
Meetings are the third Monday of the month, and the next one will be at the Town Hall, September 21 at 7:00. Call Nancy Berry (862-4527) for more information.

# HISTORY OF GIRL SCOUTS IN MAINE AND UNION CENTER

In 1940, Troop 52 was organized in the Town of Maine and the first meeting was held at Mrs. Kenneth Koons' home, as she was the leader. It had ten girls attending the Brockett Hollow School. They were a lone troop as they were so far from Endicott, thus having to pay \$25.00 a year plus 50 cents a girl to reqister. The first year the girls had a box social and a puppet show to raise money. They entered competition in Endicott and won 1st place. They also entered a competition in Binghamton collecting tent caterpillar nests on twigs and won.

In 1941-54, Troop 52 met in Maine Central School. Mrs. Warren McGregor was the troop leader and the troop was noted especially for its singing. By this time they had become part of the Endicott council and did not have to pay the \$25.00 fee.

In 1945, in this area five new troops were organized. Three Brownie troops, and an Intermediate troop and a Senior troop were started. Mrs. Ira McKeeby led the Senior troop. These troops met at noon in the schools, and every girl in Maine and Union Center could join. Mrs. W. David Crockett had a Girl Scout Chorus Club sing at council meetings and on T.V. Mrs. James Babbitt had a Girl Scout Band and the Marionette Shows were on T.V. nineteen times.

Between 1945-61 a Girl Scout Day Camp was instituted. A camp was held at Marean's Grove. Mrs. Robert Kjelguard was the first camp director. Mrs. William Ellis was the second director.

During 1961-64 the Scout Council of this district operated all day camps, and at this time the Maine and Union Center camp was closed.

In 1965 the Maine Kiwanis Club started buying camping equipment for the youth groups and now all Junior, Brownie and Cadette Girl Scouts can camp at the same time.

In 1965-66-67 Troop Camp was held at Greenwood Park for Juniors, Cadettes and Seniors.

During 1968-69-70 Troop Camp for all Girl Scouts was held at Town of Maine Grove. Several groups have back packed in the Catskills, canoed in the Adirondacks and hiked the Appalachin Trail in Pennsylvania.

In National and Council events our Girl Scouts from the Maine and Union Center troops have been represented. These troops have taken many trips to nearby historical sites, including nine trips to Washington, D.C., and Williamsburg three times.

Under Community Service rendered by the Girl Scouts in this area are: Play Kindergarten, teaching camping skills at the State Hospital, aides at Ideal Hospital and leaders of Intercity Troops. Over 5,000 hours of volunteer community service were contributed by the girls of the Cra Maine-Endwell Senior Troop #6 in the AM. first five years they were registered. The Maine girls have done well in Regional and National competition events. Four girls, Denise Edwards, Elaine Welch, Marcia Bell, and Dot Gemmel, were chosen to represent New York State at the All State Rendezvous in Wyoming in 1969. Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Koon, Mrs. Doris Barre and Mrs. W. David Crockett accompanied the girls on this

Mrs. W. David Crockett received the "Thanks" badge from the National Organization in May of 1968 and in March 1972 at the annual Juliette Lowe Observance Mrs. Kenneth Koon received this award. The "Thanks" badge is the highest award given by the National Girl Scout Organization to volunteers for service in adult girl scouting.

#### BOY SCOUT HISTORY

The First Scout Troop formed in Maine, New York, was Troop 212 of Region 2 Council No.368 of Susquenango Council Boy Scouts of America and was instituted February 24, 1941. It was sponsored by the Ashlar Club of Maine Masonic Lodge #399.

The meetings were held in the schoolhouse on Church Street every Wednesday evening. The original troop had eighteen members.

The first year the scouts collected waste paper, specialized in first aid and signaling instructions for emergencies.

In 1943 the scouts were sponsored by the Fellow-Craft Club of Masonic Lodge #399 F & AM.

In 1951 the Troop meetings were held at the Grange Hall in Maine, New York.

In 1958 the Scouts moved their meetings to the Masonic Temple where they have held their meetings ever

Throughout the years the Boy Scouts have participated in Firemen Field Days' parades, Memorial Day parades and other civic functions. They have had pancake suppers to raise money for equipment, etc.; also Ice Cream socials and public dinners. They have been an asset to our community for the last 30 years, and their present membership is 30 boys.

#### MAINE CUB SCOUT HISTORY

The Cub Scouts, Troop #212, was formed and chartered March 16, 1950. They are sponsored by the Fellow Craft Club of Masonic Lodge #399 F &  $^{\Delta M}$ 

The troop meetings are held at the Grange Hall in Maine, every fourth Friday of the month.

There were 29 members of the Cub Pack in the first year of Cub history in Maine. They are: Thomas Luce, Gordon Beckhorn, Philip Parr, William Anderson, Jr., Owen Loomis, Clark Gardner, Jerry Prentice, George McKeon, Karl Reester, Merritt Sulger, Richard Holden, William Wordworth, David McKeon, Bryant Ingalls, Ronald Lewis, Thomas Reitmerfer, Ken Reester, Douglas Crockett, Raymond Payne, John Lainhart, Jr., Elwin Rivenburg, Roger Moyer, George Adams Jr., Dennis Lee, Ralph Rose, James McGregor, Francis Zimmer, and William Garrier.

