### **Scale Detail**



This is a closeup of Keith Koppos's exquisite, scratchbuilt, RAF Bristol F2 fighter plane. Look at that stitching. No iron-on coverings here.

Notice the small size of the red dot inside the roundel. That is correct for the period.

The very light blue on the outer ring, however, is controversial. The black-and-white orthochromatic film used during the WWI period tended to render blues very light. Consequently, the shade of the outer ring of the RAF roundel during WWI was in dispute.
