Here's Troyer's own words at roll call 2-22-2020

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: I just think the communication will be better and we're more apt to ask questions and hey, keep us up to date.

Speaker 2: It would be friendlier. Right? Yeah.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Keep us up to date on what you guys are working on, I think. I think, you know, the working better together.

Speaker 2: Yeah.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: And we'll have a better understanding of what each side's doing and what we can help each other out with. Um. Let me say, um, obviously, I've stressed the importance of completing good reports, um, good narratives and things like that, especially on missing persons. Um, double check and make sure the names are correct. In fact, I asked the parent, you know how sometimes people go by nicknames or, um, they'll go by a middle name for the first name or whatever, so just double check. I'm not saying that you're not, but I just want to stress double check. Um, especially on missing persons reports. Um, what shows up on the date of birth? How is it on the date of birth? Um. Or I mean.

Speaker 2: My birth certificate.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: The birth certificate. Um, and just make sure that information is correct, because from that document, it may lead into, like we experienced last night, an Amber alert being sent out. Well, the name was a little jacked up on the initial report. Um, so the NCIC entry was had to be we had to go back in and fix it.

Speaker 2: For the for the Amber alert.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Um, and I think it funneled down to Amber at one point also, um, so obviously other documents and other things are put in place based on the initial report. And like last night, we don't know who all is going to look at our report. I'm sure CMPD has a copy of it.

Speaker 2: For.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Investigation.

Speaker 2: Yeah.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: So it's not like it's just an in-house report that we do and we're the only ones that see it. We have no idea where this is going and who's going to be looking at it. So just try to pay attention to those details. Um, do a good narrative again like on the missing person for as much information in there as you can and just.

Speaker 2: Yeah. So you'll know. Actually, uh, Rosina authorized me to send, uh, CMPD detective via mail, the, uh, case report, and I did that, so. Yeah. So he knows about it.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: And the, uh, I don't know if you heard the 13 year old came back.

Speaker 2: Oh, I didn't then I close it out. They do a supplement. They should have, I'm sure. Okay. All right.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Ncic, I.

Speaker 2: Would imagine. All right.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Yeah. Jamie said they.

Speaker 2: Took her out.

Lt. Jeffery Troyer: Okay, so she's back. She came back to the room or whatever.
