

News from the Herd

Ebony Star has been a hard horse to manage over the years. Shortly after she arrived she was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. It has been an up and down struggle to keep her levels balanced so she feels good. She was put on a compounded powered Pergolide and her numbers were still off.

Later, Metformin was added to the Pergolide medications. It seemed to help, her numbers were slightly better, but we could tell she didn't feel well; she avoided the other horses and hid in the barn much of the time. Metformin has a long list of possible side effects, so we took her off the Metformin and her attitude improved some.

Earlier this summer, Dr. Smokey Pucket suggested changing Ebony Star from the powered compounded Pergolide to Prascend. His reasoning made perfect sense. The amount of Pergolide in a scoop of the compounded product could vary with each scoop; whereas, Prascend in a pill form would have the exact amount of Pergolide needed in each pill.

Dr. Cole Annas subsequently checked Ebony's blood levels and they were the best she has ever had. She feels so much better, and we attribute it to the EPM treatment and being switched to Prascend. Her best friend now is Meeka who has had a hard time trusting other horses. Before coming to HPS, Meeka had her jaw broken by a kick from another horse. It had been hard for Ebony Star to make friends when she was not feeling well. It makes us joyful to see the two lonely horses now happy together as best friends.

Aslan has various health issues. He has some arthritis and asthma. Sometimes we don't know what is going to happen next. One evening, Christina found that Aslan was bleeding down both back legs. A picture was taken and Christina washed his legs to find the cause of the bleeding. She found only several tiny cuts on the inside of his legs.

The next day Dr. Annas pulled blood to check his clotting factor. The testing was not conclusive, but Vitamin K has been ordered to help his clotting factor.

Both Aslan and Shasta's asthma symptoms have improved, even in this hot humid weather. Their EPM treatments may be the reason. Both are moving better and breathing better.

Willow is the mare that was purchased from a kill buyer feedlot by her previous owners. After months of refeeding, she was still very thin when she came to HPS. We tested Willow and she was positive for EPM. The treatment seemed to help her unsteady gait and then she went back to where she was shortly after the 10-day treatment ended.

Willow is not gaining weight as she should, which may indicate an infection that her body is trying to fight. She has neurological symptoms which could be a long list of possible issues. Dr. Annas has run about every test that can be done to try and figure out what is causing her problems.

All the tests, including West Nile, have been negative except a mild EPM positive. Various illnesses can be the result of low vitamin E. It has been suggested, when other issues are eliminated, try a chiropractor and Vitamin E supplements. We will keep you updated on how Willow and the other horses are doing.
