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## Stella's hoof Update By Christina

As you may recall from our previous newsletter, we welcomed a special guest, Stella, to our sanctuary. Stella is temporarily staying with us as she awaits the completion of her new barn and prepares to take Ginger, one of our beloved residents, to her new home. However, upon Stella's arrival, we noticed an intriguing situation concerning one of her front hooves.

It came to our attention that Stella's previous farrier had applied a thick layer of epoxy to the inside of her front hoof. Unfortunately, this epoxy was beginning to crack and deteriorate. Concerned for Stella's well-being, we promptly reached out to our trusted farrier for a thorough assessment.

Upon close examination and the removal of the remaining epoxy, our farrier discovered a serious crack in Stella's hoof. This crack extended from a few inches around her coronary band all the way down her hoof. The epoxy had inadvertently created a damp and dark environment beneath it, fostering the growth of harmful bacteria. Stella's hoof required substantial support to aid in the healing process.

In response, our farrier fitted Stella with a special shoe and a tension band at the top to help stabilize and bring her hoof back together. This intervention is designed to prevent the continued cracking as new hoof growth occurs. Regrettably, healing such a hoof crack is a lengthy process, with at least a year of hoof growth needed before it is no longer visible.

Rest assured, as Stella continues her journey and goes to her new home, she will have a diligent farrier who will closely monitor her progress, ensuring that her hoof grows in a healthier and more natural manner. We'll keep you updated on Stella's progress in the coming months.







#### Fiona Mae Wagglebottom's Act: A Leap Forward in Equine Welfare"

We are thrilled to share some exciting news that holds great promise for the welfare of horses and all animals in North Carolina. The recently introduced "Fiona Mae Wagglebottom's Act" is a significant step towards enhancing animal welfare laws, including provisions that directly affect the equine community. North Carolina is currently ranked 42nd in the nation in terms of animal protection laws, according to recent assessments. This ranking highlights the significance of the "Fiona Mae Wagglebottom's Act" as a positive step toward strengthening the state's commitment to animal welfare.

The "Fiona Mae Wagglebottom's Act," named after the beloved dog of sponsoring Representative Dahle, is primarily focused on addressing the issue of tethering dogs outdoors during extreme weather conditions. While dogs are the primary beneficiaries of this act, it contains a provision that holds immense significance for horses and livestock.

The Act defines "adequate shelter" as a shelter that meets several key conditions, including suitability for the species, age, condition, size, and type of each animal. It also mandates protection from injury, adverse weather conditions, and ensures cleanliness. Of particular note is the prohibition of outdoor tethering of animals during extreme weather conditions, which is a significant leap forward in safeguarding equine welfare. For our equine friends, this means a greater commitment to ensuring they have appropriate shelter and protection during harsh conditions.

- 1. Quality Hay and Feed: A steady supply of high-quality hay and nutritional feed is the cornerstone of our horses' well-being. Donations of hay and feed go a long way in ensuring our horses receive the best nutrition possible. Reseeding all of the fields.
- 2. Veterinary Care Fund: Your contributions to our veterinary care fund help us address unforeseen health issues and provide routine check-ups and vaccinations. This fund ensures our horses stay healthy and happy.
- 3. Shelter and Fencing: Weather-resistant shelters and secure fencing are essential for our horses' comfort and safety. Donations toward building or maintaining these structures are greatly appreciated.
- 4. Equimax Dewormer: Is an important part of the health care for all of the horses. we give it once a year and we have had to put it off due to the cost of \$18.00 a tube or \$630.00 for the herd. Please send a tube of Equimax you can order over the Internet.
- 5. EPM—Equine Protozoal Myeloencephlitis: HPS has had two long term foundations once again helped. This time they are providing for the next two rounds of EPM testing and treatment for ten infected horses.
- 6. Barn repair: The big barns were built in 2006 & 2007 and are in need of some pieces of metal replaced for safety. We have tried to get costs and are still working on it, but we need toe funds, I am guessing \$1,000 to \$1,500.
- 7. Volunteer Time: The gift of your time is invaluable. We always welcome volunteers who are passionate about horses and can assist with daily chores, barn care, cleaning & filling water tubs, grooming, and spending quality time with our equine residents.
- 8. *Financial* Support: Monetary donations provide flexibility in addressing urgent needs and maintaining day-to-day operations. Your financial support is a lifeline for the horses.
- 9. *Transportation Assistance*: Sometimes, we rescue horses from distant locations. We sometimes need a driver to help pick up rescues.




