"Where the Spirit Leads"

There are moments in life when we think we know exactly where we're going—when we have a plan, a destination, and even a well-marked path. And then, something happens. The road ahead is closed. A door that seemed wide open suddenly shuts. And we find ourselves standing still, wondering, "What now?"

In Acts 16:6-15s, we find Paul and his companions in just such a moment. They are traveling through Asia, spreading the Gospel, but twice the Holy Spirit blocks their way. Twice, their plans are interrupted. And then, in the night, Paul has a vision: a man from Macedonia pleading, "Come over to Macedonia and help us."

So, without hesitation, Paul and his companions set sail, trusting that this unexpected turn of events is the Spirit's leading. They end up in Philippi, a Roman colony, where they meet Lydia, a woman who will become one of the first converts in Europe. This chance encounter—this seemingly small shift in plans—becomes a moment of great significance in the spread of the Gospel.

Now, I don't know about you, but I like a good plan. I like knowing what's next. Whether it's planning a family gathering, organizing the week ahead, or even setting up the schedule for our pickleball play in the parish hall, there's something comforting about order and structure.

But the Holy Spirit doesn't always operate according to our plans. Sometimes, the Spirit is more like a board game from our Wednesday group of Settlers of Catan than a well-scripted itinerary. You think you're building the longest road, and then suddenly, someone puts a settlement right in your path! And you have to rethink your whole strategy.

Or maybe it's like knitting a scarf. You start with a pattern, confident in where it's going, but then—maybe halfway through—you realize you've made a mistake several rows back. You could unravel everything, or, as many experienced knitters will tell you, you could "make it work," turning a mistake into a creative new design.

God's Spirit often works in the same way. Just when we think we have everything figured out, the Spirit redirects us, leading us toward an opportunity we never expected. The real question is: Are we willing to trust where God is leading?

Lydia, the woman Paul meets by the river, is a great example of this trust. She is a dealer in purple cloth—a successful businesswoman. She is already a worshiper of God, but when she hears Paul's message, the Lord "opens her heart" to receive the Gospel. She doesn't resist. She doesn't say, "Well, this wasn't in my five-year plan." She simply listens, responds, and then offers hospitality to Paul and his companions, opening her home as a place of ministry.

How often do we resist the Spirit because it doesn't fit into our expectations? How often do we miss an opportunity to share God's love because we are so determined to stick to our own plans?

Maybe the Spirit is nudging us to invite that new person at coffee hour to join in the reading of scripture and dwell in the living word. Maybe we're being called to put down our own agenda and listen to someone who just needs to talk. Maybe we are being led to try something new—whether it's a new way of serving, a new way of worshiping, or even a new way of seeing those around us.

God is always leading us toward something. Our job is to pay attention—to be open, like Lydia, and to trust, like Paul, that when one door closes, God is opening another.

So this week, I invite you to be on the lookout for those unexpected turns, those moments when the Spirit is nudging you toward something new. Maybe it will happen on the pickleball court, in the quiet rhythm of knitting, or around a table with friends and a board game. Wherever it is, may we have the faith to follow where God leads, knowing that the journey is always worth it.

And may the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.

Good Stewards of the Church Building

Since we have a cleaning crew twice a month it is important for us to be good stewards of our building.

A couple reminders when the building is used:

After any event involving food, please be sure the trash is taken out. Our custodial service is here twice a month so trash (especially food items) needs to be taken out to the big dumpster in the alley. Recyclables go in the smaller bins in the alley. One bin for metal, glass, plastic and the other is for cardboard and paper. Please place things in the bins accordingly. If you need trash bags, they are kept in the cabinet next to the Treasurer's office.

White long tables are being kept along the cabinets in the old kitchen area. They do not go in the table storage closet. Stack chairs go in the East corners of the Parish Hall and folding chairs go in the storage closet on the West end of the Parish Hall.

Filling paper towel dispensers can be done by placing the key (attached to a ruler, in the cabinet next to the treasurer's office) in the top of the dispenser. Packs of folded paper towels are also in that cabinet.

In the cabinet next to the Treasurer's office are paper products for the church. In the old kitchen (silver cabinet) you will find cleaning supplies.

Make sure to **turn lights off**, **close all inside doors** and be sure **outside doors lock** behind you.


By doing these things, keeps the building ready for the next meeting or event.
