Highland ag program success

Agriculture is one of the most important businesses in Stephenson County and Highland Community College is helping to ensure its positive future. At a recent College Board retreat, full-time instructors Justin Ebert and Monica Pierce reported that enrollment in agricultural programs increased from 182 in 2017 to 395 in 2024. Over the past several years about 750 high school students have also been enrolled in Highland Ag courses through the dual credit program.

The various programs represented in Highland Ag include transfer and non-transfer degrees. Currently, over 60% of Ag students are on the bachelor's/transfer pathway, although the trend is shifting slightly toward applied science programs including Ag Science, Ag Business, and Crop Science and Technology, as well as the new cannabis certificate program.

Phase one of a sub-surface irrigation project on the plots is being completed this winter as part of a proposed two-year initiative which includes the construction of a storage building. The gradual expansion of the 55-acre HCC Ag Research Plots is on land shared with University of Illinois Extension.

Stephenson County Clerk recognition

Stephenson County Clerk and Recorder Jazmin Wingert was recently recognized by Fidlar Technologies, a vendor who provides software for vital records such as birth information and land records. She was named the new clerk of the year, out of 13 in the state of Illinois, due in part to her focus on digitizing land records.

Jazmin also signed up the most veterans for the company's honors awards program. This program provides incentives for veterans to get discounts at local businesses in participating counties. Congratulations, Clerk Wingert!

Housing Authority update

The Housing Authority of the City of Freeport is a federally subsidized, not-for-profit program, offering safe, secure housing for eligible low-income individuals and families. To clear up some recent potential confusion, the Brewster and Hosmer buildings have <u>not</u> been purchased by Ansonia, a Chicago-based multiple-family property management and construction company.

Both of these buildings were part of the Rental Assistance Demonstration rehabilitation program, or RAD, from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, also known as HUD. This program funded remodeling in 2016 and 2017 and the investor handling the initiative chose the Winnebago County Housing Authority to manage these Freeport buildings.

However, in mid-2023 the Winnebago County Housing Authority handed management back to the Housing Authority of the City of Freeport, who in turn voted to retain Ansonia to manage the two buildings since they are not sufficiently staffed for the task. The decision was strictly a Freeport Housing Authority decision; the City has no jurisdiction over Housing Authority actions. The City serves only to appoint commission members.

The Freeport Housing Authority owns 196 rental units ranging from one- to five-bedrooms in three developments around Freeport. The only Freeport buildings that are managed by Ansonia are Brewster and Hosmer. The rest of the buildings are managed by the Housing Authority.

Open house for nursing careers

FHN and Highland Community College in Freeport are holding an open house for Highland's Certified Nursing Assistant or CNA program for individuals interested in becoming a CNA to talk with students and instructors from Highland's Nursing and Allied Health programs as well as representatives from FHN.

The event will be held from 2 to 5 pm on Wednesday, February 21 at the Ray and Betty Stamm Health Science Nursing Wing of HCC's Natural Science and Health Center in Building N, as in nursing.

Candidates can register for the CNA program that night. Staff will be available to help with financial aid, placement testing, and any paperwork necessary to get started and new students could begin classes as soon as March 11.

Freeport Pretzel men's basketball standing in NIC-10

Freeport High School's young men's basketball team is showing major improvements this season and could be a top team in the NIC-10.

Last year, the team's record was 7-11 and they finished in seventh place in the Northern Illinois Conference, or NIC-10. This year, the Pretzels have been in second place for most of this season.

The Freeport Pretzel Varsity Team has two freshmen who play a major role in the team's success. Kazion Moorehead starts for the team and helps make an impact with his playmaking and tough shots. Isaiah Baker comes off the bench and leaves a mark on the game in rebounding and scoring in the paint. Dedric Macon, a senior this year is one of the team's leaders and has been a major success story officially scoring 1000 points earlier this year. Only a handful of people in the NIC-10 have accomplished this goal.

Assistant Principal Reuben Cooper has been watching the NIC-10 games for a long time and he's impressed with how well the team plays together. Coach TJ Jackson said the team wants to compete for a NIC-10 championship and are making strides to do that this year.

The Pretzels will play in the Illinois High School Association regional tournament this month.

United Way Community Impact Grants process opens

The application process has opened for Requests for Proposals, or RFPs, for the 2024-2025 Community Impact Grants from The United Way of Northwest Illinois (UWNIL). The RFPs are for Education, Financial Stability, Health, and Basic Needs in Stephenson, Jo Daviess and Carroll Counties. Funding will cover the period of July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025. In 2023, United Way funded over \$247,000 towards local Community Impact Initiatives.

Community Impact RFP application forms will be available online at the United Way's website until March 10th, 2024. The grants are open to previously funded United Way Partner Agencies but in addition to the RFPs, the United Way will be accepting Letters of Interest from programs that have not received funding in the past. Letters of Interest are also available at the website.
