Remember: Your vote COUNTS!

The counting may not yet be finalized but by next week's newscast the election will be over so today is our last opportunity to remind you that your vote COUNTS!! Early voting for the November 2024 election continues Monday through Friday from 8:30 to 4:30 p.m. through Election Day, next Tuesday November 5th, at the Stewart Centre at 50 W Douglas Street in downtown Freeport. This Saturday, November 2nd, you can also register or vote in person from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

As a point of electoral history for Stephenson County, in the 1860 Presidential election the County's voters cast 2,670 votes for Abraham Lincoln while his opponent, Stephen A. Douglas, received 1,787 votes. Lincoln received almost 60% of the votes cast. Your vote counts!

Water extension still under consideration

The City of Freeport is still debating an estimated \$1 million water extension on the city's west side. One property in the proposed addition is Open Bible Learning Center. Since 1999, the school and daycare for about 200 students haven't had a working sprinkler system to protect against fires.

In May, a State Fire Marshall inspection called for Open Bible to connect to the city's water main and meet 2024's building code. The decision to extend the main awaits city council decision, which if not reached will be decided by a judge. At a recent City Council meeting, the Council heard from the public on the topic, including representatives from Open Bible and childcare advocates.

During the meeting, Freeport Mayor Jodi Miller said that this is no different than a street project and that need for City water at Open Bible and other buildings along the extension should be treated the same as any other part of the City's need to provide this utility.

Following further discussion, City Council members arrived at a proposal to include an advisory referendum putting the water main extension in the hands of Freeport voters in the April 2025 election. This proposal failed 2 to 6 in a Council vote, returning the decision to the responsibility of the Council, ensuring that the topic will be one of considerable discussion in the weeks to come.

More City news

In other news from the City, tax funding road improvements also began to be distributed to the City of Freeport in October, and the City's 2025 Budget will see the benefits.

You may have noticed that hydrant flushing is underway around the City, and it will continue until November 8th. If you see rust-colored water in your home, make sure to let your water run for 5 to 10 minutes before using it. More information can be found on the City's Facebook page.



News from Highland Community College

The Highland Community College board recently approved a number of new positions and salary ranges, as well as approving several new full- and part-time positions including career pathways navigator, testing services staff, a human resources generalist, learning management systems administrator, and manager of career services. Highland Foundation Director Dan Dick reported that the recent golf outing for the Leadership Forum was a great success.

Also at the meeting, a memorandum of understanding was unanimously approved between Highland and the Highland Foundation, the city of Freeport, and the Freeport Park District that commits each of these entities to a \$333,000 contribution toward the completion of a city-wide "bike and hike" trail. These contributions will enable these local entities to qualify for a \$4 million matching grant.

Celebrating Native Americans

This Saturday, November 2nd, get a look into Native American Culture at a special free two-part event.

A morning presentation by Kim Sigafus will provide an overview of Native American History and Culture, and will be held at the Freeport Public Library from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Authentic Native American refreshments will be offered at no charge during a break in the presentation.

People attending should bring folding lawn chairs and wear comfortable shoes.


Career Fair next Thursday

Trees for Freeport

A group of concerned citizens recently banded together to help the City of Freeport live up to its Tree City title.

As you can see on a drive through town, Freeport's tree population took a big hit when the invasive ash borer infiltrated the area and killed the majority of the city's ash trees. Thousands were cut down, and few have been planted to take their place.

With encouragement from members of the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society and Ken Beach, local tree advocate, the city, led by Street Superintendent Pat Ingram, secured a grant that provided 108 potted trees. Unfortunately, the trees arrived at a poor time for planting, but resourceful city employees devised a plan to keep them watered and maintained, and most of the trees survived the long wait to autumn when they could be properly planted.

The trees were planted in September, in locations chosen by the city: vacant lots, water retention areas, the composting facility, and the new water tower area. Volunteers were sought to get the trees in the ground, and Ken -- along with Ted Odendahl and his YIELD group, who works through the Boys and Girls Club in Freeport – signed up for the job. They planted a variety of species -- oaks, evergreens, magnolias, and American beeches, among others – and then YIELD did a follow-up watering the next week.

It is a small victory for local tree enthusiasts, who hope the city will continue to seek out creative ways to plant more trees to beautify our community and add green space that benefits our air quality. Many citizens believe that opportunities exist to plant additional trees in some of the right-of-way areas where the old ashes were removed, but the seemingly simple task is complicated by challenges with utilities, sidewalk repairs, and street issues in some neighborhoods. Other communities have a more aggressive replacement policy than Freeport, including some that plant multiple trees for every one removed.

Laura Dufford, Conservation Chairperson of the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society, hopes that more people get involved, suggesting that they contact their alderperson to encourage more tree plantings in the city.

The article also mentioned the Oakdale Nature Preserve as a perfect escape for outdoor recreation with a serene setting spanning 133 acres of hickory and oak woodlands and winding trails for pleasant trekking adventures. The average home price was stated as \$120,000.



The event will feature Alana face painting, a fire show by Rod, and a musical performance by the 16-person group Banda Arpereńa at 10:00 p.m. Attendees are welcome to bring flowers and photos of loved ones who've been lost and candles are allowed. House of Wax (1953) – Vincent Price stars in a film about revenge and jealousy.

