## Gerry Smith joins group to lead the effort to complete and publish the John T. Goodnough book on Civil War veterans associated with Lisle, Maine, and Nanticoke.

For nearly three years, a group has been meeting to support John T. Goodnough in his effort to publish a book on the Civil War Veterans associated with the towns of Lisle, Maine and Nanticoke. John, who had spent a lifetime studying the Civil War and the part Broome County veterans played in it, died this past November. The committee is pleased to report that the project will continue under the leadership of Gerry Smith.

**John Goodnough & His Work** John, who had many interests, was an active member and participant in several historical societies, among them the Binghamton Civil War Historical Society and Roundtable. He was a proud member of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. John was untiring in his efforts to document the participation of Broome County men in the Civil War. He left behind a collection of 153 color-coded binders with sleeves full of documentation on, by his count, 4,737 veterans associated with Broome County and vicinity.

John left seventy plus other binders containing information ranging from histories of the various units local men served in to lists of the burial sites of those who gave the ultimate sacrifice and never returned home. The binders include documentation on such things as the 1853 Enfield rifle, Civil War period medicine, and the G.A.R. John's family has shared the binders and related

material with John's committee in hopes that his dream of a book would be realized. Committee members Phil Childs and Dick Baldwin then moved the binders to the J. Ralph Ingalls school for temporary storage. Before his death, John had drafted a number of papers which would serve as "chapters" in his book and had written bios on more than 500 men associated with the towns of Lisle, Maine, and Nanticoke. With John's death, committee member Dick Baldwin began a search for a successor to lead the effort to complete John's book and see it published.

**Gerry Smith Agrees to Lead Effort to See Book Published** The committee is excited to report that Gerry Smith has agreed to help complete and publish John's book on Lisle, Maine, and Nanticoke veterans. Gerry has said he is pleased to have "assumed the coordination of the completion of the excellent work of John Goodnough and the committee to be able to publish this important work documenting the Civil War men from those areas who came from, served, or are buried there." Smith, the former Broome County Historian and current Executive Director of the Tioga County Historical Society, sees this as "an honor and privilege to bring this work to completion."

If you have the likes of diaries, letters, photos, etc. of Civil War veterans associated with Lisle, Maine, or Nanticoke, please contact your Town Historian (Jane Knole, Sue Lisk, or Dick Baldwin, respectively). They'd like to hear about it. And, your material just might make it into the Goodnough book.

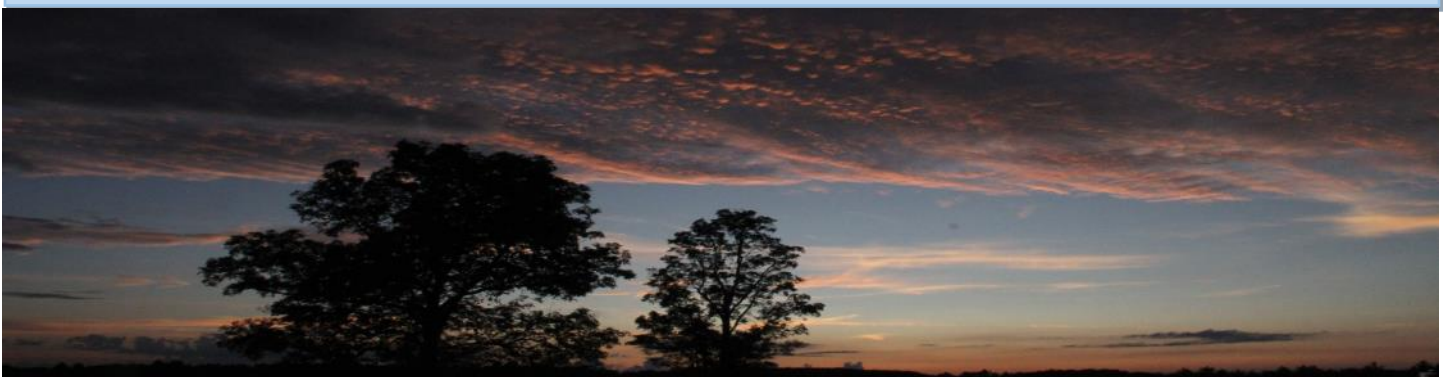
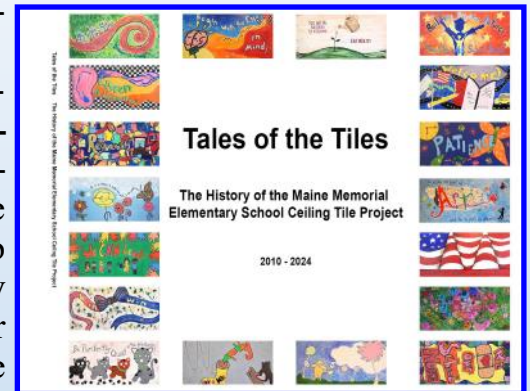
## Curator's Report



