

Curator's Corner by Sue Lisk: Shirley Woodward, who is a Charter member, has donated many pioneer items to our museum over the years. Many of her items are important parts of our exhibits. These artifacts once belonged to the Woodward, Ketchum and Howard families of Union Center. The most recent item we received is an oil lamp once sold by the Rockefellers and initially owned by Gordon Woodward's grandmother who's family settled in Union Center in 1792. Note John D. Rockefeller was born July 8, 1839, Richford, NY.

"Old William Rockefeller came to the US from Germany and settled in this area. He grew potatoes. William and his wife had two sons who started making and selling these lamps to promote the use of this newly discovered oil instead of whale oil. This didn't last long as electric lighting was soon invented." Thank you Shirley and your family.

The United States Postal service and Maine, New York

In 1982 our small family moved to Lewis Street in the Hamlet of Maine. One of the first things we had to decide was whether we would "live" in Maine (13802) or Endicott(13760). Two choices for mail deliver were available, a street mailbox or buy a box at the post office to receive our mail. We went to the post office and were greeted by a very friendly person who welcomed us to Maine. It was the postmaster Betty Welch who continued to greet us each day and she just made us "feel at home", it was an easy decision we moved to 13802.

The first post office serving this region was in the John Curtis home located next to today's Maine Cemetery. Back then this was the center of population for the new settlers. In 1825 the Congregation Church was located where the old section of the cemetery is today, Jedidiah Dudley's farm was just south of the Curtis farm and the toll post road south to Union started. In 1828 Mr. Curtis operated the first post office from his home and but a few years later the post office moved into the Hamlet of Maine. In 1855 the Lincoln Store housed the P.O., 1866 F.H. Marean & Son Store (photo) 1908 The Columbian Block (photo) owned by F. C. Curlhair and then the Tymeson store (today's location) (photos). A few months ago a "conversation" was started on the Maine Community Public Group(2000 + members) Facebook page about the old post office. Many memories were shared especially about how the post office was on the side of the Tymeson store in the late 1940's and a trip home from school always included a stop at the store. Much of the information and photos for this article come from three sources: Betty Welch (a true historian), Ann Lewis Page's book (town historian in 1996)(out of print) *Then & Now A Pictorial History of the Town of Maine, New York, May 1998* printed by the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society and *Images of American Maine and the Nanticoke Valley*,2012 by Susan H. Lisk (NVHS Curator and in 2017 town historian) which is available at The Country Wagon Produce and our museum (proceeds go to NVHS). Phil Childs








The Fred H. Marean and Son store (1865—1900) housed the post office starting in 1866. The stores location was found at todays parking lot of the Most Holy Rosary Church. The photo below taken in 1895 shows the original Gazebo and the Marean store. The LeRoy Brooks building is on the left, later it became the Tymeson Store 1912—1945

buy calico, linen and lace.

There's the post office too, which makes it quite handy,
You can call for your mail and buy you some candy. Miss
Muzzy too, is right up the stairs. She'll make you a
bonnet, in style, she declares.


(Mrs. Harriet (Hattie) Tucker Ingalls was Ralph,

This poem by Hattie Tucker Ingalls is very descriptive of the entire town as it was in 1874. The Good Templar Lodge was an anti-alcohol society where members, of all ages, swore against drinking of intoxicating beverages. It was extremely popular at this time throughout NYS and culminated in the 18th amendment to the U.S. Constitution which was ratified on January 16, 1919.





So how old in the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society? On October 21, 1969 individuals came together to organize the society. January 1973 we received a provisional charter from New York State. Our permanent (absolute) charter is dated February 24, 1977. So how old are we? ... 48 years in October, 44 years last January or 40 years in February 2017. What do you think?

"A meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Gloria Oliver on October 21, 1969, to discuss the formation of an Historical Society primarily concerned with local history. There were eighteen present including Mrs. Marjory B. Hinman, President and Richard Haberlen, History Curator at Roberson Center. A second meeting was held at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Emerson Comstock on November 18, 1969, at which twenty-one were present. A "Steering" Committee was appointed to determine time and place of meetings and nominations for temporary officers.

The next meeting was held in the J. Ralph Ingalls School with sixteen present. Temporary officers were elected: Mrs. Burton Oliver, chairman; Elton Parr, Vice Chairman, and Mrs. David Lasing, Secretary-Treasurer. These three together with Mrs. Gordon Woodward, Dr. Clement Bowers, Robert Adams, Mrs. Rodger Gallagher, Mrs. Myrle Bauer and Clarence Stratton were to act as a Board of Directors. Paul Gunsalus was appointed chairman of a By-Law's Committee and subsequently added to the Board.

Regular meetings were held on the third Tuesday of each month with an average attendance of 15-20. At the meeting of February 17, 1970, four members of the Fire Department appeared and suggested a community celebration to recognize the 125th Anniversary of the formation of the Town of Maine. At the April 1970 meeting a set of By-Law's was adopted which provided, among other things, that the name of the organization would be the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society and that its aim was to collect and preserve the history of the Nanticoke Valley and its environs.

The year ended in June with a picnic at the Gunsalus home with an attendance of approximately 80, including wives and members of the Town Board, Planning Board and Zoning Board.

The second year started off with an average attendance of 25-40. Meetings were held at the J. Ralph Ingalls School until December when a super was held at the Federated Church. Subsequently the meeting place was changed to the Maine Memorial school where they have been held ever since. The June meeting was a picnic held at the Gunsalus home with the Maine Community Band as guests. Approximately 80 attended. The Band provided a concert after dinner. During this period considerable planning was done on a proposed community celebration recognizing the 125th anniversary of the town. The Town Board passed a resolution setting the Memorial Day weekend in 1973 as the time of such celebration and designating the Historical Society as the agent for planning and carrying out such celebration.

In 1972 our average attendance was 35 and many interesting programs were presented. In view of our involvement with the celebration it was deemed advisable to incorporate the Society. After much work with our lawyer, Stuart Pearis, an application was made to the Board of Regents for a charter and new By-Laws adopted to conform with the Regents requirement. At the January 1973 meeting this charter was presented and signed. "
