From yesterday's sermon: "Sited to be sighted"

".... both Dunkin Donuts and Weightwatchers announced they were changing their names.

Weightwatchers now goes by the "slimmed down" name: WW!

Dunkin Donuts is now Dunkin! As with IHOP's name change the internet went crazy! -"Dunkin donuts changing its name to international house of donuts, what a disgrace" -"I'm from New England & I don't think they should be able to do this without putting it on the ballot."

-"What is it exactly that one is Dunkin', if not a Donut?"

- Likely from Georgia: "To be fair, the only reasonable thing to call "Dunkin Donuts" is "You Know, the Place We Have to Go to Because There Isn't a Krispy Kreme Near Here.""

I offer you all of this talk about names because I want to suggest that in relation to today's Gospel Reading in Mark 10:46-52, the healing of blind Bartimaeus in Jericho, we need to pay attention to the inclusion in the text of the name of the blind man and to the city named as the setting for this incident. These seemingly fleeting details can help us get to the fullest and deepest meaning. The comments of Scott Hoezee pointed me in this direction. Bartimaeus and Jericho, a person with a name and Jericho, a city, with a history, pathways to help us take hold of this story or better yet be grasped ourselves by the story.

Only in the Gospel of Mark are we given the name of the blind man: Bartimaeus. Throughout all the four Gospels the vast majority, indeed almost all of the people healed by Jesus are unnamed, anonymous. In Matthew and Luke's record of this story, the blind man is nameless. That we know here in Mark that this man is Bartimaeus is significant.

Bartimaeus' memory is preserved for us, from his name we even gain knowledge of his father's name! It was this real person, this flesh-and-blood individual, this actual, real human being, that Jesus stopped to help and heal. The people to whom Jesus responded are in the first place actual people, in this case a blind person, a blind beggar, sitting on his own mat, calling out in a loud voice asking Jesus to have mercy on him. Yes by implication we can rejoice in Jesus' care for any and all such persons, but let's never overlook the real person with whom Jesus engages. Quite obviously, blind beggars sitting by the roadside dependent on a coin or two or a crumb or two, were low down the social ladder in Jesus' day. Bartimaeus' number was not on the speed-dial list of any of the rich and powerful citizens of Jericho. No surprise then that when he calls



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out, shouts out, screams out for help, that his totally-sighted neighbors urge his silence. To put it quite crudely and rudely, because that is what happened to him, Bartimaeus is told, "shut your face." "Do be quiet Bartimaeus, don't spoil the moment – don't spoil our moment, our Jesus moment!"

I think it was Alfred Doolittle who told Professor Higgins that only middle-class folks who can afford morality and manners. Blind Bartimaeus has neither, all he knows is his need, and so he keeps on yelling, and yelling, while those around him seek to hush him up.

Bartimaeus is not dissuaded by the rebukes of those around him whom he and we would assume are more able and who presume to speak on behalf of him. Bartimaeus' persistence draws Jesus to him, he persists until his shouts are recognized. Bartimaeus' persistence and Jesus' willingness to approach him release grace and mercy and blessing and change. Bartimaeus having called out to Jesus for mercy, hears Jesus call for him. Then those closest to Jesus echo that call telling Bartimaeus that Jesus wishes to be with him. This ripple of mercy spreads because now those who had previously been telling Bartimaeus to hush, and not bother Jesus are now transformed, their words to the blind man are no longer angry! Their words and their attitude are changed – they say confidently to the one they were just criticizing: Take heart! Be Glad! Stand up! Get up on your feet! Bartimaeus come on, Jesus is calling you!

Now together with Bartimaeus, Jesus gets close, real close and asks, "What do you want me to do for you?" Last week this was the same question Jesus asked of James and John when they came asking for advancement. In response the blind man exclaims "I want to see!" It is the blind man who recognizes who Jesus really is.

- Bartimaeus, the blind man, who did not have a ticket for the Synagogue library where anyone could read the holy books and learn there who Jesus was;
- Bartimaeus, the blind man, who because of his infirmity would have had no opportunity to reflect on faith and meaning with Scribes and Pharisees in the Temple, he is the one who gets it;
- Bartimaeus, the blind man, who wasn't ever invited to anyone's FaithGroup, is the one with the truth.
- Bartimaeus, the blind man, was the one able to see what nobody else could see in Jesus, and in that moment Bartimaeus' full and complete sight was restored, and he set about following Jesus.

