Jodi Miller Joins Board of National League of Cities

Freeport Mayor Jodi Miller was recently named a board member of the National League of Cities. She joins 25 other new board members each serving a two-year term. Miller was interviewed for the honor in November and will attend her first meeting by Zoom on January 17. In March, she will go to Washington, D.C. for a quarterly in-person meeting.

In her new role, Miller will have the opportunity to network with other mayors, influence legislation, and advocate for and protect the interests of communities like Freeport. She says that this is a great opportunity to learn about best practices, benchmark other cities, and open doors for Freeport. Miller is excited to participate and eager to bring innovative solutions back home for consideration.

The National League of Cities, which began 100 years ago in 1924, is an organization of nearly 3,000 local leaders focused on improving the quality of life for their current and future constituents. Members represent the country's almost 20,000 cities, towns, and villages along with 49 state municipal leagues. Miller has been a member of the organization for several years and has also been active in the State Municipal League.

Moderow Receives Award from the National Audubon Society

Highland Community College biology instructor Juliet Moderow recently received the National Audubon Society's William Dutcher Award recognizing outstanding volunteers. Moderow is active with the local Northwest Illinois Audubon Society and has been a board member in different capacities over the past 10 years, including a two-year term as President.

At the National Audubon conference in Colorado, Moderow said she was proud to represent the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society. Says Moderow, "I am humbled by the honor because the work I have done in the community is something I truly enjoy — teaching people of all ages, color, abilities, and identities about the beauty of birds. I am very appreciative of this recognition and hope it can inspire others to do similar work."

Related to diversity and inclusion, Moderow has worked to increase a sense of belonging and accessibility to birding for anyone and everyone. The birding community has historically lacked diversity and in connection with her work as Co-chair of the Highland Diversity Committee, Moderow implemented equality and diversity initiatives during her time on the local Audubon board.

Initiatives she developed include making binoculars available for check out at the Freeport Public Library, youth events, programs at nursing homes and independent living housing, starting a bird club at the Freeport Boys and Girls Club, developing accessible bird outings for individuals with physical disabilities, and helping Freeport become one of the first of three Bird Cities of Illinois, a state program she also helped develop.

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## **Controlled Forest Burns**

Several local residents were alarmed a few weeks ago when smoke billowed up from the Oakdale Nature Preserve. The smoke was in the air for quite some time, but there was no need for concern. These fires had been set intentionally as part of the Freeport Park District's forest management master plan.

Bruce Cubberley, Superintendent of Parks & Natural Resources for the Freeport Park District, confirmed the importance of controlled burns in ensuring that the popular 134-acre park is a healthy forest environment.

Cubberley said that a controlled burn, replicates what happens in nature, when lightning causes fires that get rid of what is essentially fuel, on the forest floor. This fuel consists of live underbrush, invasive plants such as buckthorn, branches, and leaf litter. While leaf litter can decay pretty quickly, branches and undergrowth can take too long and damage the ecosystem by smothering other plant growth. Burning also eliminates nuisance plants more quickly like garlic mustard and speeds up the nutrient cycle, encouraging wild flowers and other desirable forest plants to grow stronger.

For those worried that the fire seemed to be smoldering for a long time, Cubberley explained that the amount and type of debris determines the duration of the burn. When there are a lot of branches, actual wood, and live underbrush, and not just leaves, the smoldering lasts longer. Those working the burn, carefully observe the entire area until they are sure there will be no flame-ups and are always equipped with water and other fire protections.

To learn more about controlled burns, the Northwest Illinois Forestry Association is hosting a seminar on the subject on January 27 at the Galena Center for the Arts. The speaker is Gillian Moore, conservation ecologist and United States Forest Service wildland firefighter. A Drone video of a local woodland prescribed burn will be shown and discussed at the seminar. Moore is also an artist and a related art exhibit will be open to the public on Sunday, January 28 from 1 to 4 pm at the Galena Center for the Arts.
