### Black History Spotlight

Historically Black Colleges and Universities Series



#### **Grambling State University**

The story of how Grambling State University came to existence is one of resilience. Like many public HBCUs, early administrators were determined to succeed amid formidable odds. This mindset of success manifested an impressive gallery of accomplished alumni across a spectrum of industries and professions.

Grambling State University opened on November 1, 1901 as the Colored Industrial and Agricultural School. It was founded by the North Louisiana Colored Agriculture Relief Association, organized in 1896 by a group of African-American farmers who wanted to organize and operate a school for African Americans in their region of the state.

In response to the Association's request for assistance, Tuskegee Institute's Booker T. Washington sent Charles P. Adams to help the group organize an industrial school. Adams became its founding president.

In 1905, the school moved to its present location and was renamed the North Louisiana Agricultural and Industrial School. By 1928, after becoming a state junior college and being renamed the Louisiana Negro Normal and Industrial Institute, the school began to award two-year professional certificates and diplomas.

In 1936, the curriculum emphasis shifted to rural teacher education; students were able to receive professional teaching certificates after completing a third academic year.

The first baccalaureate degree was awarded in 1944, in elementary education. In 1946, the school became Grambling College, named after P.G. Grambling, the white sawmill owner who had donated the parcel of land where the school was constructed. In addition to elementary educators, Grambling prepared secondary teachers and added curricula in sciences, liberal arts and business, transforming the college from a single purpose institution of teacher education into a multipurpose college. In 1949, the college earned its first accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

In 1974, the addition of graduate programs in early childhood and elementary education gave the school a new status and a new name – Grambling State University. The university expanded and prospered between 1977 and 2000. Several new academic programs were incorporated and new facilities were added to the 384-acre campus, including a business and computer science building, school of nursing, student services building, stadium, stadium support facility and an intramural sports center.



### Change Your Thoughts, Change Your Life

Those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace.

*Romans 8:5-6 (NIV)* 

You haven't been sentenced to a life of frustration and stress. You don't have to be stuck in your hurts, habits, and hang-ups. God has something far better for you.

We all want peace and freedom - and the good news is it may be closer than you think.

The Bible teaches that, for those who follow Jesus, peace is a mindset. If you're not at peace, it's your choice.

In the next few months, the economy more than likely won't change. Your work situation won't change. Your broken relationships may not get healed.

But your mindset can change. That will be the difference between a life of self-destruction and a life of peace.

The Bible says in Romans 8:5-6, "Those who live according to the flesh have their minds set on what the flesh desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. The mind governed by the flesh is death, but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace" (NIV).

Ask the Holy Spirit to give you better thoughts thoughts that bring peace, not frustration. You need to look at your situation differently: in the Holy Spirit way.

Will you look at your life the way you've always looked at it, or will you look at it the way God does? Remember, the "mind governed by the flesh is death." Choosing to look at your situation through your own lens is self-destructive.

Ask the Holy Spirit to replace the self-destructive thoughts with his own. When you've got something negative in your life, don't resist it. Replace it.

If you turn on the TV, and there's something on that you don't want to watch or you shouldn't watch, you can't just sit there and tell yourself you shouldn't be watching it. You have to change the channel. You replace it - immediately.

You choose what you dwell on. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you the thoughts you need to focus on. He'll do it! He will change your perspective. And that will change your life.

There are several colors associated with Easter, each of which has different and symbolic meanings. In the Christian church, specific colors are used to mark the solemn observances and joyous celebrations throughout Lent and Easter. These colors serve as a visual guide through the season of reflection leading to the commemoration of Jesus' crucifixion and the celebration of His resurrection.

The "Colors of Easter" are very important, as they reflect the elements of Christian belief:

**Purple symbolizes** Royalty and Sorrow: During Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, you'll notice the predominant use of purple or violet cloths, representing the pain and suffering of Jesus' crucifixion as well as the somberness of Lent.

White symbolizes <u>Purity</u>, <u>Innocence and Peace</u>: During Easter, white is reflective of the resurrection, signifying new beginnings and the triumph of life over death.

Gold symbolizes <u>Triumph and Hope</u>: It's a festive color that brings to mind the brightness of the Easter celebration and the promise of eternal life.

**Red symbolizes** Love and Suffering: The bold color of red is deeply tied to the concepts of love and bloodshed, marking the passion and sacrifice of Jesus.

**Black symbolizes** Sorrow and Fasting: Black is a color of mourning and repentance, traditionally used during Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent) and Good Friday to signify sorrow and fasting.

Green symbolizes <u>Hope and Renewal</u>: Green is the color reminiscent of the fresh growth of spring and the promise of new life.

Yellow and Pink symbolize Renewal and Joy: Yellow echoes the cheerfulness of the sunshine. Pink reflects new beginnings that come with spring. Both colors represent the spirit of renewal and the joy of Easter's celebration.

Blue symbolizes <u>Peace and Innocence</u>: Blue is often associated with the Virgin Mary and the purity of the Easter message.