As their service to their community the Cubs have taken their place in Memorial Day parades and Firemen Field Day parades. The pack has had ice cream socials and public events to earn money for equipment, etc. Presently the cubs have 49 members.

#### AMERICAN LEGION POST #1390 of MAINE

The American Legion Post #1390 of Maine received their charter January 24, 1946. Harold Bunts was the first Commander. The rest of the charter members were: Oscar Adams, Stanley Apgar, Gerald Ayres, Frederick Campbell, Russell Cokely, Emerson Comstock, John Cornell, Paul Cornell, Morris Corson, Merle Dingman, Durward Dence, William Ellis, Alexander Dudek, Chester Dudek, Robert Fenton, Reginald Green, Donald Hardy, Norman Hill, Joseph Kanabroski, Harold Keville, Steve Kupkovich, Vaughn Lainhart, Ivan Lee, Donald Lewis, Richard Luce, Henry Ludington, Walter Mather, James Mikels, Raymond Mills, Frank Prentice, Arthur Rankin, George Rogers, Eddie Rozelle, John Rutkowski, Durwood Smith, Stuart Wilkins, James Wiwigac, Nathan Young, Robert Zimmer and Warren Zimmer. The first meetings were held in the old Town Hall in an upstairs room. Soon after, land was bought for the Post from Fred Haskins. The lumber for the building came from the woods of Robert Fenton after the Hurricane of 1948.

The building was started in 1949, and money was raised for the building by holding dances at the school. In 1950 the Legion helped to supply materials and labor for building a new house for a Maine veteran whose house had burned.

Every year they have a big Christmas Party for the children of the community and make Christmas baskets for the needy. Each year they send a boy from High School to Boys State. Each year they see that a parade and memorial service is held on Memorial Day in Maine, and they donate time and money to all community affairs. They are always ready and willing to

help the returning veterans.

#### NANTICOKE VALLEY GRANGE

Union Center Grange No. 1153 was organized December 26, 1908, which was an out-growth of a meeting held in the schoolhouse for that purpose. It was organized by J.E. Evans, County Deputy at that time, assisted by Master Hovey of the Vestal Grange. The success of the meeting was 34 charter members. They were: Mr. & Mrs. Rossi H. Oliver, Mr. & Mrs. Fred L. Oliver was appointed to manage the ball team to play against the Binghamton Grange. Also in 1909 the group appointed John A. Robinson to see what the Bradley Creek School house could be bought for. The reported price was \$175.00.

In 1910 a committee was appointed to make plans for building a new hall, but these plans never materi alized. The matter of a hall was brought up again in 1919, and, after considering different plans, an old rake factory was purchased in 1920. Here meetings were held for a time. Then the building was moved to a new foundation which had been built on a new site - presently the corner of Maine Road (Route 26) and Nanticoke Road in the center of the village of Union Center. During the time this building was being remodeled, meetings were held in the homes of members. A stock company was formed to finance the hall. It was dedicated in June of 1922 with state master Manning as the Dedicating Officer. The hall was never fully paid for, and interest in the Grange seemed to lag so that in 1931, the Methodist Church took over the hall, but the Grange had the privilege of using it at a nominal rental.

In 1940 the Grange was moved to Maine, and the present name of Nanticoke Valley was adopted. Meetings were held in the old Maine schoolhouse. Venley C. McGregor was the only charter member who had belonged continuously since its organization. This Grange has furnished three Pomona Masters and two This Grange was an Honor Grange for Maine. > Later in 1945 they purchased the old Town Hall building which also had previously been used as a movie house. Grange meetings were held here until 1973 when due to decrease in membership they decided to sell the building and they now meet in the Federated Church.

> In 1890 Grange #627, called "Maine" Grange was formed with C.N. Guy as the first Master and D.C. Fisher as the first Secretary. This particular group did not last very long and members were absorbed into other granges.

> On May 23, 1932, Union Center Juvenile Grange #230 was formed with nineteen charter members, eleven boys and eight girls, by Mrs. Frank Arnold. First officers Master, Howard Woodward; Overseer, Alfred Nelson; Lecturer, Irene Mills; Steward, Andrew Sissenstein; Assistant Steward, Harold Walters; Chaplain, George Mills; Treasurer, Guilford Woodward; Secretary, Mildred Young; Gatekeeper, Raymond Pearsall; Ceres, Zalda James; Pomona, Arlene Dyer; Flora, Audrey Dyer; Lady Assistant Steward, Jean Young; Matron, Anna Sissenstein. #### HOME BUREAU

The Home Bureau was formed during World War I mainly to help women with food rationing problems. In the 1920's Anne Philips Duncan was the Home Demonstrator Agent for the county and came to Maine regularly to help the women make hats, learn how to upholster furniture, etc. In the 1940's the name was changed to Broome County Home Extension. The group in Maine was active until the mid 1960's.
