What is Path Through History?

Path Through History is a program that will connect historic and cultural attractions throughout New York State. The PTH will not only showcase New York's unparalleled network of museums, historic sites, and other cultural institutions, but it is hoped will also help promote tourism, economic development, and job creation.

What is Path Through History Weekends?

As part of Path Through History, on June 1-2 and 8-9, cultural and heritage sites throughout the state will host special programming, tours and events, or provide reduced or free admission, to celebrate the unique history of New York State.

Our part of the project will take place on SATURDAY, June 8, from 1 to 4. Our buildings will be open and, as always, free. Sue Lisk will be on hand to sign copies of the book she put together for the Historical Society, and to chat with people.

Also, Country Wagon will have an agricultural display, and Most Holy Rosary will have a "Treasure" sale.

Lucus Kaczynski and fellow students will be doing a walking tour of the Hamlet. They will meet in front of the Federated Church.

Other historical places in the area will be open then too, so if you're free, try to check out some of those.

Don't be surprised if you are contacted by a local person who is interested in recording a reminiscent conversation with you. Carla Sullivan and a small collection of other local history enthusiasts have discovered that History hasn't stopped, even yet. What will be the History learned about, 50 years from now, will be what has been our lives.

The idea is to document the lives and happenings of local people, piece by piece. Some people will be ones who grew up here, but others will be people who have moved to the Maine area, anytime before right now.

They have some prompting questions which will help make a continuity in the collection of interviews. Beyond that, the conversation goes as people take it. A wonderful digital recorder, that is tiny beyond belief, is used. It does not need to be spoken directly into and can record a group of people talking as easily as a single speaker.


