Don't FLiRT with COVID!

As many listeners have heard, the coronavirus that causes COVID is notorious in its ability to mutate into new variants. The latest mutations are actually a sequel to the omicron variants from previous years and have been nicknamed FLiRT variants based on the technical names for their mutations, one of which includes the letters "F" and "L," and another of which includes the letters "R" and "T."

Since everyone's experience with COVID is different and influenced by a number of factors, it's difficult to quantify how many are experiencing more acute symptoms now compared with previous infections. Anecdotally, people are surprised at the extent of illness they have encountered from the latest subvariants. Symptoms have included recurring fever, elevated sinus pressure and headache, extreme

sore throat, and body-shaking chills. Others, though, have reported only mild symptoms that feel like seasonal allergy flare-ups.

Locally, there seems to have been an uptick in the number of COVID cases over the past few months, according to Margaret Kochsmier, infectious disease nurse specialist at FHN. However, the specific variant of the virus is not identified in all cases so it is difficult to determine if the FLIRT variants are a problem in this area. The national Centers for Disease Control (CDC) currently identifies Stephenson County as an area of low COVID prevalence. Due to common use of at-home COVID testing, actual case counts are difficult to determine.

Unfortunately, it seems that COVID cases will be with us into the foreseeable future. They key to avoid serious illness is to stay up to date on COVID vaccines. Remember, vaccines do not prevent infection but ramp your immune response to infection and greatly reduce the severity of symptoms, the risk of severe illness, hospitalization, and death from COVID. Updated COVID-19 vaccines will be available from Moderna, Novavax, and Pfizer later this year.

The biggest risk factors for severe COVID infections are still lack of current vaccination, advanced age, and co-morbidities like obesity, smoking, and type II diabetes.

Sound Thinking expands

If you've noticed tall metal towers in a number of locations throughout Freeport and wondered what they are, here's an update. They're gunshot detection towers that "listen" for gunshots and report them within just seconds to the Freeport Police Department. This can lead to quicker location of

threatening situations and gunshot victims, and their precise responses improve evidence collection for future use.

The Freeport Police Department is looking forward to soon be receiving expanded coverage of SoundThinking, the shots-fired platform that was initially implemented a few years ago. This technology allows officers to respond and investigate shots fired more effectively and efficiently. Freeport Police Chief Chris Shenberger said the expansion of Sound Thinking here almost doubles the coverage in the City that previously existed.

Sarah Buchmann, Beautiful at HCC

When Sarah Buchmann was cast in the lead role for Highland Community College's 49th Summerset production of the Broadway show *Beautiful – The Carole King Musical*, she knew it would be a memorable experience – for many reasons. But she kept one of them a secret.

She was excited about playing singer/songwriter Carole King, and she was especially thrilled to do it on the stage of Highland Community College. Her grandfather, the late Mike Dobbins, was the theater director at the Ferguson Fine Arts Center for many years in the 1970s and early 80s. Mike, who many of our listeners might remember, is often credited with helping to establish Highland's strong program, and Sarah is proud of her grandpa's legacy.

However, when Sarah auditioned, she never shared she had a Dobbins connection. "I was honest about my past theatre experiences and minor roles on stage," says Sarah. "What I left out was that my grandfather, Mike Dobbins, had taught at Highland and was the director of theatre there. Summerset was his baby. I didn't want to come into the program as a legacy. I wanted to earn my spot – and not feel like I'd gotten into the program based on family history. I wasn't expecting a lead role or really anything in particular, but I felt great about my audition and was really trying to manifest something for myself this summer."

Some of her fellow cast members – including Erin Schraeder, Ben Skipor, Addison Cross, and Ky Eckert – eventually noticed that she always sat in the same spot in the house, right in between the seats with her grandparents' names on them, and Sarah did finally share her history with the show's director Randy Haldeman after the very last show. "I wanted him to know what this show meant to me," she said. "There's the family tie, there's Carole's importance in my life, and I felt so grateful for this experience and the opportunity to work with such amazing, talented people."

