Hot Summer Weather



The temperatures are in the seventies early in the morning. The horses are comfortable having breakfast first thing, and the barn often has a light breeze blowing through. Each horse gets checked over to make sure nothing has taken place overnight that may need a little attention.

The horses then try to empty the cold, fresh water that has been filled in the cleaned water tubs. The old bathtubs on legs are our favorite type, easy to drain and keep clean and Oliver and Turk like drinking out of the tubs also. We keep other low sided bowls filled with water for the chickens, ducks, toads or any other creature that

needs a drink. We have a small pond in the front yard that has rocks at the shallow end for the bees and other bugs to get water without drowning.

The next stop is the covered hay feeders to eat all they want of fresh cut hay. (Thank you for helping to keep the hay supplied to the horses. We need all the help we can get.)



The hay feeders provide the needed shade on the scorching hot days. Nap time for most of the babies comes next. Some of the horses will sleep while standing in the hay feeder and others will go to the barns to nap.

It is time to visit the pond field and some will enjoy playing in the pond. Chicopee, Chicklet, and Chuckles are often in first. A good roll in the grass helps to shed the water and the heat from their body.

We are still working to kill off the last of the pigweed and ragwort. Any pigweed is fenced off so the horses can't get to it. The ragwort is dead and just needs to be removed from a few spots.



Come visit the beautiful horses and it will bring joy to your day.

Please look for this plant on your property. Pigweed is toxic to all your animals, dog, cats and all hoof animals. There are several types.



Ragwort is toxic to all animals. After frost kills the plant back it becomes almost sweet tasting. After spraying and killing the plant, it should be removed or burned.
