

The Allentown School house still stands across Route 26 from the cemetery. It is now a home. " All early teachers had to do the janitor work as well as teaching. In the 20's and 30's there were many children from immigrants or children of foreign-born parents. Mr. Clarence Berry was a teacher 1930 - 31 Elton Parr taught all the grades from 1931 - 33." from Shirley Woodward *A Short History of Maine*, 1973.

IT ALL BEGINS HERE!

" Matthew Allen, born probably Dutchess Co., NY, ca.1773, died Town of Maine, Broome Co., NY, June 12, 1856. His first wife, mother of all his children, was Amy Hill, about whom no details but her name are known at present. Family tradition says their eldest child, Ebenezer, was born in Dutchess Co., remaining children born Town of Maryland, Otsego Co., NY.

According to the 1865 New York State Census, Matthew and his children came to Broome County in 1837 and Lucy -----, his second wife, with whom he shares a double gravestone in Allentown Cemetery, came from Montgomery County in 1841. Matthew and his children were in Maryland, Otsego Co., NY, perhaps 1810-1837, where at least some of the children were born and where Ebenezer (the eldest) was married.

Lucy, whose maiden name has not been found, was the second wife of Matthew Allen, but not the mother of any of his children. According to the 1865 New York State Census, Matthew and his children came to Broome Co., NY, in 1837.

Lucy arrived there 1841, coming from Montgomery Co., NY. 1797 - 12.9.1876"





“ J. Rennie Allen was born July 16, 1883 in the farmhouse immediately to the north of the Allentown Cemetery, just below Glen Aubrey. His parents were John J. and Lettie (Smith) Allen who operated a general farm as an avocation (what to-day would be called “moon-lighting”) they both taught singing and were in great demand for weddings and funerals. It was their observation and belief that they could better direct and conduct funerals, that led John J. Allen in 1884 to hang out his shingle as an “undertaker” In those days most undertakers developed from cabinet makers or furniture dealers who were called upon to provide the needed coffin and subsequently “undertook” to provide the additional services involved. There were no professional licenses required. Embalming was not commonly practiced since that technique had only been developed towards the end of the Civil War. The undertaker of those days made “house calls” — washing, shaving, dressing and otherwise simply preparing the deceased; using a special ice packed coffin to keep the body until the day of the funeral.”

"At age 14 "J.R." Allen (as he was called) began as a full-time assistant to his father — driving the horse-drawn hearse and helping in every detail. In 1899 the State of New York required the licensing of undertakers and embalmers. John J. Allen was granted a license automatically since he was already in business. "J.R." Allen went to Dr. Eckel's School of Embalming in Philadelphia and was graduated with a degree as embalmers after only 6 weeks. (His formal education incidentally had not gone on past the 8th grade but his education as an Embalmer and Mortician never ceased.) "J.R. " Allen moved from the Allentown farm into the village proper of Maine. His first residence was in the house just northwest of the Ollie Ketchum home. In 1905 he married Jessie A. Dudley, daughter of Dr. Dwight D. Dudley, physician of Maine (it really was a love match). Their sons Audley Dudley Allen and J. Ward Allen were born in Maine."





Ralph Carley uses his three-horse team and moldboard plow on his farm near Allentown and Glen Aubrey. He was the son of **Wellington Carley** and is buried in Allentown Cemetery with his first wife, Cora. His second wife, **Nell**, was from Canada and eventually returned there for a time. He provided the lands for the school house and cemetery.

Lewis Whittaker makes butter at the *Barnes and Whittaker Creamery*. The creamery was on the east side of Route 26. Whittaker and his brother-in-law **Duane Barnes**, made butter and cheese to sell in Binghamton twice a week; the quality was so superior that they got top price for their products.

"In February 1865 **Nathan Barnes** and **Polly Carley** (married 1850) moved from Lapeer, New York, to Nanticoke with a team of oxen and horses. They had six children (see next slide) In 1906, Nathan's son, **Duane Barnes**, and his brother-in-law, **Lewis Whittaker**, started a large sawmill by the creek, located where the old Barnes store building is today."