The individuals and families whom we seek to serve in our community, some of whom are poor, impoverished and disadvantaged, are people, real people, with names and stories, experiences and feelings. They belong within their family and



within their family history. Those we seek to love and serve and to whom we look to respond in



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the name of Jesus are real people made like us in the image of God. Our faith building upon the foundation of the Jewish tradition is terribly clear that Jesus calls all of this world's lowly, disenfranchised, marginalized, and invisible people to him. It is our calling as the Church of this Jesus to express Jesus' welcome. There is never any debate concerning Jesus' welcome towards the little people. Our response to the least and the last is seriously and fully obvious. All this, I submit, is underlined for us again today in the presence of Bartimaeus' name in this story. More briefly we can also gain something to consider from the location of this incident, in Jericho. The encounter with Bartimaeus is the only time in the gospels when Jericho is mentioned. The Gospel of Luke includes the Zacchaeus incident but both things occur during the one visit of Jesus to Jericho.

In today's reading we heard that Jesus was departing Jericho and Bartimaeus shouted. There is the scene, Jesus is outside of Jericho, outside of the city walls with a large crowd in tow, and there is a lot of shouting going on. And the last time Scripture had us in this location, well, the walls came tumbling down! "Hurray!" we might shout, forgetting or ignoring the aftermath - a scene of terror and destruction, a massacre in which men, women, children, and animals are killed, seemingly at YHWH's direction and intention.

The supposed "holy wars" described for us in our Old Testament present difficulties in our understanding of God. Rightly most of us fail to see any merit in killing done upon Yahweh's direct orders. And so I suggest that in this incident we are seeing a gospel reversal of all this terror. Jesus is the new Joshua, Joshua and Jesus being the same name, one in the Hebrew language, the other in Greek. Jesus, the new Joshua, is outside the walls of Jericho with a large crowd and shouts are heard, and on this occasion this shouting leads to a crumbling of a different set of walls. This time the social walls, between the well and the ill, between the well-to-do and the down-and-out, between the sighted and the blinded, between the doubters and the believers come tumbling down and love and care and mercy spread instead of hatred, violence and murder. With Jesus the result of all the shouting is not a massacre but the restoration of peace. Not destruction and loss but "Shalom" and salvation intrude as the result of the shouts. Sited to be sighted, Bartimaeus is healed, there is hope for all!

In the hymn, "Lead On, O King Eternal," which we sang last week, one verse says:

"For not with swords' loud clashing, nor roll of stirring drums, [but] with deeds of love and mercy, the heavenly kingdom comes."

To be as true to Jesus as we can, the church must stand well apart from any sense of God or God's people engaging in anything like a holy war against those who are different or from far away or seeking refuge or help.

Mark 10 in movie terms is Jericho – The Sequel, or Jericho II. This sequel carries and offers an altogether different message than the original. The meaning, the point, the purpose, the outcome is rooted not in enmity but in love; not in suspicion but hope; expressed not by death but life. In



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the place, Jericho, previously the venue for carnage, a man with a real name, Bartimaeus, is touched by the power of God, by Jesus, God's Christ and Gospel happens, Good News breaks out....."

Stewardship Response: Week Two Update....

As of today, 62 pledges totaling \$197,020 have been received from members and friends of Faith for financial support in 2019. There are another 11 giving units who pledged in 2018 who have yet to make their commitment for 2019. While nothing is certain until a pledge is received, we look forward to their support. Assuming those 11 pledges were at the same level as 2018, we would anticipate another \$23,900 to be pledged bringing the total to \$220,920. It may be of interest to note-

• that of the 51 pledges received from families who also pledged in 2018, twenty were at a level greater than last year (an average of 11.1% higher)

• Eleven pledges were received from families who did not pledge in 2018

This message of sustained and even greater support of the church by its current membership and friends is extremely important to outside parties such as the provider of our new building loan. It also says we understand an expanded church facility will have increased costs of operation. Thank you to all who have and will make a pledge for 2019.
