Being relatively close to New Orleans, OB shares a connection to Mardi Gras by hosting musical events and several parades. Not one of the folk I talked with knew that "Mardi Gras" is French for Fat Tuesday. Nor did they know what "Fat Tuesday" is.

But that's how we human beings are. So we need the season of Lent to be deeply reminded that our human natures need more than words of encouragement and a pat on the back. Lent recalls how deep is our need, and how desperate our situation. Lent impresses us once

MEET YOUR FELLOW TCCAGOers

Dr. Ray Adams

Ray Adams was raised in a family that had its roots in Appalachia, and was exposed to the instruments of that culture: the banjo, guitar and mandolin. Unlike others who have appeared in this department of the newsletter, the accordion did not figure into his musical background. Nor did any keyboard instrument.

But Adams' parents heard their boy singing at an early age and knew that he had talent, so they bought a Baldwin spinet with a split keyboard and one octave of pedals. Interestingly, his first organ teacher was a theatre organist. But he fell in love with the sound of the pipe organ in second grade when he saw the movie, "The Sound of Music." Later in life, he would travel to the Salzburg Cathedral and actually play a concert there!

A trombone player in his high school's marching band and jazz ensemble, Adams also studied organ at the local Presbyterian Church. In order to study organ at Wittenberg University, during the second half of high school, (Continued) he first had to learn to play the piano well. His favorite piano music was jazz and boogie; and he studied serious literature for the organ.

Adams spent a year of study in Berlin at the famed Berliner Kirchenmusikschule, founded by Hugo Distler and Ernst Pepping, with the organist Carl Hockreichter, where he also picked up an interest in choral conducting. He concluded his studies in graduate school at the University of Iowa, and took a position at The Community Church of Vero Beach in 1983.

In 1985, Adams founded the Vero Beach Choral Society. He took the choir to Estonia; two performances at Carnegie Hall; and to Coventry Cathedral at the invitation of Sir David Wilcox.

Adams retired from the Indian River Charter High School's Schumann School for Visual and Performing Arts. He is a second degree martial arts practitioner of Tang Soo Do. One of his dreams, as the only one in his family who is not a pilot, is to earn a pilot's license.

One of the transformative experiences of Adams' life was the death of his son, Nolan, in 2005. One of the effects of this tragedy was to make him more humble. He tries not to judge anyone because "we don't know their life stories." He put these lessons into practice in his position at the charter high school, where some of the kids with trouble in their lives would confide in him.

Sometime near the end of March or

sometime in April, Adams will hopefully host a TCCAGO event at his home. In addition to a piano and a harpsichord, he also owns a reed organ—which his student, Joey Rumberger (featured in the last issue of the newsletter), is nearly finished restoring.

We look forward to that meeting with Ray Adams and his family as we experience the hospitality and music of his home.
