Membership (by Corley Anne Byras)

Recently I attended a conference in Philadelphia where one of the sessions was on membership. For most organizations and groups, obtaining new members is a huge problem. And if you only get one small idea from my notes, it will be worth the sharing.

- 1. Go for the goal Set a defined goal to increase membership for the next year. Keep the goal in forefront of members and regularly remind members of the goal. Graciously praise progress. Spotlight efforts of individual members and give them credit.
- 2. **Leverage members' personal relationships.** Encourage members to reach out to their friends and relatives.
- 3. **Incentivize your members to recruit.** Offer gift cards to individuals for each new member they bring in.
- 4. **Invite prospective members to join in a service event.** Show them how they will give back to their community with like-minded friends. Show fun and group pictures after and ask people to comment on what they enjoyed about the day.
- 5. Create a membership campaign to focus efforts

 -All hands on deck. Develop a brochure showing
 what your chapter does for its community, fun shots
 of members working together. And make certain the
 members have copies of it to share.
- 6. Create a listing of potential members. These could be invited to functions open to the public and then invite them to join. And follow up. Potential members do not always join right away, but are interested. Stay consistent and contact again.
- 7. **Make it clear to potential members** *What's in it for me?* Opportunities you provide ... giving back to your community, being part of something greater than yourself, networking/socialization, learning new skills. *What's in it for me?* is probably what potential members most want to learn.
- 8. **Keep it positive/resist the naysayers!** Always ensure there is networking/social time. Get to know your members' interests and skills. Set a norm that everyone says *hello* and welcomes someone new. Have them invite the person to sit with them. Make it a goal to protect new and younger members from *drama* at least the first years. When negativity occurs, model with reframing using empowering language.
- 9. **Build name recognition.** Newsletter have both a paper copy and e-newsletter. Brand your message. Focus on social media, facebook website, newspapers, posters. Do something, as we'll not succeed if we don't try.
