

RINCE NA **TIARNA IRISH DANCE**



He initially formed The Dustmen with Russ Scinta, Harry Linton, Liz Scinta (now Mills) and Ray Szpylman (RIP) in the early 2000's. After a successful run and two albums, the Dustmen eventually retired the name and Brian and Russ started Rosewood Bridge intending go a more traditional folk music route while still playing much of their Irish catalogue. Over that time Jim Dunnigan began sitting in on bass and when Russ retired, Jim and Brian kept Rosewood Bridge going as a duo. Jim, a Buffalo

Music Hall of Fame inductee, is best known as the bass player for the popular 1960's band The Tweeds who had the regional hit "A Thing of the Past" recorded at Decca studios in New York City. Over time, Brian and Jim met fiddle player Zoë Buck at the Glen Park Tavern sessions and eventually asked her to add her talents the band.

Rosewood Bridge volunteered to play for the first Buffalo Irish Festival raffle party in 2022 and wanted a bigger sound for the event so they invited musician friends Peter DiGioiaand Michael Frey to join them for the gig. Peter joined on drums and Michael, one of Brian's closest friends since high school, added his skills on electric guitar into the mix. Peter is well known in Buffalo for playing in numerous bands, most notably Transition, Forgotten Dreams, and the Peter Dee Band. The addition of Peter on drums and Michael on electric guitar along with their additional lead and backing vocals created a fuller sound allowing more classic and Celtic rock to be added to the folk repertoire. Based on Jim's past history with the Tweeds rock band the raffle benefit band jokingly took the name "The Irish Tweeds" and people loved it. The Irish Tweeds played the raffle benefit again in 2023 as well as last year's Thursday under the Tent Irish Hooley at the Buffalo Irish Center.

The name Irish Tweeds stuck and so it was decided to retire the Rosewood Bridge name and use Irish Tweeds full time for both the three-piece configuration and for the larger five-piece band. Quigley said, "The name change is exciting, it kind of reinvigorates us and we are working on adding a lot of new material. Zoë will be singing both backup and lead on more songs and we are adding new some new twists to old favorites. And it is always extra fun when Pete and Frey join us on stage."

The Irish Tweeds are heading into Kirk McWhorter's West Highland Studios to record their first album in March but before then you can catch them at the Buffalo Irish Center on February 16 for the Great Guinness Toast, Hamburg Brewing on March 15, and back at the Irish Center March 16 with the full five-piece band after the First Ward Parade. 