As you may be aware, the middle room on the first floor of the Janet W. Bowers Museum is used for changing exhibitions. We recently removed a photo display of the schools in the Town of Maine between 1848 and 1938. The room is currently awaiting the installation of an exciting new exhibit commemorating the **10th anniversary of the Maine-Endwell Little League's historic winning of the Little League World Championship** in 2016. We are honored to mark this significant achievement with a display of a signed jersey, on loan from Progressive Dental, and information on the players and their journey to victory. Their win made history and essentially put Maine-Endwell 'on the map' around the world! Part of this new exhibit will eventually be incorporated into our permanent display pertaining to the history of baseball in the Town of Maine. The M-E Little League exhibit will open on Memorial Day, Monday, May 25, in conjunction with our annual BBQ held at the museum. Please stop in after the Memorial Day Parade, to see the exhibit and enjoy the delicious barbeque prepared by Smokey Legends BBQ. Our annual fundraiser also includes raffles, a bake sale and more!

I am pleased to announce the release of our latest publication "**Tales of the Tiles: the History of the Maine Memorial Elementary School Ceiling Tile Project**" compiled, written and edited by Mary Ann Wasilnak, Kellie Smith, Beverly Battaglini, Phil Childs, Gordie Gottlieb and Joanne Weir. The 2' by 4' ceiling tiles were painted by Maine Memorial students between 2010 and 2024 under the tutelage of art teachers Mary Ann Wasilnak and Kellie Smith. During the recent renovation project at the school, the tiles were removed and faced destruction. Thanks to quick thinking by then principal Bill Dundon and former teacher Jim Tokos, the historical society was given the opportunity to take possession of the tiles. The tiles are a colorful depiction of positive character traits, memorable events, and honors and memorials to many who were part of the Maine Memorial community. One of the tiles celebrates the 2016 Little League team and their win and this tile will be on display in our new exhibit. The book will be on sale at the barbeque. Special thanks to the Broome County Arts Council for a grant covering the preservation of the tiles and the publishing of this book. .

Pitcher Family of Maine, NY

Abstracts of names from the 1st scrapbook owned by Alice Blatchley of Cortland, NY, 1983. The book belonged to her Grandmother of the Pitcher Family of Maine, NY. Some of the newspaper articles were not dated.

**WILD MAN !!** Wild Man of Maine, newspaper article dated 29 Sept.1883. This unusually quiet and peaceful village and vicinity has been thrown into a furor by the alleged appearance recently of the wild man or "what is it?"

About 2 weeks ago Frank Hays and John White, employees of Sherwood Tannery at this place were drawing bark from Lewis woods located about 1½ miles west of the village, near Newark Valley Road. The 2 were startled with a commotion in the bushes about 2 rods distant. White who was on top of the load, threw a stone into the bushes which however, went wide of the mark. The operation was repeated, the stone this time evidently hitting the cause of the commotion, which sprang into view and bounded away at lightning speed, uttering demonical shrieks. Hays and White were badly frightened, but retained a vivid impression of its looks in the passing glimpse they caught of the flying creature. The "Wild Man" as described is about 4½ feet in height, broad and well built with general characteristics of man.

