Reports

The mid term 2022 reports are now available to view. You can see this through the HERO app - under Reports 2022. You should be able to see a comment written by your child's kaiako, as well as their GEMS video explaining how they show our school values. Here's a bit of a break down of an example so hopefully it makes a bit more sense!



The dials represent the student's learning across the curriculum level. Green = they have achieved goals in that curriculum level. Yellow = goals that the student are working on at the moment. Grey = goals that are either not achieved / haven't been worked on. It's perfectly normal to have learning either working on, or achieved across different curriculum levels. This happens because teachers are teaching to the needs of your children - as learning can cover a range of curriculum levels! If you click on the grey bar at the bottom, you can see the actual goals that are at that curriculum level.

Here you can see the goals in the learning area that they are currently working on. If there is a little "green eye" next to it, you can click on it and see some of your child's work. You can also click on "see recently completed" to see some goals they may have just recently achieved.

Growth in our classroom environments

As part of our 10 year property plan, the ministry has agreed to some upgrades of some classroom spaces (Emerald first, and then Sapphire) which will start in the upcoming holidays. The main features include new carpet, new lighting and removing benches from the cloak bays.

This is going to cause some disruption however. **Greenstone (NE-1)** will move into the library whilst the renovations are happening. **Sapphire** will move over into Greenstone for the whole of the term. **Emerald** will move into Sapphire's classroom to use while the renovations happen in their block. All affected blocks will be moving next week so they end the term having spent a few days in their new learning spaces before the school holidays. We appreciate your support through this process.

Showing our EMPATHY GEMS to an amazing community resource!

We are writing to ask for your support (show our GEMS of empathy) for a programme which is currently under threat of closure.

Whirinaki has been running a Ministry of Education (part) funded programme for the last three years, led by Claire Mepham, with great success. Our whole school got to experience this last week with our trip there!

Last week they received the sad news that their application to renew the programme for another three years has been declined by the Ministry. Whilst the Trust contributes 50% of the funding for the programme, they very much rely on the Ministry of Education funding to keep the programme running.

They are going to appeal the decision and ask, if you are happy to do so, to reply to this message with a voice of support for our programme. They will collate these and pass them on.

It is important to note that the new gallery is focused on Local curriculum and is the only place in Upper Hutt to do so.

They key points they are debating are as follows:

- We (whirinaki) are the ONLY LEOTC providers in Upper Hutt and have been for the last three years.
- We offer our programmes for FREE, subsidising the costs by approx. 50%.
- Last year we opened the new \$9-million-dollar extension of Whirinaki which included a
 new custom-built, fully accessible classroom built for this very purpose! How sad that
 this will now sit empty.
- We ALWAYS offer hands-on interactive activities. These are incorporated into each programme so that practical learning takes place across the curriculum and are FREE.
- We offer eight diverse programmes (Art, STEM, Environment etc) which complement and enrich the whole New Zealand curriculum. Many recognize and value the unique bicultural and multicultural character of Aotearoa and with a focus on the Aotearoa/New Zealand Histories Curriculum.
- All our evaluations report over the last three years have been excellent. From the last report I quote the NZCER LEOTC Monitoring Team "The staff are passionate and enthusiastic. They work collaboratively with personnel within and from outside the gallery. Programmes are well considered and adapted as needed and schools have great confidence, knowing that their students will gain an authentic and exciting programme when they visit. "
