## **Broome County Historical Society Annual Picnic**

Please attend the Broome County Historical Society annual picnic, which will be held at our museum side yard on June 20. It will be our Historical Society's picnic too. Come for 6:00 sit down to eat.

There will be a demonstration of the kind of tours which we offer Spring and Fall for groups of school children. They include parts of life as lived during the time our house museum building was first in use. Children get to try their hand at washing clothes on a scrub board and hanging clothes on a line to get them dry before it rains. They see the parlor which contains nothing that is absolutely necessary for life on a farm. Upstairs they will see the basic structure of the building, things made in the home for use in the home and a casket. And they will hear how people who had a parlor could have a loved one layed out there and have mourners come to call.

There is an "attic" where people can try-on exciting clothes in front of a big mirror. Almost life size photographs show activities and chores that kids did at home. Clothes sewed for the family from fabric woven from yarn spun from fiber grown on the farm teaches a lot.

In the men's exhibit on the first floor, they see displays of the labor in cutting trees, converting wood into houses and furniture, or into the necessities for tanning hides. And they get to see some early baseball bats and big pictures of some of the many early teams in our area. They also hear about the growing and harvesting of grain and the conversion of grain into animal feed and flour for themselves. When they get to the mill, they see a mill still full of apparatus that worked with a mill-wheel turned by water.

Outdoors there is the chance to walk on stilts and roll a hoop, before they go into the one room school building to hear about how teaching was done in the early days and look through real books that were used by real children as they learned in school, over the 100 years, during which that school building was actually in use.

Many of you have never seen one of these tours. You will be pleased when you do.

We will all eat the food we brought. Everyone is to bring a dish to pass and their own drink and what is needed to eat it. Our guests will too.

## Scranton Steamtown Bus Tour

The **Vestal Historical Society** is sponsoring a Bus trip to the Steamtown/Coal mine Historical Museums District in Scranton on Friday, September 28th, 2012. The trip, which is open to the public, will allow participants to visit *any or all* of the many local Historical attractions as they may want to,...or just spend some leisurely shopping time visiting the Steamtown Mall. The bus will provide us with *free shuttle services* all day between the Steamtown Mall, museums, and tours, which include:

Steam Town Mall / Steam town rail yard / Steam town Museum / Trolley museum-Trolley ride / Coal mine Tour / Coal mine museum /Iron Furnaces,... and Souvenir Shoppes at most locations. All this within 10 minutes of each other.

As well as visiting the many Historical museums, short tours on the Steamtown railroad or the Steamtown Trolley can be purchased. An informative underground tour of an actual Anthracite coalmine is one of the highlights of the visit. Visitors to the coal mine will travel on underground rail cars to the mines below, for a walking tour where the temperature is a steady 52 degrees, so bring a jacket.

There is a food court inside the Steamtown Mall, including many tables for those who may want to bring their own lunch along. Typical food-court food,... (Chinese/Pizza/burgers/hot dogs/sandwiches/salads/ice cream/drinks)... are available.

The bus will leave the Vestal Library parking lot at 8:30 am. After a fun day of museums and tours, we will head back home, stopping at the well known Bingham's Restaurant in Lenox, Pa for dinner at 6 pm. We plan to return to Vestal by 8 pm. All this for only \$25 per person.

All meals and entrance fees, etc. will be the individuals own expense.

A group has a reservation for Monday, July 16, 2012 at 3:00 p.m. to visit the Merrill collection, which is a private museum in Waverly, NY.

The Merrills are avid collectors, and although the emphasis is on cars and license plates, the buildings are also filled with a wide array of other memorabilia including toy sewing machines; artifacts from the local soda fountain; advertising signs; lamps, etc. that would be fascinating to both men and women.

Don Merrill said he could handle a group (he gives a guided tour) of 15-20 with no problem so you can recruit more from the NVHS.

Judith and Burt Whiteman visited this museum on a tour organized by the Tioga County Historical Society a couple of years ago, and they say it was really amazing.




## New York State's Heritage Weekend 2012