Jeremlah L. Howard died yesterday, at 4:20 p. m. after an illness of less than one week, from pneumonia. Besides his widow, he is survived by two brothers. Charles Howard of Willet, Cortland county, and Samuel Howard of Olean; two sisters. Mrs. John Green of Whitney Point and Mrs. Adelbert Ingersoll of Cincinnati; also an adopted daughter, Mrs. J. H. Kelm of this city. Mr. Howard was born in Maine Feb. 5. 1844. *At the age of 17 he enlisted in the Union army, Joining the Fiftieth New York Engineer Corps.* Notwithstanding his extreme youth, he soon attained the rank of sergeant by his distinguished bravery. Nathan Howard and his twin brother, David, were born in New London, CT, sons of Nathan Howard (1673 - 1745) and Hannah Spencer (1676 - 1754.) They were the last children born to this step-family that included eleven children.

When Nathan 1720 -1777 was 22 years old he married Lucy Minor (1721 - 1761) 20 year old daughter of Clement Minor (1700 - 1775) and Abigail Turner (1701 - 1756) in New London, CT, in 1742. Nathan became an Elder of the Baptist Church. He was described as a man of "rare personality" and admired by his congregation. Nathan and Lucy bore 10 children before her death. After her death, Nathan married Sarah Chapman (1736 - 1777) and they had 8 children. With such a large family of descendants, the section of New London known as Niantic was once called Howardville.

Nathan was known for his fishing skill and there was an area in New London known as "Howard's Ledge." He served in 1757 in the French and Indian Wars in Capt. Coit's Co. Before his death in 1777 Nathan set aside land for the cemetery now known as Union Cemetery.

"Mary Delano Emerson, who sold policies for the Home Insurance Company around 1900, was quite an unusual woman for her time. Emerson was one of the first women in the area to own a bicycle, which she called "the wheel". She rode it all over the area, up and down the hills, all without brakes. She was also an accomplished organist at the Congregational Church. "

"...married her lifelong friend Lot J. Emerson in 1900, when she was thirty-seven and he was thirty-nine. Mary waited until both of her parents were dead before marrying. She cared for her widowed mother for almost a decade in their house at Delano's Corners. Lot worked on his parents' farm just up East Maine Road. When Mary and Lot married, his mother had recently died, so Mary assumed the obligation of caring for her husband's father. She did not give up the house she had inherited, however; she and Lot lived at Delano's Corners and Mary went up the hill to Emerson's several times a day." N. G. O. pg. 127.



The Tartanian family came to the United States from Armenian....Minas, Arshaloos, (Hagog) grandmother Eskouhi, Paris Mesrobian (Julia) and John.

Living in Maine, my story by Alice Tartanian Hopkins

"My ancestry is Armenian. Their land was an ancient, mountainous region in western Asia, lying around Mt. Ararat, the spot upon which Noah's Ark came to rest. Armenia now is a small, land-locked nation whose citizens see, but cannot visit their mountain, as they are northwest of Turkey also bordering Ukraine and Iran.

This year (2015) is the 100th year remembrance of the year when the Turkish Government (during WW1), aligned with Germany, decided to eliminate the Armenian people from their land. One million, five hundred thousand Christian Armenians were killed. Among them was my mother's family. The men were killed first, then the women and children driven into the desert. A Kurdish woman approached my grandmother and wanted her young daughter, my mother to live with her and help with housework and childcare. My mother never heard again about her

My father who lived near Constantinople (now Istanbul), came by ship in 1913, with four other young men to the address of Congregational Missionaries in Sherburne, New York in 1913. Before passports, one could come here with only the address of a friend. Dad and his older brother worked on farms and saved enough money to buy a farm. They found one of 120 acres, barn, house and outbuildings owned by John and Fanny Atwater in the town of Maine and bought it.

After the world war, missionaries toured Turkey, looking for orphans. I still wonder how this miracle was accomplished...but my mother was in an orphan home in Greece when my father visited his mother, sister and brother-in-law in Providence, RI. Uncle Kevork showed him a picture of his cousin Mariam, saying, "She is in Corfu. Why don't you go and bring her to America?" So he wrote her a letter to which she replied with a "Yes". His cousin in New York City helped him apply for a passport and book passage. So they met, were married, went to Athens for her passport, and boarded a ship to America.

The Atwaters were members of the Congregational Church in Maine, which our family joined. We knew the liturgy and hymns which we learned from the missionaries who had come to our land. We sang in Armenian while others sang in English!"



- Types of rock used in tombstones at various time: (Bluestone - local) Marble, Granite.
- Weathering of stones.
- Iconology on stones.

How to improve visibility of lettering in the stones

- Flour
- Shaving cream
- Time of day -shadows Early morning or late afternoon increase shadows which make reading easier.
- Rubbings
- Find A Grave Website Many tombstones are photographed.
