

With the help of members of our community, photographs and artifacts featuring former students, faculty and people who worked at the schools were also part of the exhibit. At the reception many people took advantage of having an oral history recorded of their time spent at the schools. Your memories are now part of our archives.

The paintings that were commissioned to hang in Maine Central and Union Center Elementary School were also part of the exhibits. As many could see, some of these paintings and frames are in rough shape and are in need of restoration. We have chosen three of them to be conserved. After much careful research I have found a way to have them restored at a reasonable price without sacrificing quality. One of them, Col. George Coussmaker, also fondly known at our museum as the guy with a rip in his leg, has gone to Buffalo State, Garman Art Conservation





The total for the conservation amounts to \$2575 Our president, Phil Childs, received a grant of \$1000 from the Broome County Arts Council but that still leaves a balance of \$1275.00. 
"Jason and Judy Ann Marean built this house on Boston Purchase Lot No. 11 around 1858. There was a previous house built here in 1826. The current address is 2505 NYS Rt. 26. " Ann Page Lewis from her book THEN & KNOW, 1998. Note that the large front yard keeps getting smaller as Route 26 gets larger.





Did you know that this year the Nanticoke Valley Historical Society of Maine NY is fifty years old. In the fall of 1969 the society was started by our founding members. In the "good ole days" life was simpler! One example of entertainment back then were "Topsys and Turvys." Have you ever seen one of these? The most famous artist of this technique was Peter Newell (1862—1924). He was an artist, illustrator of books and around 1900 one of the primary producers of Topsys and Turvys. Read the lower caption and then rotate the sketch to see the Turvy.



About a month ago I stopped by the museum and as entering I heard laughter drifting towards me. I followed it to the meeting room where I found four members of the Cummings family, who were recalling their family history to Carla Sullivan. She directed questions to them and recorded their responses. I sat and listened for a while and watched in awe as they shared their life stories. I learned so much history of our region from them. After that session Carla will make digital copies of that interview and in the future she will transcribe this information for future scholars to study. The NVHS has been "collecting" oral histories from many families over the last few years. These oral histories are placed in our archives and our



curator catalogs this collection. This project is one manner in which we follow our mission statement. The statement says: the Society is to conduct, operate and maintain a historical society, exclusively for educational purposes. 

As you stroll through the Maine cemetery located on Rte. 26, about one mile south of the town, you will notice many medallions next to grave stones. These medallions represent wars that the person fought in or organizations that they were members of. This cemetery dates from 1816, so lots of history is covered, starting with Revolutionary war veterans. The ones below are all from this cemetery. This special marker to the left is from *The Daughters of the American Revolution* and is located next to Louise Gates Gunsalus 1894—1982 stone.





Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday in Endicott for Miss Minnie LaTourette, 84. a lifelong resident of the village who died at Ideal Hospital yesterday after a long illness. She was the last surviving child of Elias LaTourette, a town of Union native and prominent farm owner in the area before the Civil War. Prior to her hospitalization earlier this month, she lived alone for many years at 524 West Main Street, Endicott. She was a graduate of the old Union High School in Endicott's Loder Avenue, a teacher of Sunday school classes at the Endicott Central Methodist Church for several years and a member of Endicott Garden Club. Her body was taken to Coleman & Daniels Funeral Home 300 East Main Street Endicott, where funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. Earl V. Tolley, pastor of Central Methodist Church. Burial will be in Riverside Cemetery, Endicott. Miss LaTourette is survived by a niece. Mrs. Jenny Main and two nephews Fred Brink, and Earl Brink, all of Endicott.
