It is finally SPRING! This is an exclamation I have heard every March since moving to the Midwest in 2001. At first, I could not figure out why anyone would be so happy about spring. Growing up in the Pacific Northwest, springtime is not always rejoiced. It is dreary and wet, the land is muddy and brown, and your shoes are always damp. Many easter egg hunts of my youth were held inside my grandparents' house, so as not to muddy my "good shoes."

Now that I have lived in the Midwest for quite a while, I get it. I understand why springtime is so celebrated. Winters here can be harsh, and people rush to get indoors to escape the elements. Spring is a time when Midwesterners can break free of their homes and offices and enjoy the outdoors once more. It is a time of rebirth for the land, the animals, and ourselves. It is because of this realization that springtime, leading up to Easter, has taken on a new meaning for me. As a child, Easter was all about dying eggs, jellybeans, and egg hunts in my grandparents' basement. As an adult living in Iowa, I now make connections of rebirth in body, mind, and spirit.

Springtime is also a relief for many. Winter is over. The threats winter can bring - cold, ice, snow - are gone for now. This is how I process the Resurrection. Things were bad. Jesus was arrested, sentenced, and crucified. But when things seemed at their worst, there came a wondrous celebration. The stone was moved. Jesus had risen. Life began anew. We, as Episcopalians, rejoice in this cycle as we do the seasons. Harshness begets celebration, winter leads to spring.




