A record number of members bought themselves new planes for the holidays.



Left, Nick Tocco's Freewing F-5 Tiger II is painted in Navy Top Gun desert opposition force colors. The VF-111 "Sun Downers" squadron was an aggressor squadron flying out of Key West, Florida.

Seeing it fly was a flashback moment for the Editor, who once lived within sight of Miramar.

This is another 80mm EDF. There are two of these at the field, now, and they both bounce down the runway like porpoises when they land.

They're working on a fix for that bad habit.

Right, Tyler Pangerl with his F-105. Like the F-5, it's an area-ruled fuselage, otherwise known at the "Coke bottle" shape.

This is a Freewing PnP. It currently costs only \$129. It has a 64mm EDF, but Tyler had to do some carving to get enough air to the fan.





Left, Gary Johnson's Freewing Saab JAS39C/D Gripen in Czech Air Force 211 Tactical Fighter Squadron colors. It's one of those special color schemes for the NATO Tiger Meet.

This is a PnP 80mm EDF. The canards are fully functional. The wing doors give full coverage for better aerodynamics and scale acccuracy.

Right, Bill Nelson's Hangar 9 Ultra Stick is a 60-inch PnP hot rod.

Bill flew it on a buddy box with Doug Allen, and they identified some issues. The plane yawed to the right on takeoff. Putting in some washers on the right side of the engine mount largely solved that problem.

The plane also bounced a lot on landing. Bill hopes that switching to Du-Bro low-bounce wheels, in a larger size, will fix that.

It is a powerhouse. Bill observed, "It's not like my Cessna 150."



Left, Joe Fimbres shows off his new Freewing A-4 E/F Skyhawk. It's an 80mm EDF. Joe has his in Marine Corps VMF-311 Tomcats colors.

Joe loves to have lots of magnetic removable parts to play with, and this model has plenty of them. The ECM hump is removable, so it switches between the E and F models easily. Those are AGM-12 Bullpup missiles on the outer hardpoints.

The manufacturer rates the skill level as "Intermediate." The pressure is on, Joe!
