The Friday evening auction attracted many large bids and animals were sold at high prices. Witak stated the Otter Adventure Show was new this year and went over extremely well for each performance. County Board Approves End To County Home Care Posts

After long hard debate at its meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 29, Marinette County Board voted by a 27 to 1 margin to effectively end direct county involvement in providing care workers for elderly and disabled segments of the population.

The decision to eliminate all part time and limited term Care worker positions and the Personal Care Registered Nurse Supervisor Position effective Saturday, Sept. 30 did not come easily, and had also been subject of in-depth discussions at meetings of the Health and Human Services Committee at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, prior to the 9 a.m. County Board meeting, and at an Administrative Committee meeting on Thursday, Aug. 17.

Many of the supervisors

who voted in favor of the motion indicated their decision was made not because they felt it was the best solution, but because they felt the county had no choice. State laws that went into effect in 2016 or 2017 assign this care to private corporations, which can be for-profit or non-profit businesses, that are contracted to arrange home health care or nursing home care for individuals with physical and/or mental disabilities that make them unable to care for themselves.

The home care workers are hired, with state and federal Medicare financing, to fill specific needs, for example providing personal cares like bathing, dressing, grooming, toileting, etc.; meal preparation; administration of medicines, light housekeeping, shopping, running errands or going to appointments.

In the Marinette County area, the state has contracted with Lakeland Care, Inc. and Inklusia, Inc., both of which are listed as private non-profit organizations. (These providers are known in government circles as NCOs.)

It was noted at the Administrative Committee meeting that clients or their

families can also contract with other agencies or hire their own care workers, including a family member, with one of the contracted NCOs as fiscal agent.)

Marinette County Department of Health and Human Services HHSD, in an attempt to remain directly involved in providing care to that segment of the population and keep these people as close to their homes and families as possible, has been hiring care workers and the registered nurse who supervises them and contracting their services to Lakeland and Inklusia.

Of the 29 positions eliminated by the motion, one is for the Personal Care Registered Nurse (RN) Supervisor position that will soon become vacant. County Administrator John LeFebvre explained that RN Anna Gross, the person who currently that position has resigned to accept a Birth to Age Three nursing position with Marinette County HHSD. Attempts to hire an RN to fill that vacancy have been unsuccessful, and state law requires that it be filled if the other workers are provided for the people who need the care.

Also being eliminated are 11 part time care worker positions, of which five are vacant, and 18 limited term care worker positions, of which 10 are vacant. LeFebvre said the workers being laid off will be eligible for benefits, but expressed confidence they will have no problem finding similar jobs in the personal care field.

Early in the discussion LeFebvre called on Health and Human Services Director Glenn Sartorelli to explain the problems. Sartorelli expressed some unhappiness with the existing state program, and invited everyone on County Board to accompany him and other Health and Human Services officials to go along when they go to Madison to express their hopes to state legislators and other state officials.

Sartorelli said the state had privatized the provision of tax-funded care services in 2017, and set up the care program though which the state contracts with the companies that provide those services in designated areas.

Marinette County at that time had a long wait list for providing help to the physi-

County Board Approves Pemebonwon/SGL Trade

With no dissenting votes on Tuesday, Aug. 29, Marinette County Board approved a resolution that should be the last step in getting DNR approval of a land trade with Specialty Granules LLC (SGI) that has been in the making for over a year.

If approved as expected, SGI will have an additional 339 acres to use for mining roofing granules near its Kremlin Mine operations in the Town of Pembine, and the public will gain access to 9,300 lineal feet of frontage on the Pemebonwon River plus three quarters of a mile of property through which Silver Creek passes, plus the shorelines on those wilderness waterways will be protected against future development since they, and the 414 acres on which they are located, will be added to the Marinette County Forest. All of the property involved in the land trade are located in the Town of Pembine.

County Administrator John LeFebvre declared the land trade overall is very good for the county in many ways, partly because it preserves the river frontage, but mostly from a business and economic development standpoint, because it helps ensure continued jobs and overall prosperity in the Pembine area. He declared it is a win/win for everybody involved, and said there will be both direct and indirect

economic benefits.

An enabling resolution approved by the Infrastructure Committee and the full County Board in February of this year states that the trade will give Marinette County improved access to existing forest lands where management activities have been difficult to achieve because of limited vehicle access.

