to help boost their immune system. A critical adjunct will be Super Immune Booster by Equine Science. Vitamin E is helpful in aiding the damaged muscles. Both of these supplements helped Tusca recover from pemphigus along with his other treatments.

Please help provide for the horses' medical needs!

We have an appointment to meet a Great Pyrenees female dog that was used as a LGD for the first 11 months of her life. We will foster her for a while to make sure she likes us and will get along with the other animals and birds here at the sanctuary.

Finally, it rained! We may have enough moisture in the ground to reseed the fields. This is expensive but well worth it to keep the horses happy for most of the year with good grass for them to nibble on.