The Raven (1963) – Boris Karloff and Vincent Price in a film about wizards trying to best each other. Peter Lorre as the Raven.

The Tingler (1959) – This film is worth it only to hear Vincent Price say "The Tingler is in the theatre." The only actor who could get away with that line without being mocked.

The Blob (1958) – Stars Steve McQueen. Worth watching just to see McQueen, but definitely better than the follow-on remakes.

The Innocents (1961) – Based on "The Turn of the Screw" (1898), this film is a gothic psychological horror picture about a governess who is driven to insanity by the two children she was hired to supervise. Deborah Kerr and Michael Redgrave.

The Village of the Damned (1960) – A sci-fi horror film in which the residents of a small British village suffered mass unconsciousness, and seven months later, all the women of the village give birth on the same day. He children all look remarkably alike and can communicate through telepathy.

Tremors (1990) – Kevin Bacon and Fred Ward – witless humans versus monsters in the Nevada desert.

Contagion (2011) – Matt Damon, Kate Winslet, and Laurence Fishburn. Honestly, this is the scariest film I have ever seen. When I saw it in 2011, I was haunted by the story line—until 2020.



Cat People (1942) – This atmospheric supernatural horror film uses shadowy visuals depict a woman who turns into a panther to stalk her victims.

The Thing from Another World (1951) – Scientists at a remote Arctic research station are threatened by a hostile interplanetary being they find frozen in the ice.

Them (1954) – Irradiated creatures found in the New Mexico desert threaten the general populace until the final, epic battle in the L.A. storm drains.

Invasion of the Body Snatchers (1956) – Extraterrestrial spores, assume human form, create nearly perfect people duplicates, and quietly take over a small California town.

The Haunting (1963) – This scary horror film depicts a small group of people who are invited by a paranormal detective to investigate a haunted house.

Night of the Living Dead (1968) – This realistic, landmark film follows seven people chased and trapped by reanimated corpses and popularized modern zombies.

Play Misty for Me (1971) – Clint Eastwood directed and stars in this psychological thriller about a radio disc jockey stalked by an obsessed female fan.

The Exorcist (1973) – This controversial movie about a young girl's demonic possession and her mother's attempts to rescue her was critically acclaimed.

Halloween (1978) – Considered one of the most influential horror films ever made, it is set in what could be anyone's neighborhood in any hometown.

Alien (1979) – Setting new standards for science fiction horror movies, this story features an alien creature tormenting the crew of a spaceship.

Young Frankenstein (1974 comedy) -- As a respected researcher and physician, Dr. Frederick Frankenstein, the grandson of the more famous Dr. Victor Frankenstein, who did experiments on bringing back the dead, tries to disassociate himself from his more famous relative, even to the point of pronouncing their surname differently. Regardless, Frederick is drawn back to the small Transylvanian town and castle where Victor conducted his experiments, leaving behind his somewhat "untouchable" fiancée, and becomes drawn into his grandfather's research. As Frederick tries to reanimate a dead subject with the help of his hunchbacked aide Igor and his beautiful assistant Inga, rumors abound in the town of what he is doing and the townspeople try to stop him. Hocus Pocus (1993 comedy) -- 300 years have passed since the Sanderson sisters were executed for practicing dark witchcraft. Returning to life thanks to a combination of a spell spoken before their demise and the accidental actions of Max, the new-kid-in-town, the sisters have but one night to secure their continuing existence. Stars Bette Midler, Sarah Jessica Parker, and Kathy Najiimy

The Mummy (1999 adventure) -- English librarian Evelyn Carnahan becomes interested in starting an archaeological dig at the ancient city of Hamunaptra. She gains the help of adventurer Rick O'Connell and along with her brother Jonathan they set off, unaware that another group of explorers are interested in the same dig. Unfortunately for everyone, this group ends up unleashing a curse which been laid on the dead High Priest Imhotep. Now 'The Mummy' is awake and it's going to take a lot more than guns to send him back to where he came from. Stars Brendan Fraser, Rachel Weisz, John Hannah, and Arnold Vosloo.

Arsenic and Old Lace (1944 comedy) -- Mortimer Brewster is a newspaperman and author known for his diatribes against marriage, but in the opening scene he is getting a marriage certificate at city hall. Now all that is required is a quick trip home to tell Mortimer's two maiden aunts. While trying to break the news, though, Mortimer finds out his aunts' hobby; killing lonely old men and burying them in the cellar. It gets worse. Stars Cary Grant, Priscilla Lane, Peter Lorre, Josephine Hull, and Jean Adair.

Van Helsing (2004 supernatural adventure) – Monster hunter Van Helsing is in the world to rid all evil, even if not everyone agrees with him. The Vatican sends him and his ally, Carl, to Transylvania. They have been sent to this land to stop the powerful Count Dracula. While there they join forces with a Gypsy Princess called Anna Valerious, who is determined to end an ancient curse on her family by destroying the vampire. They just don't know how! Stars Hugh Jackman and Kate Beckinsale

Death Becomes Her (1996 dark comedy) -- When a novelist loses her man to a movie star and former frenemy, she winds up in a psychiatric hospital. Years later, she returns home to confront the now-married couple, looking radiant. Her ex-fiance's wife wants to know her secret, and discovers that she took the same potion which grants eternal life to the person who drinks it as she herself already has taken.