That resolution also notes that SGI employs over 100 employees at its Kremlin Facility, and the land trade will help sustain and grow the operation. It goes on to say that the roofing granules

Niagara Police Deal With Child Abuse

The Niagara Police Department was contacted by both the Dickinson County Sheriff's Office and the Iron Mountain Police Department on Thursday, Aug. 24, regarding potential child abuse that was live streamed on social media.

It was determined that the adults in the video, resided in the City of Niagara. The Niagara Police Department conducted an investigation into the incident with the cooperation of Iron Mountain Police Department and the Dickinson County Sheriff's Office.

Based on the investigation, two adults were taken into custody and charges were referred to the Marinette

County District Attorney's Office. One adult was referred for physical abuse of a child and disorderly conduct. The other was referred for physical abuse of a child (party to a crime), disorderly conduct, resisting/obstructing an officer, and battery to a law enforcement officer. The names of the suspects in this case are not yet being released, as the investigation is ongoing.

The Niagara Police Department would like to thank the Iron Mountain Police Department, the Dickinson County Sheriff's Office, and the members of the community that assisted with this investigation.

Supervisors Consider Authority For Signing County Documents

A meeting of Marinette County Board's Executive committee was held following the full Marinette County Board meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 29 mainly to identify the county's position on each of the resolutions to be considered at the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) annual conference in September, but the main issue of discussion turned out to be on who should be authorized to sign documents related to the county's position on various issues.

In preparation for a Pound Town Board meeting and public hearing in June, County Board Chair John Guarisco, after getting advice from County Administrator John LeFebvre and Corporation Counsel

Rebecca Lindner, had signed a letter stating Marinette County had no objection if the federal Public Finance Authority (PFA) chose to issue tax exempt bonds to finance construction of a manure treatment facility proposed by Coleman Ponderosa LLC, a large dairy farm operation, on a property in the Town of Pound.

The fact that Guarisco had signed off on behalf of the county was among items brought up during a public hearing and ensuing discussion at the Town of Pound board meeting on June 13. The Pound Town Board had also previously signed a statement that they had no

Marinette Man Sentenced For Cocaine Possession

The Marinette County District Attorney's Office announced that on Aug. 23, 2023, a Marinette man was sentenced to 17 years in prison and 8 years of extended supervision for possessing 1.7 lbs. of cocaine in over 30 packages for delivery in his apartment in the City of Marinette. Jesus Rodriguez-Hamilton was convicted after pleading to Possession with Intent to Deliver Cocaine, (> 40 grams), within 1000 Feet of a Public Pool, for possessing the nearly 2 lbs. of cocaine. Also found in his apartment was over \$16,000 in U.S. currency, scales, empty baggies, and a vacuum sealer.

At sentencing, District

Attorney DeShea Morrow stated that Hamilton was a large-scale, for-profit, cocaine dealer. District Attorney Morrow told the Court that Hamilton's actions in dealing large amounts of cocaine in Marinette and Menominee Counties posed a serious risk to individuals and the community as a whole. District Attorney Morrow emphasized that Mr. Hamilton was a dealer, not a user, of cocaine, and that those who deal large quantities of drugs in our area should know that they face significant penalties. The Judge sentenced Hamilton to 17 years of initial confinement and 8 years of extended supervision. In imposing the

sentences, the Judge noted that the Mr. Hamilton possessed an exceptional amount of cocaine — over 1,000 1/2 gram doses. The Judge stated that Mr. Hamilton's actions were a risk to the community as a whole.

District Attorney DeShea Morrow handled the prosecution of this case.

objections to the proposed tax exempt financing.

There were some vociferous objections to the proposed project during the public hearing and the discussion that followed. Chief spokesperson against signing off on the bond issue was Michelle DeWitt. Among the arguments that she and others made was that the town, and/or the county could have used their approval of the potential tax-exempt bonding as leverage on issues related to the entire farm operation that the DNR cannot regulate, such as odor, noise and traffic that causes damage on town roads.

Those at the meeting were told that if the pioneering manure treatment facility is constructed, it will convert

It was made clear at the public hearing that no financing for the proposed project would come from the town or the county, and neither would have any responsibility other than approving a statement that they do not oppose approval of the tax exempt bonds that may be issued by

the Public Finance Authority (PFA). Private banks would provide the actual funds. No tax money is involved.