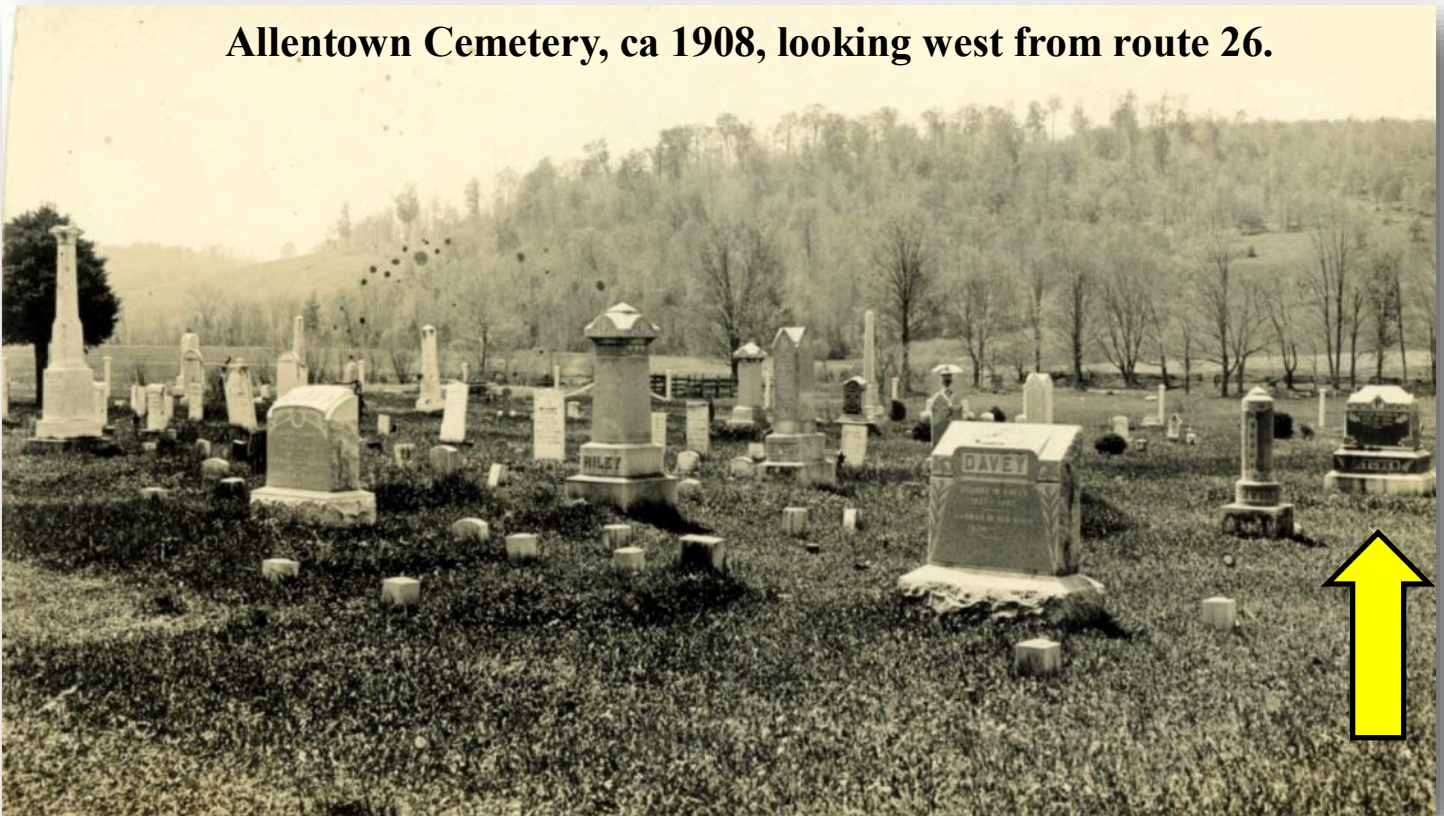
**JENNINGS**

The body was enveloped in a covering of dense brown hair, and the arms apparently terminated at the elbow. The first intimation of the presence of this strange creature was in August last when a party of berry pickers were nearly frightened out of their wits by its horrid shrieks. Since then it has been heard repeatedly night & day by scores of people in the vicinity. A man by name Jennings declares he has seen the thing since first seen by Hays and White, and gives a description identical of theirs.

