Do drink the water!

It's been estimated that almost half of the nation's tap water is contaminated with one or more types of the chemicals known as per- and polyfluorinated alkyl substances, or P-F-A-S, commonly referred to "pee-fahs", according to a study completed last August by the U.S. Geological Survey.

Known as "forever chemicals", the more than 12,000 types of PFAS are widely used, long lasting chemicals which break down very slowly. They are found in many different consumer, commercial, and industrial products, in a variety of food products, and in the environment. They are also found in the blood of people and animals all over the world.

Scientific studies have shown that exposure to some PFAS in the environment, water, and food may be linked to harmful health effects in humans and animals.

That's the bad news.

The good news is that Freeport has some of the cleanest water in northern Illinois, thanks to forward thinking by the Water and Sewer Department.

Randi Kohlbauer, Environmental & Regulatory Compliance Officer at the Department, says "Freeport is actually sitting in a really good spot as far as being ahead of the ballgame on this one. We started abandoning potentially contaminated wells before EPA was really even starting to monitor PFAS".

Only two old, shallow wells that serviced Freeport drinking have ever tested positive for PFAS and those were put on standby since the new well Number 11 on south Burchard Ave. came online last fall.

The wells that currently supply Freeport's drinking water, Numbers 8, 9, and 11 are all free of PFAS chemicals. The old "standby" wells are to be used only for firefighting flows or after a catastrophic failure of any of the main wells and will be permanently put out of service once another new well, Number 12, is constructed, which will probably happen in 2026.

FREEPOD also notes that in the first large-scale peer-reviewed investigation of PFAS in U.S. bottled water in 2021, PFAS were detected in nearly half of bottled water products. Reverse osmosis-treated water contained less PFAS than other bottled water products, but it's good to also remember that you're likely drinking microplastics that can leach from plastic water bottles, to say nothing of the fact that it takes about 500 years for those bottles to decompose.

So - DO drink the tap water in Freeport!

Teacher receives Golden Apple nomination

Eugene Calingacion, a teacher at Jones Farrar, an International Baccalaureate World School Elementary school in Freeport, was named a finalist for an Illinois Golden Apple Award.

A highly competitive award process resulted in the selection of 30 Pre-K to 3rd-grade teacher finalists from throughout the State. The Golden Apple Awards for Excellence in Teaching honor outstanding teachers for having lasting, positive effects on students' lives and school communities. In both their teaching and results, teacher finalists demonstrate significant, positive impact on their students' growth and learning. The final 2024 Golden Apple Award recipients will be announced later this spring.

Arbor Day Foundation Names Freeport A 2023 Tree City USA®

Freeport has been named a 2023 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation to honor its commitment to effective urban forest management. The community also received a Tree City USA Growth Award for demonstrating environmental improvement and an outstanding level of tree care.

Freeport achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: maintaining a tree board or department, having a tree care ordinance, dedicating an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and hosting an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation, in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters.

According to the Arbor Day Foundation, the trees being planted and cared for by Freeport are ensuring that generations to come will enjoy a better quality of life. Additionally, participation in this program brings residents together through volunteer engagement and public education.

The Totality: A First-Person Eclipse Story

Several folks from the Freeport area traveled to other parts of the Midwest to experience the recent solar eclipse in totality. In other words, they were in in locations on the path of the eclipse where the sun was completely blocked out for several minutes. Julie Hilliger, one of FREEPOD's reporters, sent us a first-person report of what that was like. We thought it was great, so in her words...

"Natural phenomena intrigue me and I truly do love and respect the beauty of our environment. So, on April 8th, I was in my sister's southern Illinois backyard, witnessing the total solar eclipse. We were


lucky enough to escape the crowds gathered 12 miles away at Garden of the Gods State Park and throughout the Shawnee National Forest. With eclipse glasses perched on our noses, we watched Mother Nature's show from 12:44 p.m. when the moon first began obscuring the sun until the moon departed at 3:18 p.m.

"The sun appeared thinner and thinner and then a hush fell as totality neared, which is unusual for us. Reverence seemed appropriate. All at once, the sun and moon were aligned, and the sight was mesmerizing. Seeing the dark sun surrounded by the glowing ring of light and red solar prominences was more than I expected.

"It was oddly like two layers of twilight, similar to about 9 p.m. in July up high and then at ground level, dark enough for the street lights to come on, which they did. The temperature dropped from 76 degrees to 69 and was noticeable.

"Ironically, the most stunning view to me emerged as totality ended. When the moon began to slip away, the sunlight burst from the bottom, creating a brilliant beam of light. It took my breath away to go from dark to light. From photos, I knew what totality would look like, but I was not expecting this surprise. It was the cherry on top. I am grateful to have witnessed this total eclipse and hope to see the next one in the U.S. in 2044 when I will be 80 years old. Remember, you are never too old to see the natural beauty all around you."

Cicadas are Coming

First it was the eclipse, and now it is the cicadas! Have you heard the buzz?

Yes, folks, cicadas are coming, and they are coming in much larger numbers than usual. Millions are expected to hatch in northern Illinois, emerging from the ground where they spend most of their lives in the soil, feeding on tree roots.

In May and June, the cicada convention will begin. In this area, we have Annual cicadas that come every year. But Periodical cicadas are what we are talking about here. They are some of the longest-lived insects on earth, with either 13- or 17- year life spans.

This year, both broods hatch at nearly the same time – a very rare occurrence that will be once in a lifetime for most people. It occurs just once every 221 years – so the last time these two broods emerged together was in 1803. To give you perspective, Thomas Jefferson was President of the United States then, and Lewis and Clark were about to start their exploration of the Louisiana Purchase.

Brood 13, which is on a 13-year cycle, will be more prevalent in our area, while Brood 17 will be seen in central and southern Illinois, along with several other states. Central Illinois may have an overlap, where some researchers say there could be BILLIONS of cicadas. They are harmless, so even in large numbers they pose no danger, except occasionally to young trees. Some people wrap cheesecloth or fine mesh netting around the trunks and branches to prevent damage where the eggs are laid.

When cicadas hatch, they swarm on trees and you hear the familiar noise – from a quiet background buzz to a cacophony of summer sound. This year it will be even louder, and, according to Dr. Jonathan Larson, an extension entomologist and assistant professor at the University of Kentucky, "You should expect lots and lots of cicada exoskeletons to be covering your trees and shrubs. You should also expect to hear lots and lots of noise."

And don't freak out if you see your dog eating a cicada as a canine appetizer. "It won't hurt them," says Larson, "and dogs aren't the only ones tempted to nosh on cicadas; people have eaten them for thousands of years. They have kind of a natural, sweet nut flavor." Others say cicadas taste like cold asparagus!
