Greetings! It has been wonderful to be able to gather in person the past few months. And now to have a bit more freedom in smaller gatherings. As we move into the warmer (hotter) summer days, we may have to adjust the worship schedule again. At our June Council meeting, we will decide the schedule for July. We are aware that those who may not have gotten vaccinated yet, or who wish to mitigate risk, want to continue to be able to be outside, so we will keep that option for as long as we can.

For the summer, we will be going off the Narrative Lectionary and turn to the stories of the Old Testament kings – Saul, David and Solomon. The summer readings also highlight Paul's letters to the Corinthians and Ephesians, plus a little nod to the book of James. My working preaching theme is "Leadership – Then and Now." We hope to be back to a more regular schedule by the fall, including Adult Forum and Sunday School. We just aren't sure of the exact schedule. I also hope to lead a membership/inquiry class for those who wish to learn about who we are as Christians, Lutheran of the ELCA brand, and members of Spirit of Joy. Learn about how we live out our faith in Christian community, our neighborhood and in the world. Especially for those interested in becoming members of Spirit of Joy, but all are welcome to attend. Look in future newsletters for more details and schedule. This will most likely start in the fall.

I know it has been a challenge to live through all these changes and pivots, but I think everyone feels a relief in being able to meet and greet each other, and participate in service events – like our very successful project to assemble Comfort Bags for unaccompanied minors going through the process of getting to their sponsors here in the U.S.

I attended a virtual continuing education event last month. The theme for the conference was – *Preaching for the Future Church.* The most important takeaway from all the sermons and lectures was the assurance that Christ has gone before us, Christ is with us now, and whatever our future, Christ will meet us there. I don't know if "getting back to normal" will be that future, but I do know God will lead us into the future promised in the person of Jesus Christ. Like God's message to the prophet Jeremiah when God's people were in exile:

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, I will let you find me, says the Lord, and I will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where I have driven you, says the Lord, and I will or load I will bring you back to the place from which I sent you into exile.

We trust in that future with hope.



Of course, Mom and Dad always had the final say on what product to buy...the GOOD one, the BETTER one, or the BEST one. When it came to clothes we sisters rarely agreed with their ratings! But they always explained to us the reason for their ratings. Mom would explain that if we got one item of clothing that was just BETTER, we may be able next time to get something that had a BEST rating. Well, you get the point. And as we grew, this rating system also became a lesson to us when it came to giving away our money to church and charities.. Do I buy those gorgeous \$150 pair of shoes or do I buy the \$50 pair of shoes so I can also give to a secular charity and my church?



She gave of her time to listen, I mean really listen. She never judged anybody, telling us always we do not walk in anyone else's shoes so we do not know the whole story. GLAD YOU'RE BACK!

INTRODUCTION



"It is the tenth of November as we write this on the eightieth anniversary of Kristallnacht. Referred to as the 'Night of the Broken Glass,' this was the night of November 9-10, 1938, when German Nazis conducted a massive attack on Jewish persons and property. Throughout Germany and Austria, Jewishowned stores and synagogues were seriously damaged ... while authorities looked on without intervening. What is so chilling is that only two weeks ago [October 27,2018] a lone gunman invaded the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh during Sabbath morning worship, killing eleven members of the congregation. It was reported to be the deadliest attack on Jews in US history.

"A government report indicated that there were alarming increases in attacks motivated by racial bigotry and religious bias, as well as a victim's sexual orientation. While the report showed a nearly 23 per cent increase in religious-based crimes, those against Jews soared by 37 percent. What is so alarming is that this seems to reflect a serious erosion of our core values as Americans.

"Pastor Valerie Gittings of First Baptist Church in Fairmont, West Virginia suggests that religious people may be part of the problem when she says, 'It breaks my heart that so many people now equate Christianity with against-ness: that Christians are against gay people, against women in ministry, against Muslims. That's not the gospel. The gospel is a wonderful and astonishing message of love and compassion for a God who created all of us and would never, ever want someone to be cast out and separated from the community.' [It reminds me of Rabbi Harold Kushner's words "When did religion turn from how we are to love to whom it is okay to hate."]nb

"It is said that the opposite of love is not hate but fear. Fear of the other often leads one to hate. And hate can lead to violence. (Intro. p.1)

"It is [the authors'] hope that this book can help summon our *better angels* as we seek a way forward to a more just and civil society as citizens and people of faith.

"Americans appear to live today in a culture of violence and fear of the other ... There is a concern that our country has lost its soul or at least its moral compass. People seem to have lost faith in most institutions, including government and even the church. Yet faith communities are intended to be agents of transformation and hope. We believe that the church, the synagogue, and the mosque all have important roles in the public square and can offer a space for open dialogue about basic core values that are found in a variety of religious traditions. We seek to offer a biblical and interreligious approach to the question of <u>How does God intend</u> for us to live well together in the common life?

"We begin this journey together with an analysis of how we arrived at this fragile time in history. We will look at what we consider the failure of the American religious experiment. We then turn to Judeo-Christian scripture and the writings of other faith traditions that reveal common values such as compassion, hospitality, justice, and care of creation." (Intro. p. 2).

Council Minutes from April 13th, 2021



Jim Converse called the meeting to order at 5:33 p.m.

Attendance: Pastor Sharon Brown, Jim Converse, Marcia Shanahan, Elizabeth Tavasci, Jan Graham and Pam Moody. Absent were Dave Tjelmeland and Ian Musil.

Devotions: Marcia provided devotions.

Correspondence:

Pastor Sharon mentioned an ELCA Church Together mailing she received.

Marcia received upcoming policy update thru State Farm which is routine but suggested Mary Stelpstra be advised.

WELCA has committed to match funds from the congregation up to \$500 until May 15th to support the Crossroads Lutheran Church in San Tan Valley.

Secretaries Report: Jan moved to accept the March minutes as presented with a second by Marcia. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Financial Report:

Marcia reviewed the financial reports.

She said the mortgage rate has gone from 3% to 4% but because of the extra that has been paid throughout the first 10 years of the 20-year mortgage our payments will go from \$5919 down to \$2240. Marcia requested permission from the Council for herself and Jim Converse to sign whatever documents were necessary. Pam so moved and Jan seconded with a unanimous approval from the Council.

Pastor suggested building up a maintenance fund for future repairs.

The Council admits that we need to build up membership to help with finances. The Stewardship Committee will actively engage in this.

Executive Committee Action:

The Executive Committee met to discuss a survey for the membership regarding vaccinations and decided against that survey. Discussion within the Council of the best ways and when to begin coffee social time between services met with the decision to keep watch on what is happening and then make a final decision.

Volunteer appreciation was discussed.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor read her report (see attached) and a discussion of masks in the courtyard was held with the decision to continue to follow CDC guidelines.



ASSEMBLING COMFORT BAGS


