

I received a phone call from Iredell County Animal Control concerning a horse an owner had surrendered to them. The owner did not give them much information except the mare was supposed to be 25 years old and had been bred. She had a foal in the spring, but it died! Looking at her no one would be surprised the foal died. It is a miracle she did not



The poor little thing is club footed on one back leg. It looks like an old injury that was not cared for caused the problem. The fetlock has built up calcification and the tendon is enlarged. The good news is there still is some limited movement in the fetlock joint. We have had success in the past with old injuries like this. It takes time, DMSO and physical therapy.

Her mane is matted and full of burrs. We will carefully remove these so as not to get these terrible things growing on our property. She has not picked a name yet and we are still trying to come up with a name she likes.

Our poor little pony is not as old as the owner said. She is more likely 18 years old. Once we get a better look at all her teeth, we will know more. She loves attention and goes to greet most folks that go into see her. At the present time she has a body score of a one. Of course she has rain rot all over her back. Her blood panel did not show anything that we would not expect to see with a horse starved this badly. I would expect a full recovery of our new little girl. Time and Patience!

Sanctuary Update ~Joanie Benson

The veterinarians treated several eye problems, Feather and Amigo, did blood work on a couple of horses, Miracle and New Pony, and digital radiographs of hooves, Morning Star (formerly "Poor Girl"). Shaman had a huge pitting edema, and we had his blood work done. Sometimes there is just no outward reason to explain some conditions that appear.

Our new horse "Poor Girl" picked the name "Morning Star." We did radiographs on one hoof to see how the soles were doing since they were paper-thin. She had been moved into the new barn and was doing well until the soles broke open on both front hooves right in front of the frog. There was just too much built up infection and pressure. The holes are not too bad, but she is going to have to spend some time in the hospital stall to keep the bandages clean and let her recover. She lis moving better and the soles are much thicker. I am so thankful we have the wonderful new barns. The rubber mats are wonderful for Morning Star.

We have been nursing Fire Breeze along for the last two years. Everyone felt he had brain can-Icer. He was getting melanomas on his nose that we had treated along. They would dry up and fall off. He had odd spells of blindness that would last for about 20 minutes and then his sight would come back. Once the sight in his right eye did not return and he remained blind in that eye. Then this year he started having a different type of spell usually when he was in his stall. He would go backwards at great speed bumping into walls and then it would be over. Then he had two spells in one day that were much worse while he was out of his stall and the recovery time took much longer. Fire Breeze was just out of it, not knowing where he was and was very disorientated. The danger to him seriously hurting himself was too great to risk. The kindest thing we could do for Fire Breeze was to peacefully let him go over the rainbow bridge. Fire Breeze was 41 years old and had been with us for many, many years. He will be greatly missed.

Several years ago a former neighbor of a HPS member, Lisa Murray, and mine told me about the rescued horses and invited us out. At that time I had so much going on with just recently getting remarried and acquiring a bonus daughter (the same age as mine) I just didn't have the time. I know, great excuse right J. Well as life happens, and if you ever had teenage girls and/or a stepfamily, life sometimes doesn't go very smoothly. We started having a lot of turmoil from outside sources that was an attempt to destroy our family. So one night I just sat down and prayed about what could I do to bring Cheyenne and I closer together? What would give us something to do with a common bond and spirit? All of a sudden, I hear Lisa's voice saying how her heart and soul feels after a day at the rescue. I called Joanie the very next morning and became a member that day.
