Seminary at a Glance



Lupercalia survived the initial rise of Christianity but was outlawed—as it was deemed "un-Christian"-at the end of the 5th century, when Pope Gelasius declared February 14 St. Valentine's Day. It was not until much later, however, that the day became definitively associated with love. During the Middle Ages, it was commonly believed in France and England that February 14 was the beginning of birds' mating season, which added to the idea that the middle of Valentine's Day should be a day for romance. The English poet Geoffrey Chaucer was the first to record St. Valentine's Day as a day of romantic celebration in his 1375 poem "Parliament of Foules," writing, ""For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate." Valentine greetings were popular as far back as the Middle Ages, though written Valentine's didn't begin to appear until after 1400. The oldest known valentine still in existence today was a poem written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans, to his wife while he was imprisoned in the Tower of London following his capture at the Battle of Agincourt. (The greeting is now part of the manuscript collection of the British Library in London, England.) Several years later, it is believed that King Henry V hired a writer named John Lydgate to compose a valentine note to Catherine of Valois.

As Chairperson of the Staff Pastor Parish Committee (SPRC) for Seminary Church, I want to share an update on the status of our search for a pastor effective July 1, 2021. First, we were surprised to learn that Pastor Tom Utnage was appointed to another United Methodist Church in the northern conference, however we certainly wish him the best in his future pastoral career. Then a few weeks ago Pastor Keith announced his retirement effective in June 2021. (Pastor Keith came out of retirement to serve our church.) Both Pastor Tom and Pastor Keith have had such a positive impact on our church and we are thankful for their spiritual leadership for the last year and a half. The Seminary Administrative Board considered many factors about the future of our church and ultimately voted to pursue a fulltime pastoral appointment from the conference. This will be a financial stretch for us, however Seminary has such great potential for the future. The Board's vote for a fulltime appointment reflects their belief and commitment to provide the necessary supports for Seminary to reach more people with our ministries. The SPRC is already working with the Conference Superintendent to inform him of our desires and expectations for a new pastor. As we learn more about a new pastoral appointment we will keep you informed.

A Job or a Ministry?

If you're doing it because no one else will, it's a job. If you're doing it to serve the Lord, it's a ministry. If you're doing it just well enough to get by, it's a job. Do We Have as Much Sense as A Goose?

On the premise that by observing God's hand in nature, we can gain some basic truths for ourselves:

This spring when you see geese heading back north for the summer flying in a "V" formation, you might be interested in knowing what scientists have discovered about why they fly that way. It has been learned that as each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.

By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

BASIC TRUTH #1 -- PEOPLE WHO SHARE A COMMON DIRECTION AND SENSE OF COM-MUNITY CAN GET WHERE THEY WANT TO GO QUICKER AND EASIER BY TRAVELING ON THE TRUST OF ONE ANOTHER.

When a goose falls out of formation it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front. BASIC TRUTH #2 –IF WE HAVE AS MUCH SENSE AS A GOOSE, WE WILL STAY IN FORMATION WITH THOSE WHO ARE HEADED THE SAME WAY WE ARE GOING.

When the lead goose gets tired, he rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point. Basic truth # 3- IT PAYS TO TAKE TURNS DOING HARD JOBS, WITH PEOPLE OR WITH GEESE FLYING NORTH.

The geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. BASIC TRUTH #4--IF WE WANT HELP FROM THOSE OUT IN FRONT OF US, WE WILL ENCOUR-AGE THEM TO KEEP DOING A GOOD JOB WHILE BEING CAREFUL WHAT WE HONK FROM BEHIND!

Finally, when a goose gets sick, or is wounded by gunshot and falls out, two geese fall out of formation and follow him down to protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or until he is dead, and then they launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their group.

BASIC TRUTH #4 -- GREAT THINGS CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED WHEN WE WORK WITH AND HELP ONE ANOTHER.

Happy New Year!

It's been a long time since we have been together. I thought I would let you know the food pantry has been helping local residents.

During the outbreak of Covid-19 we had no requests for assistance I think greatly due to the unlimited "offerings" that were available for the asking. The last month has found us quite busy.

Just before Thanksgiving we Hd 5 full turkey dinner donated from a couple that attends St. Joe Catholic Church –Roanoke. These were shared with 5 families from Roanoke school, feeding at least 9 adults and 23 children. We received large food donations from Faith Lutheran Daycare and from the Shop Small Establishments in Roanoke Food Drive.

We received monetary donations from Roanoke Lions Club, Seminary Methodist Women of Faith, Shop Small Establishments in Roanoke Saturday Sales, Amicitia Extension Homemakers Club, and over \$200 in other donations.

For Christmas the food pantry helped multiple families withfood provisions. The THANK-YOUs were overwhelming.

Pleasant Chapel Church and the food pantry have helped a homeless gentleman in great need.

We have helped several families with utility bills to prevent disconnection due to unemployment.

As churches open to normal services, I would like to do mini food drives at each of our churches for the pantry:

January-March paper products like toilet paper, paper towels, dinner napkins, foil, sandwich bags

April-June Cleaning supplies like dish soap, face soap, hand soap, Windex, bleach, laundry detergent, Mr.Clean

July-September canned fruit and condiments

October- December baking supplies and cereal


In closing, I miss you all !! Those of you who are basking in the sun – have a safe trip home.
