Love is at the center of our lives. Sometimes it may be hard to see, but it's there. It may appear to be slow to arrive at times, but it's there. Ever present, love often comes with a lesson that will help us at a later point in time.

In His Word, God reminds us that love is patient and kind. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. (1 Corinthians 13:7-8) Because of our trust in God's Word. we can count on love to be in the midst of every solution to the problems that we encounter on our journey down the pathways of life. We have to affirm that every life has value, that indeed we are our brother's keeper and recall that we are charged by God's Word to concern ourselves with the welfare of others. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. (Philippians 2:4)

## Black History Spotlight



Dr. Samuel P. Massie
Scientist/Educator

Born on July 3, 1919 in North Little Rock, Arkansas, Samuel Proctor Massie was as one of the few African American scientists to work on the Manhattan Project during World War II.

Massie graduated from Dunbar High School in Little Rock at the age of 13. At age 18, he earned his Bachelor's in Science and was Summa Cum Laude from the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff in 1937. With a scholarship from the National Youth Administration he earned a Master's Degree in Chemistry at Fisk University in 1940 when he was only 21 years old. Massie said his desire to find a cure for his father's asthma spurred him to become a chemist.

While completing his doctorate in chemistry at Iowa State University in 1942, he lost his draft deferment. When he was about to be drafted in his home state of Arkansas, his major professor at Iowa State, Henry Gilman, who was already working on the Manhattan Project, assigned Massie to his research team. Massie performed his research at Iowa State University from 1942 to 1946 where he helped in the development of uranium isotopes for the atomic bomb.

In 1946 Massie completed his doctorate in Organic Chemistry at Iowa State University and accepted a one year position at Fisk before becoming a member of the faculty at Langston University in Oklahoma. While there he worked to transform his department and by 1953, he was not only a full professor and chair of his department, but also president of the Oklahoma Academy of Science. Massie was the first African American to hold this distinguished post.

By the early 1960s Massie had held leadership positions at the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C. and at Howard University. From 1962 to 1966 Massie was President of North Carolina College at Durham. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson appointed Massie to the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland where he became the first African American professor at the institution. Massie also created the Academy's Black Studies program.

In 1998, Massie was named one of the 75 greatest chemists of all time, by the journal Chemical and Engineering News.

Samuel Proctor Massie died in Laurel, Maryland on April 10, 2005. He was 85.

## When You're Overwhelmed, Stand Strong

Put your trust in the LORD your God, and you will stand your ground. Believe what his prophets tell you, and you will succeed. (2 Chronicles 20:20 GNT)

When you focus on your problems instead of trusting God, you're going to end up exhausted. And you're going to be defeated because God didn't design you to fight your battles alone. You don't have the power you need to face every problem in your own strength. You need God's power.

You can't focus on your problems and focus on God at the same time. You've got to shift your focus to who God is and what he's promised to do for you.

Life is full of experiences that test you, drain you, and wipe you out. When you are worn out, that's when you're ready to say to God, "I'm sorry. I can't handle this situation, and I've tried everything. I need to give it to you because it's bigger than me."

So, what should you do when you are overwhelmed? You stand strong.

Standing strong is an attitude of quiet confidence in the character of God. You will be successful when you put your trust in what he says to you through his Word and the Holy Spirit. When you get with God, you'll never have to give up ground because you are standing strong.

When the burden is overwhelming, you may be tempted to cave in under the pressure. God doesn't want you to back down from difficult situations. He doesn't want you to sacrifice your integrity. Have you ever noticed what a farmer does? A farmer works very hard to get his crop ready for harvest time. He has to plow the field and get the dirt all ready to plant the seeds. Once the ground is tilled and ready, then the seeds are planted. During the growing process, the farmer makes sure that the plants are being taken care of. The crop is sprayed for bugs and types of mold and watered when there is little or no rain so that the plants are not destroyed. It is a very time consuming job. There is a lot of time that will go by before the farmer will ever see a return on the work that was done. Once the crop is ready, the pumpkins are picked so that the farmer can sell them to make money. He finally gets to see a reward on his pumpkin patch harvest.

This is kind of like how it is with us. God trains us and teaches us the Word of God. This may continue on for years, but you will reach a point to where you are able to plant seeds of salvation for others. You will be able to help win lost souls, encourage others to come to church, teach Sunday School or help do something else that profits God's kingdom. Your harvest is when you win those lost souls or when you are teaching and bringing others closer to Jesus Christ.

We all have something we can do for God. We need to put some work into it first with God's help and He will help you with your harvest. From Scripture and experience we know that the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. In terms of numbers, there are plenty of believers to complete the task of sharing the Gospel with others in the world, but many are unwilling to enter the harvest field.

### THINGS WE KNOW ABOUT THE HARVEST:

- It is plentiful. Even here at Lincoln.
- It belongs to Jesus. Jesus died so that everyone could be in the harvest. Those that aren't don't belong to Satan so the workers are just trying to reclaim what already belongs to Jesus.
- It has few workers. In spite of the fact that there are at least ten nonbelievers for each evangelical.

### THINGS WE KNOW ABOUT THE WORKER:

- Jesus must be Lord (as opposed to savior) of the worker.
- The worker has authority.

### THINGS NEEDED FOR THE WORK:

- 1. To be filled (led by) with the Spirit. (Luke 24:49)
- 2. A life of prayer. Prayer plows the ground for the seeds of the harvest. Sowing on hard ground sometimes works but we need to plow it with prayer. God is calling us to elevate the importance and the priority of prayer. We must have faith to believe God is going to do something. This is how we get the authority, through this faith. If we don't have the faith, then ask God for it. When we pray for someone's needs and God begins to move in their lives, they become much more likely to accept him. Relational evangelism is the best kind, but it has a weakness. Its weakness is that it does not require anything. We just keep hanging out and building the relationship and never really introduce the person to God.

- 3. **Knowledge of the Scriptures.** We need to understand Scriptures well enough to witness, but not to be an expert. We will be asked questions that we can't answer. That's OK. We should not use lack of knowledge as an excuse.
- 4. **Willingness to announce the Kingdom.** If we can see the harvest, we will be willing. If we can't see the harvest we should pray that God makes us see the harvest.

#### **RESPONSES THE WORKER CAN EXPECT:**

- Rejection
- Reception
- The joy of Jesus


A person who does not support the following four beliefs is probably not going to participate in the harvest:

- That the Bible is the only basis for faith and the Christian life; and
- That evangelism and mission are important aspects of a believer's life.