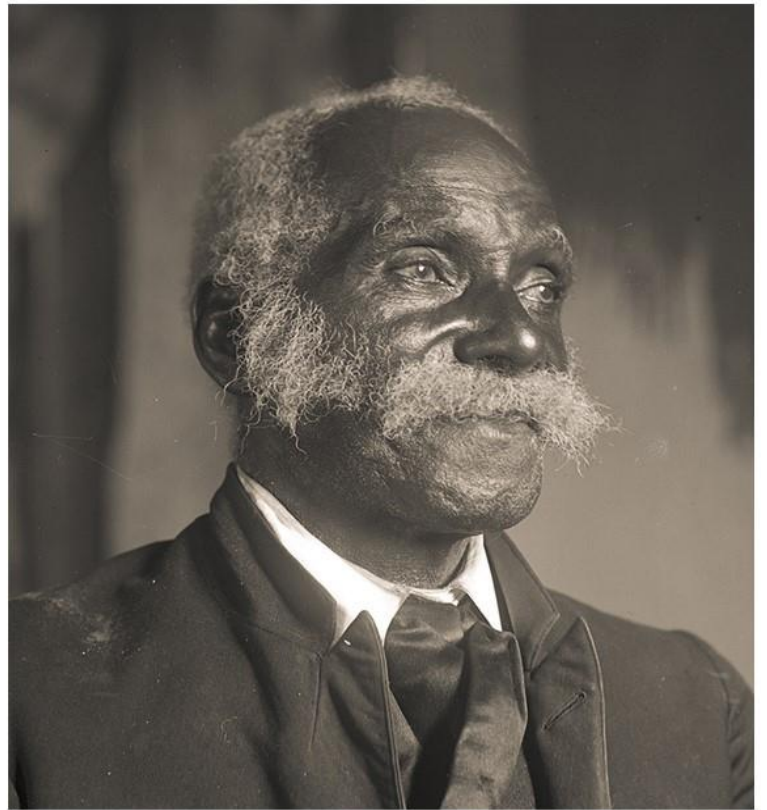
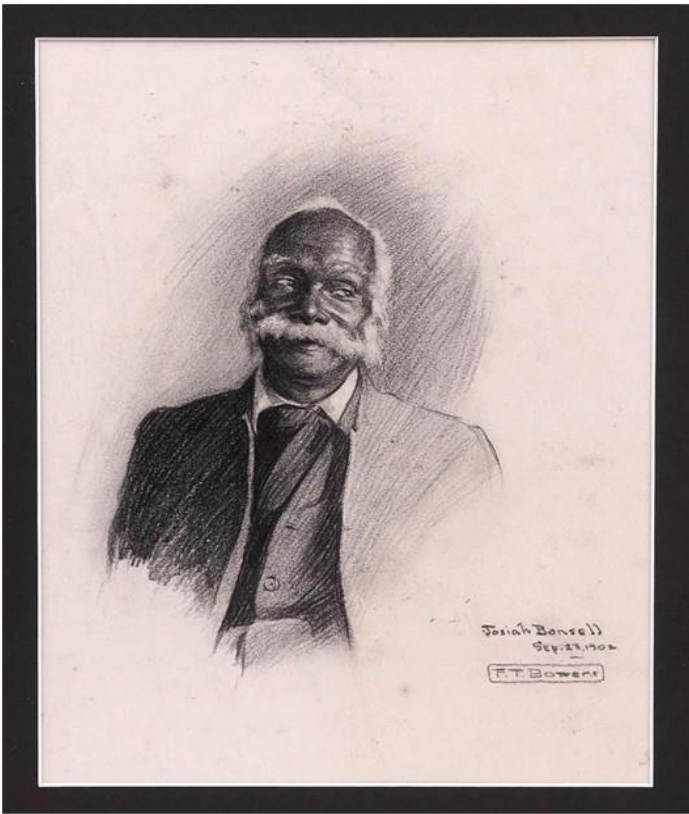
“Josiah Bonsell was born 1819 in Columbia County, NYS. He passed away January 12, 1903 (83-84). He is buried in Spring Forest Cemetery in Binghamton, NY. Josiah served as a Private in Co. B, 26th Regiment, US Colored Infantry during the Civil War.” “The **26th United States Colored