The emphasis on the Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition initiated by the Inreach/Outreach folks brought to us a real-time issue of continuing Reformation: a time to repent of past wrongs and injuries, a time to continue the process of healing both victims and perpetrators of assumptions and decisions that have proved to be harmful of body and spirit, and a time to move together into a common future of greater well-being, respect and understanding. Our worship and life in community is not something peripheral in our lives but begs to be at the center of who we are as a People of God, and also whose we are as part of the Body of Christ. That is worth considering, over and over again. This is worth supporting. This is worth our time.

I commend you to experience to your fullest all the rich gifts that belong to you in Christian Community: the gift of companionship, the gift of hospitality, the gift of learning, the gift of growing in truth and understanding of your faith, the gift of giving to those in need, and the gift of JOY in the presence of your Lord.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find invitations to worship, opportunities to keep learning, and occasions for fellowship. Use them. They are yours for the taking.



Nutrition News from ELCA Life Lines—Fall 2025

Sharing God's bounliful harves

n lowa, your generosity is transforming lives through fresh, healthy produce. Cedar Rapids is a metropolitan area surrounded by small, rural communities. Though the city is known as a good place to raise a family, its government struggles to support the needs of a growing marginalized population that includes many immigrants. By one estimate, 11% of the

county's adult population is food-insecure and 40% of those individuals do not qualify for federal food assistance such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).

Feed Iowa First, which is supported by your gifts to ELCA World Hunger, is a grassroots community of businesses, faith organizations, schools, farmers and volunteers that combats food insecurity by "growing food and farmers." The food production takes place on underutilized urban land in and around Cedar Rapids, including at a handful of ELCA congregations. At St. Andrew Lutheran Church, Feed Iowa First set up an urban farm with bitter gourds, cucumbers and sweet peppers. The garden at Faith Lutheran Church in Marion grows leeks — over 125 pounds just last summer.

A key part of this food production is to increase access to farmland for a diversity of farmers, including immigrants, so they can grow crops for their families and communities and build successful businesses. Darius Nupolu, a graduate of the farming program, grew up in a small village in Liberia with his father. "Farming was the only major source of income for our family," Darius shares. Income from their family farm provided for Darius' education, and over time, he became more interested in agriculture. When he completed high school, he says, "I told my dad that I was going to college to study agriculture so that I would

return to help improve our farming system, ultimately improving the lives of our family members." After college, he had the opportunity to work with the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), where his interest and passion grew.

In 2015, Darius and his family moved to the U.S. However, not until they relocated to Cedar Rapids two years later was Darius able to begin farming. Through networking, he connected with Feed Iowa First and quickly saw a huge demand in the local African immigrant community for culturally relevant vegetables. Many traveled to Minnesota for such produce, a four-hour drive. With the help of Feed Iowa First and ELCA World Hunger, Darius began growing Liberian bitter ball, eggplant, okra, sweet potato vines, hot peppers, collards and cucumbers. He now operates a thriving business — Nupolu's Emerging Farms LLC — which he continues to expand.

In 2024, with your support, Feed Iowa First produced 43,655 pounds of fresh, chemicalfree produce. More than 32,000 pounds were delivered to local food banks, pantries, community refrigerators, apartment complexes and clinics. Some of this produce is distributed through the organization's "veggie van," which gives vegetables to anyone who stops by – more than three thousand people last year alone. At one stop last year, a gentleman thanked volunteers for coming to his apartment complex in a part of town where it is difficult to find affordable, fresh, healthy food. "These are the only vegetables I see all week," he said. For Feed Iowa First, the act of meeting neighbors where they are is essential when those neighbors face food insecurity, income disparities, health problems, mobility problems and other social disadvantages.

Through your gifts to ELCA World Hunger, you ensure that people have access to the food they need, which is critical to building vibrant communities where everyone can reach their full potential.
