
THE HARRIS -GRIECO ACADEMY


We rounded out the summer with a fun performance on a gorgeous August day at Cazenovia Park for the South Buffalo Irish Festival.

THE HEADLESS HORSEMAN IS...FROM IRELAND?

The classic tale "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow" was written by American author Washington Irving. It was part of his 1820 collection of essays and short stories titled "The Sketch Book of Geoffrey Crayon, Gent.".

It's among the earliest examples of American fiction, and has become an indelible story told around Halloween. The villain, The Headless Horseman, is a Hessian (German) soldier whose head was shot off by a stray cannonball during the American Revolutionary War. He returns nightly searching for his head, as was the case on a fateful night in 1790 within Sleepy Hollow, a glen near Tarrytown, NY.

The story's inspiration comes from headless horsemen who wandered Ireland in ancient times. It's a tale Washington Irving heard while living in Birmingham, England...which is where he wrote Sleepy Hollow! The Irish version tells of Crom Cruach, a fertility god. Also known as Crom Cróich, Cenn Cruach/ Cróich and Cenncroithi, it offered good yields of milk and grain to its worshippers, in exchange for first-born sacrifices. His most known cruelty came when he brutally decapitated ancient King Tigernmas and ¾ of his entire army – and they worshiped him! Crom Cruach's worshippers were always required to honor their debts or promises, and were punished if they did not. Many of his victims became his undead servants, Dullahans (dark men), traveling Irish roads by horse and carrying whips made of human bones.

His worship ended in the 6th century when Christianity came to Ireland and old traditions went out of favor. It's also said Saint Patrick himself defeated Crom Cruach, destroying all the cult images with a sledgehammer. He can see great distances, rides so fast nearby items catch on fire, he can pass through all gates – even locked, and cannot be outrun. The Dullahan carries his head under his arm, and his face is decayed and smells similar to moldy cheese...a scent so vial you can smell his arrival.

If you see the Dullahan, avert your eyes! For he does not like people watching him work- and could seek vengeance by coming after you. He'll use his whip to rip out your eyes, or worse add you to his kill list. The only thing that will slow him down is an object of purest gold, for he cannot pass even a pin's worth of the stuff.

Should you hear the thunder of hooves behind you and the snap of a whip some foul night, close your eyes and pray you have gold to hand, for it might well be the Dullahan looking for recruits!

A Fantastic Fall was had by All!


