The canal also made it fairly easy for the next wave of Irish—the Famine Irish—to find their way to Buffalo. They arrived with nothing and, having no prospects, made their homes on a low and sandy spit of land that was created by the accumulation of sand along the seawall. They built shanties and fished the river and lake. Finding work on ships and in the grain elevators, and as construction workers, they built better houses, rowing clubs, and saloons...on the "beach". The last of the beachers was evicted in the

1930s. The area is now known as Times Beach. It is directly south of the lighthouse. We celebrate those who struggled and fought to make a life in this city.







NEW BOOK PROFILES MONSIGNOR MCCARTHY'S WORK IN THE INNER-CITY OF BUFFALO

In the mid-1960's, as an assistant pastor at Saint Teresa's Church, director the of the Saint Teresa's boys choir and founder and coach of the South Buffalo Football Association, Monsignor Leo McCarthy developed a connection with the Irish-American community in South Buffalo that would last a lifetime.

Decades later, he could be heard singing Christmas carols with his former choirboys at the Blackthorn, speaking at the South Buffalo Football awards banquets and even singing "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling" at the Irish Center.

Throughout his 60-plus years of service to the Buffalo Diocese, Monsignor served all over Western New York. Anew book provides an overview of his life and career, with a particular emphasis on his work in the inner-city of Buffalo.

The book, written by his nephew Paul P. McCarthy, is titled: "Don't Lose Your Dignity: Monsignor Leo McCarthy's Remarkable 20 Year Battle for Hearts and Souls in the Inner City of Buffalo."

In the old TV show "The White Shadow" and the more current movie "Coach Carter," a coach works with at-risk inner-city youth and, through sports, teaches them life lessons and helps them overcome the adversity in their lives. But these feel-good Hollywood productions only told part of the story.

Starting in the late 1960's Monsignor lived and worked in the East Side of Buffalo, a community plagued by gangs, drugs and guns. He founded the "Apollos" sports program, which was inspired by the optimism of the Apollo space program, and started football and basketball teams.

He quickly went to work ministering to boys who were struggling to cope with both poverty and parental apathy. Soon his 15-passenger van



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was a seemingly constant presence throughout East Side neighborhoods as he drove his players to and from practices, games and tournaments.

At the fields and gyms across the inner-city, Monsignor and the Apollos would regularly face the threat of violence. On a number of occasions Apollos players were physically assaulted and in one disturbing incident, Monsignor himself was assaulted and nearly knocked out cold.

But no matter how bad the circumstances were, Monsignor always held his boys back from retaliating. He would continually tell them that, "No matter what anyone else says or does, we will always do the right thing!" And he would emphasize to them, "DON'T LOSE YOUR DIGNITY!"

Along the way, Monsignor accomplished a great deal of individual and collective successes

with the Apollos. One example is a weekend basketball tournament that the Apollos won. At the awards ceremony, the Sportsmanship Award - which is given to one individual player - instead was awarded to the Apollos' ENTIRE TEAM because of their extraordinary conduct throughout the tournament.

Another is a young boy who came to his first Apollos' football practice and couldn't even run a lap around the field. He walked home and cried, but came back the next day. While most coaches would ignore a player who would be of no use to the team, Monsignor took him under his wing. Gradually the boy got stronger and gained more confidence. Under Monsignor's tutelage he became an all-star linebacker in high school, went college and eventually attained great success as a millionaire



but the South Buffalo Feis this August.



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IRISH CLASSICAL THEATRE NAMES KEELIE A. SHERIDAN AS ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Though most of the new immigrants, on Buffalo's Beach, were honest workmen, there were of course a few rascals among them. During the tumult of the 1860's, a small band of marauders, led by a ruffian named "Dublin" were particularly notorious. The gang was led by four wild men known as Jimmy, "the Cotton-hook Man", Billy, the "Mugger", "Leary Reedy" and "Dublin."

All of the lads had fanciful nicknames, inspired by what they did for a living or some aspect of their physical appearance. Said, ever with a laughing tongue, one knew that he or she was amidst their own when his diminutive slipped from the lips of another. And if it was somewhat unseemly, like "Diapers Reardon" or "Shithooks McGurr," then that was just the way of things. No offense was meant and none was taken.

Each handle was not the diminutive of a person that was known by neighbors, but the title of a life-long story that many have often told. You could hear, in your mind's ear even now, some lad telling a story, with an elbow braced on a mahogany bar. The rolling peals of laughter, enhanced by several beers, would erupt as someone told an outrageous anecdote of the lads among them and those recently departed. Truth was never an important part of the story, just a good tale, well told. The tales are now our collective memory of a time and a place consigned to the misty halls of fading memory.


