New internet provider coming to town

As part of its goal to ensure access to high-speed internet in every home in Freeport, the Freeport City Council has approved easements for Surf Internet, a new internet provider for the City. Surf is planning to build out the Freeport utility Right of Ways with a fiber duct and internet system that will provide more competition in Freeport to enable options for lower cost and faster speed internet services.

In order to build out the local system, the internet provider needs locations at three City-owned properties where the junction boxes will be placed. These locations are on Burchard Avenue in the water tower area, on Park Blvd. at Park & Laurel, and on Walnut Avenue. The service will be open to every address in town and Surf Internet provides up to four different packages, along with options for low-income residents. Even with the necessity of underground installation, the new service could be half the cost of other internet providers in town while providing faster internet. The total build-out is anticipated to take about two years.

Other internet options for Freeport residents include JCWIFI, Frontier Internet, Aero, and national cable providers like Comcast -- also known as Xfinity – and satellite providers like DISH. Competition is nearly always good for consumers, so we're happy to welcome Surf Internet!

\$400,000 for road safety comes to Freeport

Congressman Eric Sorensen (IL-17) and the Department of Transportation are announcing \$400,000 for the City of Freeport to study ways the community can increase traffic safety.

The funding is being awarded from DOT as part of its Safe Streets and Roads for All grant program, also known by the acronym as SS4A, which helps communities across the nation address roadway safety. This grant program will allow the City of Freeport to conduct a study on ways to implement safety-

specific infrastructure projects. As part of this round of funding to communities across the country, Freeport earned the second highest SS4A grant award in the state of Illinois.

Sorensen said, "Bringing tax dollars back home to invest in infrastructure is one of the best ways we can make our neighborhoods safer and more sustainable. I'm proud to join the Department of Transportation to announce this critical investment in Freeport that that will help the City improve its roads and protect drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians."

We'll report more on this as plans are confirmed.

HCC International Athletes

We are all familiar with the concept of international athletes coming to the United States to study and master their sport, but you might not be aware that Highland Community College has 35 such student athletes this year.

Jeyson Polanco is one of them. From Santiago, Dominican Republic, he plays shortstop on the Highland Cougars baseball team, the same position as his favorite all-time player, Jose Reyes – also a switch hitter, also from the Dominican Republic.

He admires his coach, Chance Sharp, and has great memories from his two years at HCC. He looks back on the first game of this year, played at Roane Community College in Harriman, Tennessee, as a special moment. "I hit two home runs and had eight RBIs, including a Grand Slam to help us win the game. It was exciting!" he shares. Highland's baseball team finished the season with a record of 24 wins and 25 losses, with a 12-3 record at home. They completed Region 4 postseason tournament play with a loss on Saturday.

Jeyson says his dream is – and we quote him -- "baseball, always." He has played since age 6, and was thrilled to get the opportunity to come to Highland. Enthusiastic about the school and the Freeport community, he says, "I love Highland. It feels like a second home to me now. Of course I miss my family – my dad, mom, and brothers. But I like the quiet and peaceful town. And I will always remember the people here, especially Rhonda Perry, who was like a second mom to me."

His favorite class at Highland was speech, which he credits for helping him hone his English skills. His favorite new American food? The Chipotle bowl (which is, obviously, delicious)!

Of course, there are things Jeyson misses about the DR – fried plantains among them, which he will enjoy when he visits home this summer. When he returns to the United States, he will transfer to his new college, Faulkner University in Alabama, as required by his visa. "I wish I could stay here longer," he says. It's very sad to leave, but I plan to come visit and am excited to keep on following my dream."
