God Favored Me

It was an ordinary day. I left home as usual on my way for another day of work. It had rained earlier in the morning and the roads were still a little wet, but traffic was moving along nicely on Highway 70. Nearing the end of my commute, I observed that I was approaching the familiar intersection of Highway 70 and Alexander Drive. It's usually pretty busy during this time of the morning and it has several lanes and turning lanes. I also noticed that a vehicle in the same lane that I was in was stopped at the intersection, even though the light was green. A second or two went by and the vehicle still had not moved so I pressed my brakes to slow down. Another second or two and the vehicle ahead of me still had not moved. I was travelling in the right lane and a car was in the lane to my left so I pressed my brakes harder to slow my car. Then it happened.

My car was slowing down, but it wasn't stopping. I was skidding. My car wasn't slowing fast enough and for some reason the vehicle was still at the light. What's going on I wondered. The light's green I shouted. Approaching the vehicle in my skidding car, I veered into the right turning lane to avoid hitting it in the rear. Oh no, I'm still skidding I shouted. Suddenly I found myself skidding right into a portion of the intersection that is typically full of moving cars.

In the twinkling of an eye, I saw the concrete median that separates the eastbound and westbound lanes on Alexander Drive. I looked into the eves of a man in a vehicle on the other side of the median and our thoughts united in one horrible vision of me crashing into him. Oh Lord I yelled! Then it was over. My car stopped. The median had served as a Amazingly, there were no other cars in the lanes at that time.

Realizing the blessing that I had just received, I sat there for a moment and with my foot still on the brakes said a prayer. Thank you Lord I shouted! At that same moment, the vehicle that had been stopped at the intersection passed by me. More cars passed by me. The driver on the other side of the median drove off. In

commute, none of them were able to appreciate the extraordinary event that had just unfolded for me.

I said another prayer, checked my mirrors and pulled off. God favored me

was all that I could think of as I realized that the outcome could have been very different if I had arrived at the intersection just a few seconds later.

Indeed, God did favor me. Experiences like the one I just described are dramatic and serve as powerful illustrations of the favor, grace and mercy that God extends to us. But if we think about it, there are plenty of other less dramatic examples that illustrate God's favor. What situation did God bring you through? What hope did He restore when all seemed lost? What way did He make when it seemed as though there was no way at all? What path did He light to help you on your way as you stumbled through the dark? Search the memory banks of your life's experiences and you're sure to find instances where God favored you as well.

If we trust and believe His Word, then it should not surprise us when we are on the receiving end of God's favor. In His Word. God tells us that He will never leave or forsake us (Hebrews 13:5), that His Word will light a path for us (Psalm 119:105), and that He will give us the desires of our hearts (Psalm 37:4). He wakes us each day with a gentle finger of love and allows us to take a "closer walk with thee" on a road designed to give us favor in the end. For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord. "They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope. (Jeremiah 29:11 NLT)

God loves us. During this month, we barrier and stopped my car's momentum. will acknowledge His greatest act of love as we reflect on the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. This singular act of giving His Son to die for our sins set us up for favor. Our job is to show love and appreciation in return, to study His Word and to reverence Him above all things. And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Black History Spotlight



Septima Clark Educator/Civil Rights Activist

Septima Poinsette Clark is perhaps the only woman to play a significant role in educating African Americans for full citizenship rights without gaining sufficient recognition. She was born the second of eight children in Charleston, South Carolina, to Peter Poinsette, a former slave, and his wife Victoria Warren Anderson, a laundress. She graduated from Avery Normal Institute in 1916.

She married a Navy seaman, Nerie Clark, in 1919. The couple's first child died in infancy. A son was born in 1925, but her husband died shortly after.

Due to segregation, she taught in rural segregated schools throughout South Carolina. She earned a Bachelor's degree from Benedict College in 1942 and a Master's degree from Hampton Institute in 1946.

Clark not only taught young students, but she held informal literacy classes for adults. Although abolished decades earlier, a lingering aftereffect of slavery was that many Blacks still could not read or write. As a result, they were often denied the right to vote because they could not pass the literacy tests that were presented to them when they would try to vote. She also pushed an education and equal rights agenda in numerous organizations such as the YWCA, Federation of Women's Clubs, Council of Negro Women and the NAACP.

In 1956 when South Carolina banned membership in the NAACP, Clark lost her teaching job and pension when she refused to comply. Hired by Myles Horton, she became Director of Workshops at the Highlander Folk School in Tennessee. When this program was absorbed into the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), Clark and her cousin Bernice Robinson created the first Citizenship School to educate Blacks in literacy, state government, and election procedures.

Traveling throughout the South, Clark trained teachers for citizenship schools and assisted in SCLC marches and protests, working with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Andrew Young. Dr. King acknowledged Clark when he received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 by insisting that she accompany him to Sweden.

She wrote two autobiographies outlining her nonviolent philosophy - Echo in My Soul (1962) and Ready from Within (1986).

Septima Clark continued to serve as a Civil Rights advocate, educator and leader until her death in 1987.

Health Safety

Our topic this month is Health Safety, and the topic is right on time with all the issues that our community has had to deal with thus far this year. Our community has had to come to terms with senseless killings, natural disasters (flooding, hurricanes), the McDougald Terrace carbon monoxide poisoning, and now the Coronavirus pandemic.