Infantry**, also called the **26th New York Infantry (Colored)** was an African American infantry regiment, one of three colored troop units from the state of New York, that fought in the American Civil War. Josiah was 44 years old when he enlisted, standing 5 ft 6 1/2 inches, black hair, enlisting December 31, 1863. 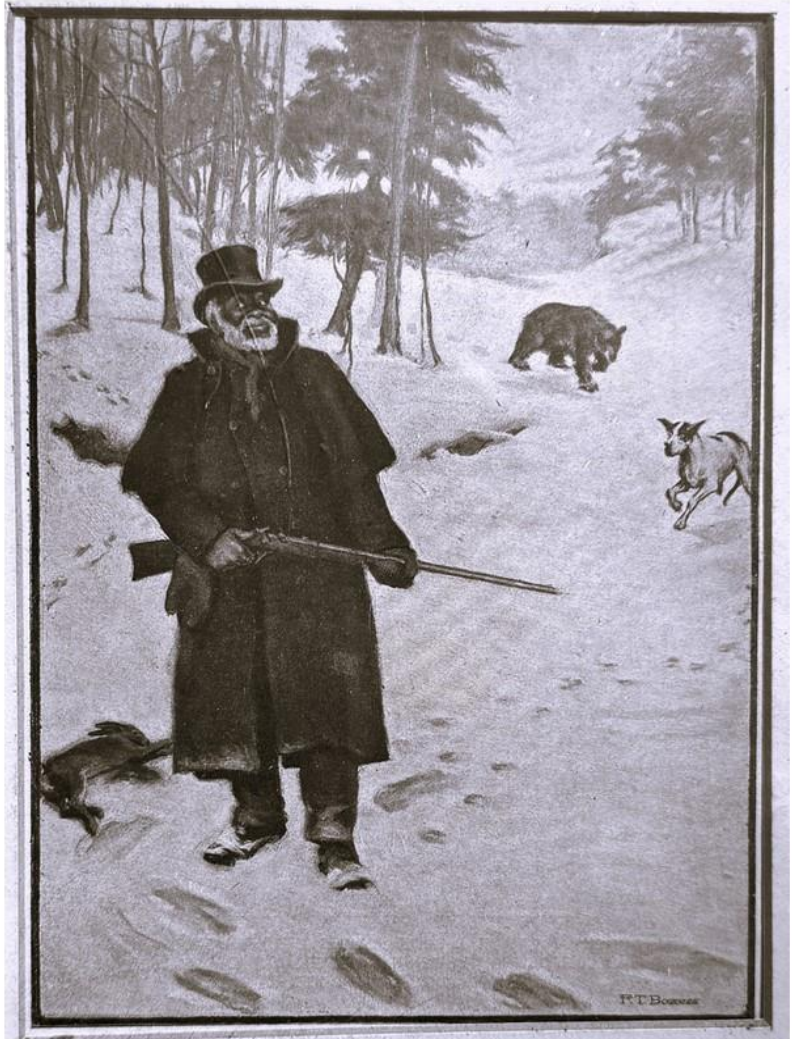

