Local elections are coming up on Tuesday, March 19th and to help listeners make informed decisions, FREEPOD developed a quick way to catch up on where candidates stand on issues that impact our community. At the end of this podcast, after our weekly stories, we're presenting short interviews with candidates in contested races only.

Our format is 5 Questions in 5 Minutes, and each of the candidates is asked the same questions so that you can compare their responses apples-to-apples in just five minutes. Here are the questions:

- 1. What skills would you bring to this office that would make you an effective Stephenson County Board member?
- 2. If elected, what is the most important issue you would want the Board to address?
- 3. Why is this issue important to County residents?
- 4. What steps would you recommend the County Board take to resolve that issue?
- 5. What is one thing that voters may not know about you that you'd like them to know?

This week you'll hear from the two Democratic Party candidates for Stephenson County District F, which includes Waddams Grove, McConnell, Winslow, and much of Lena. The candidates are

- Robin Rosenstiel
- Wanona Wellspring Ceisel

Freeport Community Public School Fund gives \$75,000 of supplies to District 145 educators

The Freeport Community Public School fund granted nearly \$75,000.00 worth of educational supplies and tools to Freeport School District 145 educators in the last quarter of 2023. Recipients submitted requests, and gifts were granted through the annual allocations process.

A not-for-profit organization, the Freeport Community Public School Fund was created to help supplement learning for all district students in all grade levels. Items typically purchased include Chromebooks, software, musical instruments, globes and maps, science equipment, graphing calculators, and more.

Monetary donations from generous supporters make these gifts possible. To date, over \$1.3 million in necessary supplies and equipment has been given to the educators in District 145. To donate or for more information, go to the Freeport Community Public School Fund website.

Freeport Police Department Officers recognized

Freeport Police Officers Brandae Hilby and Conor Greene received distinguished honors at a recent City Council meeting.

Hilby was selected as the City Employee of the Year and also previously was named Officer of the Year for the Police Department.

Greene received the Lifesaving Award for his actions at an accident scene in early February where he helped remove a driver from a burning vehicle after a collision at West Avenue and Fairgrounds Road near Wal-Mart.

Highlights from Highland board meeting

At a recent meeting of the Highland Community College board, President Chris Kuberski highlighted enrollment increases for three consecutive semesters. Vice President of Finance Jill Janssen reported a 2% increase in community college budgets by Gov. Pritzker while also cautioning that it will impact individual colleges in different ways.

HCC Foundation Director Dan Dick announced that the Foundation is funding a new access road at the HCC farm and discussed potential funding for an Athletic/Events Center, which FREEPOD will report on in more detail soon. Fundraising efforts so far have yielded \$25,000 for HCC, with potential for a larger donation for Fine Arts.

Board approvals included a unanimous acceptance of a five-acre gift, bids for a new parking lot, building renovations, lighting replacements, and electronic tuition payment software.

Highland also recently announced that a \$150,000 grant had been received to help dual-credit students take advantage of the Career Pathways program coordinated with North Illinois University. Kuberski suggested that a Career Pathways coach may be funded with some of the monies from the grant. It is hoped that dual-credit offerings can be further expanded into western parts of Highland's district.

New VP sought at Highland

In other Highland news, the Board voted in January to accept the resignation of Sam Adgasi, Vice President of Academics. President Kuberski reported on the formation of a search committee to find a replacement for Adgasi. A search firm will narrow the field to the final candidates, including assembling "personality profiles" on each candidate to better assess their working style. Interviewing is expected to start in March with the selected candidate beginning duties at the beginning of the fiscal year on July 1.

The Board thanked Jim Phillips for taking on interim Academic Vice-Presidential duties in addition to his normal duties as Humanities, Social Science and Fine Arts dean and co-director of the Leadership Program. President Kuberski also praised Phillips for his efforts in completing Highland's annual Illinois Community College Board report.

Aquin and Orangeville girls' basketball co-op

After news broke of the second failed vote to deny a co-op between Aquin and Orangeville girls' basketball, a firestorm began burning up social media. Anger, frustration, and questions all poured out from the Aquin fans.

The vote taken within the conference was 13-7 but 15 yes votes were needed to approve the merger. It was the second vote on the proposed co-op after an earlier one in January also failed. The significance of the vote is that Aquin girls who want to play basketball next year now will have to transfer to another school to continue their high school athletic careers.

There are surely many reasons for the no votes by the conference schools, but none have been shared publicly. Also unknown is what action Aquin, parents of students, or others may take in response to this. The one thing that is certain is there will be no Aquin girls playing basketball next season, and sports have always been important at Aquin.

FREEPOD will have updates on the impact of this story in the coming weeks.

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs visits United Way

Illinois State Treasurer Michael Frerichs visited Freeport last Friday on a fact-finding mission at United Way of Northwest Illinois.

Frerichs' office oversees the Illinois Charitable Trust, which awarded a \$15,000 grant to United Way in 2022. He said that the goal of his visit was to get ideas on how to improve the program in different areas of the state. It is a pleasure to get out and see people who are making the work happen," said Frerichs.

The local United Way grant ended in June 2023 and fund care packages to 272 seniors in Stephenson, Jo Daviess and Carroll counties. The packages were filled with healthy groceries complete with recipes, as well as personal hygiene and household products. Frerichs said he was impressed by the way United Way used volunteers extensively through the project, especially to deliver the care packages.

United Way Executive Director Connie Kraft was pleased to share her insights with Frerichs and is eager to apply for an Illinois Charitable Trust grant again. Said Kraft, "We were able to offer fresh foods to seniors, which was huge as many told us that was rare for them. We already have bigger and better plans for our next grant."

Non-profit organizations in Illinois with budgets of less than \$1 million can apply for Illinois Charitable Trust grants to support food, housing, or job skill development. The grant application period is currently open. Interested non-profit organizations can apply through the Illinois State Treasurer's website.

Next week, the Freeport High School theatre department will present its annual Art to Art series of one-act plays on March 14, 15, and 16 at 7 pm in Room 228 at the high school. This unique initiative is totally student-run and one of only a few similar programs in the state. And it might sound like theatre week in Freeport because we have one more theatre event coming up! The play LEAVING IOWA will be presented at the Ferguson Fine Arts Theatre at Highland beginning tonight, March 7th, and running through Saturday night, March 9th.

An outlandish take on the classic family road trip, Leaving Iowa is the story of a writer who returns home to find a final resting place for his father's ashes. When he discovers his childhood home is now a grocery store, he travels across Iowa searching for a proper resting place for his father. LEAVING IOWA starts at 7:30 p.m. all three evenings and tickets are on sale now at \$12 for adults, \$10 for seniors, and \$5 for students.

To end on a really positive note: Spring is indeed on the way! According to the local chapter of the Audubon Society, Canada geese are already starting to return as bird migration begins in earnest.

Some of the earliest migrants are waterfowl. Watch for White-fronted Geese and Tundra Swans, which were observed north of Freeport in the Wetlands Preserve on the west side of Highway 26 in early March last year. Both of these species are just stopping by on their way to their nesting grounds in northern Canada.

To identify them, know that White-fronted Geese have a similar posture to Canada Geese. However, they are somewhat smaller and have an obvious different color pattern on their heads. Both swans and geese are often seen in a back-end up head-down-in-the water-position as they find their food.

If you go to look for them a pair of binoculars will be helpful, and please be careful turning off and on to busy Highway 26.
