Black History Spotlight



Maynard Jackson, Jr. Politician/Economic Empowerment

The great-grandson of slaves, Maynard Holbrook Jackson, Jr., was born in Dallas, Texas, on March 23, 1938. His father, Maynard Holbrook Jackson, Sr., was a leading figure in the 1930s campaign for Black voting rights in Dallas and a founder of Democratic Progressive Voter's League in 1936. His mother, Irene Dobbs Jackson, was a professor of French at Spelman College who desegregated the Atlanta City Library System. When Maynard was seven his father, a clergyman, moved the family to Atlanta, Georgia, where he assumed pastorship of the Friendship Baptist Church.

After graduating from Morehouse College in 1956 with a BA degree in Political Science, Jackson attended law school at North Carolina Central University where he earned a JD Degree Cum Laude in 1964.

In 1969 Jackson was elected vice mayor of Atlanta. On October 16, 1973, at the age of 35, he became the first African American to be elected mayor of a major southern city.

He served three terms as Atlanta's mayor, first from January 1974 to January 1982, and later from January 1990 to January 1994. During this time he presided over the inception of Atlanta's rapid transit system and the expansion of its airport.

He had a reputation for an uncompromising confrontational style, but - for many Black Atlantans, as well as upwardly mobile African Americans who flocked to the city from other parts of the country - he ushered in a new era of economic opportunities that dramatically expanded Atlanta's Black middle and upper classes.

One major challenge of his leadership was that of healing the wounds opened by the horrific Atlanta child murders in the early 1980s. Also, although political ally Andrew Young was mayor of Atlanta during the 1996 Olympic Games, Jackson is widely credited with bringing them to the city.

On June 23, 2003, at age 65, he died of a stroke at Washington's Reagan National Airport. Atlanta remembers Jackson with two major public facilities: the Southside Comprehensive High School, which was renamed the Maynard Holbrook Jackson High School in 2008; and the Maynard H. Jackson International Terminal, which opened at the Jackson-Hartsfield International Airport in 2013.



Are You Ready to Break Out of Your Rut?

A woman was there who had been subject to bleeding for twelve years . . . When she heard about Jesus, she came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, because she thought, 'If I just touch his clothes, I will be healed.' Immediately her bleeding stopped and she felt in her body that she was freed from her suffering. (Mark 5:25, 27-29 NIV)

The Bible tells a story in Mark 5 about a woman who had bled for 12 years. Her condition made her ceremonially unclean in Jewish culture, which meant she had no social life, no interaction with others. She had spent all her money trying to get well. Can you imagine how lonely and desperate she must have been?

One day she hears that Jesus Christ is coming to town. She says, "If I can just touch his robe, I'll be healed." So she takes the initiative and makes a daring act, pushing her way through the crowd to come up behind Jesus and touch the back of his robe. She is instantly healed!

Jesus recognizes the touch of faith. He asks, "Who touched me?" People are pressing all around Jesus in this crowd. The disciples are sometimes a bumbling group, so Peter asks him, "What do you mean, 'Who touched me?' Look-everybody's around you and you say, 'Who touched me?"

But Jesus knows the difference. The woman comes to him in fear and trembling and says, "I did, Lord." And he says, "Daughter, your faith has made vou well."

This woman, desperate in life and bold in faith, took the initiative. She broke the rules. She went beyond the boundaries. She decided she was ready to begin again and committed herself to action. She pressed ahead and got through the crowd, and because she took the initiative, her act of faith led to her healing.

Faith can lead to the same kind of miraculous outcome in your life. When you're stuck in a rut, faith overcomes procrastination by helping you "get it in gear." It gives you the power to take the initial step that will move you forward to where God wants you to be. No more being indecisive and waffling back and forth. No more sitting on the fence.

When you grow in faith, you'll learn to take the initiative and discover more of your purpose in life.

Learning to love like God takes a long time and takes God's help. It's easier to love than to hate, so have lots of fun learning to love God and everyone around you!




