## ANNUAL MEETING



- ♦ December 10/11 and 17/18 is the date for The Works of Christmas (formerly Taste of Christmas). Baked and other goodies will be available after services on those days.


Devotions for the Sept. 8th meeting were offered by Dee Suhr.

### DAYTIME BOOK CLUB

### Sooley

Author: John Grisham

A totally different John Grisham Book, **Sooley**: The beginning of Chapter 1 below gives you a beginning to learn of the horrors of the Sudanese Civil War and basketball. Grisham has been known for legal thrillers. This book isn't one of those. It's a sports book; one of the few he's written. Grisham writes a lot about the game, using every basketball cliche in the book- booring. In the end, Grisham can't resist a legal finis'. Upon reflective to the state of the state

tion, one can't help but wonder if the book is about basketball or about third world poverty and conflict?

In April, when Samuel Sooleymon was invited to try out for the national team, he was seventeen years old, stood six feet two inches tall, and was considered to be a promising point guard, known for his quickness and vertical leap, but also for his erratic passing and mediocre shooting.

In July, when the team left Juba, the capital of South Sudan, for the trip to America, he was six feet four inches tall, just as quick but even more erratic handling the ball and no more accurate from the arc. He was hardly aware of his growth, which was not unusual for a teenager, but he did realize that his well-worn basketball shoes were tighter and his only pair of pants now fell well above his ankles.

But back in April when the invitation arrived, his neighborhood erupted in celebration. He lived in Lotta, a remote village on the outskirts of Rumbek, a city of 30,000. He had spent his entire life in Lotta doing little more than playing basketball and soccer. His mother, Beatrice, was a homemaker, with little education, like all the women in the village. His father, Ayak, taught school in a two-room open-air hut built by some missionaries decades earlier. When Samuel wasn't pounding the basketball on the dirt courts throughout the village, he tended to the family's garden with his younger siblings and sold vegetables beside the road.



### THE WORLD IS ABOUT TO TURN

#### Mending a Nation's Broken Faith

Continuing in Chapter 4 – Walking Humbly with God: Repentance and Reconciliation as a Path to a More Civil Society



#### We look at the Sin of Arrogance

"Nearly every society appears to have a superiority complex. It seems every country, nation, and tribe wants to believe that it is better than others and will choose to act in its own self-interest. That is one of the reasons for the legacy and scars of war left on the planet. So when Northern European powers began their worldwide expansion known as colonialism, they sought to impose the religion and culture of what they believed was a superior society. Christianity was the religion of the empire and was used unapologetically as a weapon of subjugation by both conquerors and missionaries. It could be argued, of course, that any religious group that seeks to put down others commits the sin of arrogance. And there is usually a power differential at work whenever one group declares that 'We have the truth' at the expense of others.

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary updated its definition of racism in 2020 to read: A belief that race is the primary determinant of human traits and capacities and that racial differences produce an inherent superiority of a particular race.

The issue of religious or cultural superiority is addressed in the Judeo-Christian scriptures. The Old Testament implies that the Jews as God's Chosen People were given license to expand their territory and conquer the inhabitants. In the New Testament, we witness the prejudice of the Pharisees and Sadducees—religious leaders of the Jews—as well as the Jewish people themselves toward Samaritans, Moabites, and others. Then Jesus came along and upsets the order of things when he suggested we are to love our neighbor whoever they may be and also to pray for those who persecute us.

Liberation Theology suggests we read the Bible through the lens of those on the margins of society rather than those of religious leaders and others in authority. The Gospel narrative is driven around a conflict of values; Jesus set his teaching over against the religious and political leaders of the time (who stood for the status quo). He was in conflict with those who were benefiting from the current political and social system—Jesus offered a vision of flourishing life in the midst of oppression and taught alternative practices that could lead to an alternative and more hopeful reality.

[The authors have us look at the story of the Gerasene Demoniac. (The country of Gerasene is an area east of the Jordan River consisting of a Greek population). Please read this story in the Gospel of Luke 8:26-39 so you can follow how the authors of our book respond to it.]

Luke was not simply telling another healing miracle of Jesus. This story is also an allegory meant to relate a greater truth, one of liberation from the powers and prejudices that oppress people and hold them captive. The demon-possessed man who had been chained up in a cave may represent all who were being oppressed by the Roman government in that time. Legion, the name of the demon, could have a double meaning as well. It may represent the Roman legion of soldiers who kept the people restrained and in line. It could also refer to the many who were constrained by their own religious and cultural prejudices. Note the reaction of the crowd when they realized the man had been healed and made whole. They asked Jesus to leave because he had disturbed the status quo. Jesus, like Atticus Finch in the book *To Kill a Mockingbird*, held up a mirror to society, and they did not like what they saw—Luke has revealed a defect in the system that makes certain people—usually those on the margins – a scapegoat for the rest of society. Instead of being able to admit one's own shortcomings, it is easier to blame others—especially those on the margins of society. And the real sin of arrogance is when those at the top of society—the rich, the powerful, and the privileged of any culture—dismiss or look down on those they do not believe to be as worthy as themselves." (pp 42-44) [Forgive us, O God, for we do not know what we do!] Pastor Naomi

The **purpose** of this meeting was to discuss and decide on the proposal given by Verde Valley Alarm Services to replace the existing fire alarm system. The conversation was in depth and questions were asked and possibilities discussed. Jim placed a call to Matthew Buehrer, specialist/owner of the company and our questions were presented and answered. A motion was presented by Bill that we replace the current fire alarm system and include the communication antenna. Ruth seconded the motion was unanimously accepted.

The money for the system work will be covered from the building fund and restricted funds from the Wild Estate.

Jim will contact our current company, B&W, to let them know that we will no longer need them for the alarm system, but they may submit a proposal to continue with the fire extinguisher and sprinkler systems which need to be relicensed with the city in November.
