

### **Little Known Treasures From the Archives**

This begins a new item in the News Letter to be called Little Known Treasures from the Archives. The initial find is a letter from the first doctor on the scene at Lincoln's Assassination. The person to whom he is writing appears to be "our" Dr. Dudley from the glass case in the Men's Exhibit. Dudley had been working in Washington himself, before coming to Maine, New York to establish a practice and then being sent to manage the medical care in the Confederate soldier Prisoner of War camp in Elmira New York.

The date of this letter is one month after the assassination. (It brings to mind all the e-mails received from friends who had witnessed the 911 situation unfolding).