Bond Counsel Atty. Lynda Templen, from the Milwaukee law firm of Husch Blackwell, LLP., had explained that the PFA is a Commission authorized by the State of Wisconsin to provide local governments and eligible private entities access to low-cost, tax-exempt and other financing

“for projects that contribute to social and economic growth and improve the overall quality of life in communities throughout the country.” She reiterated that the town (and county) were not being asked to take on financial responsibility, but only to state they have no objections to financing through PFA with tax exempt bonds.

She said that the statements she referred to did not require board action, just signatures of the highest local elected official, which in the Town of Pound would be Town Chair Curt Tisler. The Pound Town Board had previously voted in favor of the project, and Tisler had signed off. It was noted during the June 13 public hearing that earlier in the day, after conferring with Corporation Counsel Rebecca Lindner and County Administrator John LeFebvre, Marinette County Board Chair John Guarisco, on behalf of Marinette County, had signed a statement that the county did not object to the proposed tax-exempt financing.

At the Aug. 29 Executive Committee meeting Guarisco explained that he had signed because both LeFebvre and Lindner felt as the county’s highest elected official, the County Board Chair had that authority, but some County Board Supervisors had felt that the issue should have gone through the Executive Committee.

He said he had contacted Pound area Supervisors Glenn Broderick and Bob Holley and asked them to attend the meeting and public hearing on the manure facility funding issue, but after being asked to sign that afternoon so the project could go forward he had failed to make a follow-up call informing them that he had done so. When the announcement was made at the Pound meeting it had taken them by surprise, he said, adding that he should have made the calls. He also said, “...in hindsight, if something like this ever comes to me again, I will bring it to County Board, and if time is a big issue, I will not take action without a decision from at least a committee.”

He mentioned the contentious town meeting, and the suggestions (from Dewitt) that the county or town could have used their lack of opposition as a negotiating point for some of the issues related to the overall farm operation.

Lindner said the decision was not about the project, it simply said the county did not care where they got the financing. She said people at the meeting also were not concerned about the source of funding, they were concerned about the project

itself.

Broderick felt this subject will come up again soon in regard to another large farm operation in the town.

Supervisor Denise Oleszak felt there should be committee input before signing.

Guarisco agreed it would be better to have more sets of eyes looking at it. He added that he will get input in future, but he will not be Board Chair forever, and wondered if they need to formally change their board policies.

LeFebvre said he and Lindner sign many documents on behalf of the county without specific input from County Board or a committee. He said just recently an offer had come in from Bay Lakes Regional Planning to use \$500,000 they have left from an EPA grant to clean up the contamination from the long-abandoned old Wausaukee Laundromat property so the county can finally sell it.

He had signed a letter accepting the offer, but asked the committee, “Do I have that authority? I believe I do, but you could designate an elected official.”

LeFebvre added that he regularly submits letters submitting grant applications, for example tourism groups from around the county, and asked if all these need to come before a committee.

Oleszak asked if there was a way to make up a list so the committee could at least have a look at it.

“On some points we have to trust the administrator,” Guarisco commented.

LeFebvre noted when he signs things like the grant proposal letters, he says “Marinette County is in support,” and not John LeFebvre as an individual, and asked how far they would want him to go.

Oleszak felt the committee should at least have some idea what he signs.

“There’s only one Marinette County, and that’s the county board. The only one who can speak on behalf of Marinette County is Marinette County Board, even in regard to housing within a community,” Supervisor Mark Anderson declared, “Marinette County is us, and we should be making the final decision.”

LeFebvre said some issues are time sensitive, which was the case with the Town of Pound financing issue. He said he didn’t disagree with Anderson, “...but how we codify it?”

Supervisor Rick Polzin felt they should have some sort of “filter” to determine what needs separate action, but added he agreed with LeFebvre’s decision to sign on the Wausaukee property cleanup so the county wouldn’t lose the opportunity.

Guarisco agreed there is risk either way, and said they should continue to explore the issue. He felt they perhaps need a list of what LeFebvre is authorized to sign. Holley suggested that like spending authority, anything entailing more than \$25,000 should come to the committee or County Board, even if it’s not costing the county money.

In the end, no action was taken, and the issue will be brought up again at the next Executive Committee meeting, which probably will be in March.

In regard to the WCA resolutions, Holley is the designated voting delegate for Marinette County. The 2023 meeting will be held in Wisconsin Dells at the Kalahari Resort & Convention Center from Sunday, Sept. 17 through Tuesday, Sept. 19.
