


flowers selling her works in New York, Pennsylvania and Florida. She has won numerous awards for her artwork and you can find her works throughout the U.S., Germany and England.

BROOME ART TRAIL AT OUR MUSEUM; **Saturday, June 1st & Sunday, June 2nd | 12PM to 4PM** We are one stop on this trail includes over 100 participating artists and arts organizations across 53 venues throughout Broome County. Artists' work spans mediums including painting, drawing, sculpture, fiber, woodworking, printmaking, ceramics, jewelry and more!



The first settlers in our town came around 1794 from New England and the Wyoming Valley Pennsylvania. Original homes were very simple; logs cabins followed by clapboard homes. In 1810 Issac (Elizer) Norton built this home at Tiona and Nanticoke Roads. It no longer exists. The Norton's started their family business across the road. Two structures still stand from the early 1840 Wagon and Sleigh works begun by Henry Norton and then his son Geo. E. Turning these shops into another museum site is our next goal.

Some of the oldest homes became incorporated into larger home. "Nathan Hovey was the first settler in the hamlet; his original house was incorporated into

this Federal style structure" at 2569 Main Street. Many of the home in the hamlet date from 1820's. They were built to resemble the homes in New England from where they migrated.

2569 NYS Rte 26 ca. 1820 Nathan Hovey was the first settler in the hamlet; his original house was incorporated into this Federal style structure.



The painting to the right is being curated at the Buffalo State College Dept. of Art Restoration. "Reynolds gave close attention to his portrait of George Kein Hayward Coussmaker, a lieutenant and captain in the first regiment of Foot Guards. No fewer than twenty-one appointments—and at least two more for the sitter's



horse—are recorded between February 9 and April 16, 1782. The composition is complex and the whole vigorously painted. "






As you drive past the Amesless Golf course property you might notice that an old house is being dismantled. This is (was) the Thomas Marean house ca. 1818 which was located at 2902 NYS Route 26. It was the residence of the Pomeroy family for over 43 years. After they moved another family lived there. Sometime later the building had a fire in the kitchen area. Jim McKilligan moved this building to its current location. Mr. Dan Ackley now enters the story and it is his plan is to dissemble the beams and boards and reassemble it on his property at Hardy Road. We at NVHS are pleased that this building is not being lost and those great beams will continue to support a home, perhaps for another two hundred years.



DO YOU REMEMBER?

"In 1905 in Oakland, California, 11-year-old Francis William "Frank" Epperson was mixing a powdered flavoring for soft drinks with water. He accidentally left it on the back porch overnight, with a stirring stick still in it. That night, the temperature dropped below freezing, and the next morning, Epperson discovered the drink had frozen to the stick, inspiring the idea of a fruit-flavored 'Popsicle'.


In 1922, he introduced the creation at a fireman's ball, where according to reports



it was "a sensation". In 1923, Epperson began selling the frozen pops to the public at Neptune Beach, an amusement park in Alameda, California. By 1924 Epperson had received a patent for his "frozen confectionery" which he called "the **Epsicle** ice pop". He renamed it to **Popsicle**, allegedly at the insistence of his children. Popsicles were originally sold in fruity flavors and marketed as a "frozen drink on a stick."