Franck Taylor Bowers (1875-1932), was a prominent Broome County artist and photographer. Franck was born and raised in Maine NY, his father Lamont had two sons and his youngest was Clement. Lamont moved the family to 203 Main Street, Binghamton when he gained financial success. He kept the house in Maine which Clement moved into in the 1930's., Franck always wanted to be an artist but his father did not think this was a good choice as a profession. Franck took many photographs of this area of NYS and his career as an artist grew. Franck used Josiah both in his photographs and other artwork. Above Sept. 1902 sketch, others are all from 1902. His bear hunter won an award. Franck helped his brother Clement illustrate his book *Rhododendrons & Azaleas*.



Today was a sad day for my 83 years to witness. As I took the progression of pictures maybe my emotions were in a raw state as just yesterday my cousin and I reminisced days gone by growing up in Maine. Back then as kids we were not concerned with history or even considered old buildings that stood the tests of time as we ran past them to get to our destination. But something happens as the years and decades accumulate within a soul and you look at things so differently this side of a life. I remember it as the Cole's house growing up. The little apartment on the side where my husbands cousin Marcia and her husband Don Squires first lived when they were first married. We had our apartment on Church street and going to visit them they had purchased the same exact red and chrome table set that we. Funny how such little bits of memory stick in your mind years later. As I watched the big giant metal jaws crunch down on the bones of this home a certain sadness swept over me as I was thinking all she had witnessed in our fine town as a sentinel. Standing silent big and tall as numerous parades passed and many celebrations like the Oktoberfest and us kids hurrying to get to the Pollard Rd. bridge swim hole. Things are bound to change through the years but a certain part of history has been wiped off the planet that cannot be replaced. I just can't help how I feel and not as a hysterical historian but something much deeper. It's only when you have lived and experienced life and times that certain things just settle in your heart and stay! I know a certain sense of sadness will sweep over me as I drive by in the days ahead as I try not to glance at the empty lot.

The **lower** photo shows the same house ca 1890 showing the Dudley family (Myra, Emaline Chloe Marean Dudley, Jessie, Jedediah Dudley (Dr. Dwight Dudley's father). Dr. Dudley had a few homes in the hamlet which he used as both his residence and office. He was raised in the family (farm) home located across from the Shadow Brook development and lastly moving into Endicott a year before his death in 1921.



## BASEBALL IN MAINE, NY by Sue Lisk

Since the focus this May is on baseball and celebrating the tenth Anniversary of the Maine-Endwell world champion victory, I should say it has a long history that goes back to 1867 in the Nanticoke Valley.

There were many teams in Maine, Glen Aubrey as well as Nanticoke and Union Center to name a few. After morning chores were done the players would hit the field for a friendly game.

In George Dudley's diaries he mentioned going to baseball island along the Nanticoke creek where local boys played. Every once in a while, he noted their field at baseball island had to be refurbished due to damage caused by summer storms'

There were a number of great local baseball players in the area. One of them was Floyd Marean who played 3rd base. He was an outstanding batter and athlete while at Union-Endicott High School. He was also on the first year to be coached by Ty Cobb, for whom UE stadium was to be named. Floyd had the opportunity to play on a professional team but did not have the funds to buy the proper equipment. Floyd did however substitute for a number of teams.

And then there was Daniel M. Casey, a professional pitcher for Philadelphia Phillies, who got his start on an East Maine team called New Ireland. Casey claimed that writer Earnest Thayer got his inspiration for his poem "Casey at the Bat" from Casey's strikeout in an 1887 game between the Phillies and NY Giants, although Thayer stated that the poem was not based on a specific player, Casey said Thayer showed him the poem after the game. Casey left baseball in 1891 and went to work as a streetcar conductor in Binghamton.

In the late 1950s, early 1960s the Maine-Nanticoke Valley Little League came into being starting on Ken and Carm Dingham's field between their home and K and C Garage.