Sarah's grandmother, Gail Dobbins, and mom, Melissa Dobbins Buchmann, were incredibly proud of Sarah, and thrilled to be back in Freeport for the show. Melissa grew up here and also performed on the Highland stage, and Gail was involved with costuming, marketing, and design for various productions before the family moved in the early 80s. Mike Dobbins directed Summerset shows from 1975 to 1982, including productions such as *Carousel, Godspell*, and *Showboat*, starring the famous William Warfield --who sang the iconic song "Old Man River" in the Hollywood production of *Showboat* and came to Freeport as a special guest, joining the cast at Dobbins' request.

Thank you to Sarah for sharing her very personal experience... and thanks to Highland Community College for decades of dramatic excellence!

Sarah Buchmann, Beautiful at HCC

I had done some shows in high school, along with theatre classes, jazz band, and being involved in show choir. But when I saw that HCC was going to be doing *Beautiful*, I was super excited. Carole King's music has been a huge part of my life for so long. For years, I watched *Gilmore Girls* religiously, and I never skipped the opening credits as "Where You Lead" is one of those songs that just makes your heart feel full. When I joined my college a cappella group, our yearly audition song was "One Fine Day", and it was a constant piece in our performance sets. Last December, I turned to "Will You Still Love Me?" to get me through relationship struggles and finding a sense of purpose (both Carole's version and Taylor Swift's!). I turned to the *Tapestry* album to get me through the rest of the winter and when I found out that Summerset would be putting on *Beautiful*, it just felt like fate.

I auditioned somewhat on a whim. It had been about 6 years since I had been in a show, and about 10 years since I'd had even a speaking line – my roles in show choir and musicals had always been in the ensemble, and my only "speaking" role was when I was 14 in my high school's production of *Leaving lowa*, as the Civil War reenactment tour guide and a waitress. So, not much. That being said, as a teacher at Freeport Middle School, I've also been heavily involved with the musicals we've put on there. Both *Moana Jr.* and *Aladdin Jr.* were passion projects of mine and Cheri Crawford – she directed and I assistant directed, helped with music, and choregraphed. It's not like I've been out of the theatre scene – I've just been backstage.

During the audition, I was honest about my past theatre experiences and minor roles on stage. What I left out was that my grandfather, Mike Dobbins, had taught at HCC and was the director of theatre there in the 70s and 80s. He had been highly involved with the Summerset program for years with my grandmother Gail Dobbins. Summerset was his baby. I didn't want to come into the program as a legacy. I wanted to earn my spot — and not be caught up in the politics of nepotism and feeling like I'd gotten into the program based on family history. I wasn't expecting a lead role or really anything in particular, but I felt great about my audition and was really trying to manifest something for myself this summer.

As the show progressed, I let a few of my SUPER talented cast members know how much the show meant to me. Some of them had noticed that I always sat in the same spot in the house – right in between the seats with my grandparents' names on them. It felt like when I sat in the theatre, they were right there with me. Or, with the renovations happening at HCC, some of the old show placards were out in the hallways – the one for *Show Boat* was on top, which was a show that all members of the Dobbins side of my family were involved in, from my grandparents to my uncles. And when we entered the dressing rooms to do makeup, my grandmother's collages of pictures and programs showcased my grandfather, my grandmother, and several other actors and faces I'd known from their stories. My seat in the make up room was always next to where my grandfather could see me. When I got up on stage for rehearsals, I always looked to his seat in row D. I'm not one to believe in guardian angels, but it felt like he was watching me.

I did (finally) tell my director, Randy Haldeman, about my grandfather after the very last show. I didn't want him to think any less (or more?) of me, but I did want him to at least know what this show meant

to me. There's the family tie, there's Carole in my life, and there's the thrill of having my very first starring role after a 6 year hiatus from acting. I felt so grateful for this experience and the opportunity to work with such amazing, talented people. I could not be more proud of the people beside me on stage, particularly Erin Schraeder, Ben Skipor, Addison Cross, and Ky Eckert. I would not have been able to get through the last 7 weeks without them! And, of course, my friends and students who came out to support me. I think the funniest part of being a part of this production was the audience response to Carole's mother's final line at Carnegie Hall, "Can you believe she wanted to be a *teacher*?" For those who know me and the pride I take in my career as a teacher, it was absolutely hilarious and always got a big laugh. But ultimately, I am so glad to be a part of the theatre community again, and I can't wait to continue working with the Summerset program.
