Daily Dose of Shakespeare	
<p>Shakespeare invented 420 words. His plays also contain the first recorded usage of about 1,700 words, according to the Oxford English Dictionary. The extra 1,280 words were likely already colloquialisms in Shakespeare's day that he didn't invent, but happened to be the first to write down. We still use many of the 420 he credibly did make up, like "bedroom," "bump," "dawn," "excitement," "leapfrog," "priceless," and "zany." You can find a full list at litcharts.com! So how did Shakespeare "invent" words? He used nouns as verbs and verbs as adjectives, combined two words into one, and added prefixes and suffixes to words that never had them before.</p>
