

Book Review

Little Lodges on the Prairie: Freemasonry & Laura Ingalls Wilder Paperback – Published July 27, 2014 – book review by Stacy Anthony.

Laura Ingalls Wilder is perhaps best known for her book series *Little House on the Prairie*. The tales told in these volumes became even better known when the series was adapted for television, running from the late 1970's to the early 1980's, and starring Michael Landon and Melissa Gilbert.



Wilder's stories of a rugged life on the American frontier appeal to people from all walks of life and different generations. Less discussed, however, is how Wilder's own life helped to influence the series, including her family's deep involvement in Freemasonry and the Order of the Eastern Star. *Little Lodges on the Prairie* takes a deep dive into this topic, providing an excellent resource on how Freemasonry shaped the author's life.

Laura and Caroline Ingalls were both members of the Order of the Eastern Star. In fact, Laura herself served as Worthy Matron no less than three times. The book does a fantastic job of documenting the involvement of both the Ingalls and Wilder families involvement in the Craft, including the organizations with which they were affiliated, the offices they held, and examples how committed they were to the Fraternity.

Of particular interest are the scanned copies of minutes and other documents supporting the research, giving the reader a first-hand opportunity to see the source material. The book is also filled with pictures of places and mementos, really helping the story to come to life.

The only down-side for a Fraternal reader is that the book does spend some significant page space discussing what Freemasonry and the Order of the Eastern are. This might be a frustration for some, but we are reminded that not every reader is familiar with our Fraternity and may need some background information. This is a small price to pay for such a well-crafted and documented piece of historical research.

As we all find ourselves with more time on our hands due to current events, we heartily recommend this book to our members. It's an enjoyable read that helps us to see the influence of the Order of the Eastern Star on a piece of popular culture that is quite familiar. For this reviewer, it certainly helped to rekindle my love of our Order and makes me want to learn more.

Heroines Wore Different Hats

Although in the Order of the Eastern Star we can't wear visible hats in the chapter room so that nothing is between us and our God, we all wear a variety of hats as we go through life. All of us have worn the hat of a son or daughter. Most have worn the hat of a sister or a brother and perhaps a mother or a father. We wear the hat of a cook, the chauffeur, the maid, the bread earner, the homemaker, and all have worn the hat of being a friend. The heroines of our Order also wore may hats, but we remember them especially for the hats of a daughter, the widow, the wife, the sister, and the mother.

Adah enjoyed the love of her father and family. It was the custom of that time for men to make a vow, and to keep the vow. Jephthah, her father, made a vow, and to keep him from dishonor she gave her life. In every generation, men and women have made vows and broken them. But there have been men and women who kept their vows in spite of all adversities. And in keeping the faith untarnished they have brought to human experience the glory of immortality. Adah wore the hat of a daughter.

When Ruth went with Naomi back to her homeland she left her relatives and friends to go into a strange land among strange people. After she left her kindred she became a gleaner in the harvest fields of Boaz. His love for her and her marriage to him brought about a new family. Out of that union was born Obed who was the father of Jesse, her grandson. Her great-grandson was David. And from that branch of Jesse of the House of David came Jesus. Perhaps the love and devotion that Ruth had for Naomi was handed down through her line into the life of Jesus. Ruth wore the hat of a widow.

Esther's love for her people was stronger than her love for her own life. When she appeared before the King to plead for the lives of her people, she knew if the King saw fit he could put her under the sentence of death.