We, your Health and Wellness Ministry, feel that the best way to deal with any problem is first to be knowledgeable about the issue. That is why we try and provide you with the most up-to-date data that is available on any topic that affects our members, and our community. We try to make that information readily accessible to every member of our congregation. We try hard to capture and summarize that data in a way that everyone can gain knowledge from the presentation. We provide you with handouts, put up posters, put information in the newsletter, vestibule and put it on the church monitors. This information is provided for you to read at your leisure.

Our second goal is to eliminate fear, instill trust, and keep our members safe, and healthy. We simply want to remind our members of things that we have been taught such as good hand hygiene, respiratory hygiene/cough etiquette and now social distancing of six feet, avoid large crowds of ten or more, and stay at home if you are sick. If everyone follows these rules and suggestions, they should stay safe.

We realize that the world that we live in is constantly changing and our goals are to keep our members up-todate on the current health issues that may affect our congregation.

2020 Census - Counting On You!

National Census Day - April 1, 2020

Everyone in the Lincoln family is encouraged to participate in the 2020 Census. Census questionnaires have been distributed and the airwaves are filled with commercials urging participating. The Black/African-American community has been historically undercounted in previous census counts. With your help, we can ensure that the undercount does not reoccur. (Special thanks to those who have already completed the census!)

What's At Stake?

- FAIR REPRESENTATION: Every 10 years, the results of the Census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets. The consequences of the next election will last an entire decade. Fair representation starts with an accurate census.
- **REDISTRICTING:** After each Census, state officials use the results to redraw the boundaries of their congressional and state legislative districts, adapting to population shifts.
- ECONOMY: Higher numbers mean that businesses can make better decisions on investments and development in our communities, which equates to more jobs.
- ◆ EDUCATION: A complete count provides more funding, which will in turn benefit our children and our workforce development. Funding for Head Start, Special Education, and Title 1 Grants to school districts are direct recipients of federal funding.
- ♦ **HEALTH CARE:** Lives will be saved based on an accurate count. There is a direct relationship between the census and access to healthcare, Medicaid expansion funds, and the reduction of healthcare costs for everyone when fewer people are uninsured.
- INFRASTRUCTURE: With more funding we will see safer roads, less traffic and better access to jobs.

Instead of Worry, Remember What God Has Done

With God everything is possible.

(*Matthew 19:26 NLT*)

When you're facing tough times, worry is a natural human response. But, instead of worrying, God wants you to worship. One way you can worship God is by believing who he is and what he can do.

In the book of 2 Chronicles, King Jehoshaphat and Israel found themselves in a tough spot. Three enemy nations were on their way to make war against them.

Though he was afraid, the king's first response was to gather his people to pray. He stood before the whole nation and prayed aloud. His prayer is a great model to show you how to pray when you feel stressed out and overwhelmed.

First, when you pray during a stressful time, remind yourself of who God is. Focus on his strength, character, and power. God can handle anything, including whatever you're facing right now.

In Matthew 19:26, Jesus says, "With God everything is possible" (NLT).

King Jehoshaphat knew this is true. He reminded himself of it as he prayed, "Are you not the God who is in heaven? You rule over all the kingdoms of the nations. Power and might are in your hand, and no one can withstand you" (2 Chronicles 20:6 NIV).

The king's enemy was coming against him. But he chose to take his eyes off the problem and instead put his eyes on God's strength and power. He reminded himself of who God is.

After you remember who God is, remind yourself of what he has done. Remember when God has helped other people and when he has helped you. Recalling those things will give you confidence that God will handle whatever you are facing.

When King Jehoshaphat prays, "Did you not drive out the inhabitants of this land before your people Israel?" (2 Chronicles 20:7 NIV), he's remembering when Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt to the Promised Land.

Jehoshaphat reminded himself of when God had helped Israel drive out enemies before. That gave him confidence that God will do it again.

What are you worrying about today? Instead of worrying, spend some time in prayer, remembering who God is and what he has done. Believe he can handle whatever you're facing.

HAPPY EASTER SYMBOLS

Easter eggs & baby chicks - Eggs and chicks symbolize new life. Eggs have been a symbol of spring since ancient times. An egg also is a symbol of the rock tomb out of which Christ emerged when he arose again. The chick, hatching out of the egg, symbolizes new life or re-birth.



Easter bunny - The rabbit, or hare, was a symbol of abundant new life in ancient times, and reminds us of spring and new life.



Easter Lilies - The white blossoms symbolize the purity of Jesus. Lilies, emerging from the earth in the spring, also symbolize new life and the resurrection of Christ.



The lamb - Represents Jesus, "the Lamb of God".



The cross - Symbolizes Jesus' victory over death.



Palm branches - Represents when Jesus arrived in Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday and people waved palm branches, welcoming him.



Easter hats & wearing new clothes for Easter-Symbolizes new life offered through the death and resurrection of Jesus.



Hot Cross Buns - Hot cross buns have a cross of icing on the top to remind people of Christ.



Candles - Symbolize Jesus, "the light of the world".



Pretzels - A food eaten during Lent - the twisted shaped symbolizes arms crossed in prayer.



Easter & Spring flowers - Daffodils and tulips bloom in the spring, and symbolize spring and new life.



Baby animals- Baby animals born in the spring also represent spring and new life.



The Butterfly is one of the significant symbols of Easter. Its whole life cycle is meant to symbolize the life of Jesus Christ. The first stage is the caterpillar, which stands for His life on Earth. Second phase begins from the cocoon stage, portraying the crucifixion and burial of Jesus. The third and final stage is the butterfly, representing His raising from the dead in a glorified body and peace.


