#### Metamorphoses of Psyche in Psychoanalysis and Ancient Greek Thought

From Mourning to Creativity Marcia D-S. Dobson



My talk will be based on my new book, which is in the process of being published. It is about creating a psyche that sees from the perspective of the liminal, honoring multiplicity as central to the creation of the whole person.

Living liminally or "on the threshold," demands a poetic sensibility, and the courage always to be receptive to psychic experiences that open beyond the boundaries of sense, ego, and even common notions of what constitutes sanity. It means directing our attention to transitions rather than beginnings or endings and risking experiences of clairvoyance, hallucinations, fantasies, divine inspiration, psychic multiplicity, empathic fields, artistic inspiration, deep

intimacies, and the bursting of light and spirit through them all.

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This is what I want to share with you – and to elicit your own thoughts and experiences in return.

Looking back today, I find all my personal and intellectual forays have been about the same thing. Mine has not been so much a search for truth that keeps faltering along the way and continually seeking a new compass, but rather has developed into a confluence of themes that deepens and expands meanings as it constellates them, that runs from many streams into a single flowing river.

Marcia D-S. Dobson, Ph.D., has been an award-winning Professor of Classics at Colorado College for over forty years, where she specializes in ancient Greek language, drama, and mythology. She holds a second Ph.D. in psychology from Pacifica Graduate Institute, and cochairs the Psychoanalysis Minor at Colorado College. Marcia has a private psychotherapeutic practice in Colorado Springs and is a former president of the Colorado Springs Jung Society.

# <u>Thursday, December 8th, 2022: 7:00pm – 9:00pm</u> The Guiding Spirit in Each of Our Dreams

Lecture by Christine Chapman, M.Psych (Clin), Alan Drymala, LPC, and Kathryn Kuisle, Ph.D.



This year we are continuing our exploration of the archetypal nature of our dreams, as revealed by a local dreamer. It's easy for dreamers to think that the images in their dreams are not archetypal, simply because the dream might not have the numinous quality of a big dream. Yet every dream image has an archetypal core. If we overlook this archetypal element of our dreams, then we are missing the huge healing, transformative, and also confronting energies that lie in the deeper layers of the psyche. The ego can rebel and demand the centrality of its own associations with dream images, not realizing that this is the starting place for further associations, not the end point. If we stay with the personal, then ultimately we risk staying stuck in the same old complexes in endless rotations.

But if we follow the hints and clues into the deeper symbolic material, then the dreamer's life itself can take on a whole new unexpected landscape. The archetypal world is not a mystery 'out there', to be sought through the instruction of experts from 'far away'. It lives right here, right now in each of us, and is communicated faithfully and repeatedly in our humble dreams.

This evening, we will explore a single dream with a local dreamer in conversation with her, so that we can discuss both the personal and archetypal nature of the dream images and how they mesh and interweave in their meanings to lead the dreamer in her individuation journey.

Christine Chapman, M.Psych (Clin), is a Diplomate Jungian analyst with her diploma from the Research and Training Centre for Depth Psychology according to C.G. Jung and Marie-Louise von Franz in Zurich, Switzerland. She is currently establishing a practice here in Colorado Springs and has been working as a psychologist for over 25 years in Australia. She specializes in the feminine aspects of the psyche in Depth Psychology.

Alan Drymala, LPC, is a Diplomate Jungian Analyst in Colorado and Texas and a graduate of the Centre for Depth Psychology in Zurich, Switzerland. He has an analytical practice here in Colorado Springs and has a passion for continuing the wisdom tradition of Jung through individual analysis, dream groups, and Jungian reading groups.
